For:

1. The governor, secretary of states, and comptroller, all busy officials, should not be burdened with the strictly storekeeping function of approving purchasing contracts. Approval of contracts by these officals has in actual practice, become a mere formality and something of a nuisance. Such "approval" is perfomed by ministerial subordinates of these officials, so that the requirement has in reality 2. Although the present needs become so much "red tape."



containing prussic acid can be cut and dried and safely fed to livestock.

Signs of prussic acid pois-

oning may start within five mintues of the time the animal eats the affected plant. Death may occur in fifteen minutes or an animal may live for several hours. First signs of poisoning is salivation and labored breathing, followed by muscle tremor, incoordination, bloating, and convulsions. Death quickly follows due to respiratory failure. The heart may beat for a period of time after breathing stops. An animal showing signs of prussic acid poisoning, should be given intravenously a solution of either sodium nitrate, sodium thissulfate, or methlyen blue. The antidote solultion should be given intrevenously, because of the poisons rapid action. Most veterinarians carry the antidote solution ready to administer. A simple test using a few materials obtainable from a drug store, can be used to determine if a sorghum pasture has a dangerous level of prussic acid. To test for prussic acid, thoroughly chop up about one-half to one cup of the suspected forage. Pack the chopped forage into a jar that has a tight lid. Add five to ten drops of choloroform to the chopped forage. Wet a filter paper with dosium picrate solution and suspend the filter paper in the jar with the lid screw-

The Launching Pad By NEAL ESTES

Many thinking Americans went to bed late Tuesday night wondering over whether or not another Democratic administration had made more secret committments to aid Czechoslovakia in case of Russian attack. The action of LBJ in quickly calling a Security Council meeting coupled up with DEAN RUSK'S sudden and swift retreat from his appearance before the Democratic platform committee to attend the special called session and other factors gave birth to the concern of America's participation. It was one of those secret pledges of support that got us in the war in Vietnam. It could happen again. The swiftness of the Soviet takeover in Czechoslovakia could have caused the U.S. from honoring any previously pledged secret committment. In other words, if the administration had made a side deal with the Czecks to help defend their country against Communist aggression, our national face was served by the bell. The latest movement by the Reds just goes to show how easy a country with armed might can march in and seize an entire nation overnight. Some supporters of PRESIDENT JOHNSON'S Vietnam viewpoint can't even understand why the U.S.A. has long ago crushed the North Vietnemese forces with such power as we possess. Of course, it has been argued that LBJ was not willing to take a chance on starting World War Three. Well, take a look today, and we clearly see Russia gobbling up the tiny Czech nation in a few hours. They, perhaps chanced another World War too, but their ace-in-the-hole was their knowledge of the JOHNSON no-win go slow on Communism policy. To bring the point down to brass tacks the Reds acted on the thought that the JOHNSON-HUMPHREY policy is not made of the fabric it takes to display real guts when the chips are down. Right now is the time to either go in and blow the North Vietnam forces off the face of the world map or get out of that country fast. I think it is time we won the war in Vietnam and stood up to Russia once and for all time. If the Third World War comes-then it can be no worse than dragging on a war that is costing many precious American men their lives with no end in sight for years.

For the past sixteen years the Democratic Convention has been the best action show on tv. 
