A Letter From Pendleton

(Editor's Note: The following letter was received by Neal Estes, editor of The Stanton Reporter from Rep. Randy Pendleton and is self explanatory.)

"Although the use of drugs spans many centuries, we have had an alarming increase in drug addiction since 1945. The greatest increase is among the young people and it is this group that concerns me most.

"I have introduced H. B. 388 amending Article 725b, Vernon's Texas Penal Code, to provide for a stiffer penalty upon those who sell or offer to sell any narcotic drug convicted a second or subsequent time. The law now provides for 'life or for any term of years not less than ten (10)'. Because of the one-third parole rule and time for the giving of blood, good behavior, etc. an individual convicted and given a ten year sentence, can be back on the streets pushing in less than three years.

H. B. 388 provides that a person convicted for a second

or subsequent time may not be eligible for consideration of parole until he has served at least ten actual years and may not receive any of the benefits accorded by Chapter 361, Acts of the 48th Legislature, 1943, as amended, allowing commutation for good time until ten (10) actual years have been served.

"I personally would prefer a mandatory life sentence for second offenders because the young persons who buy narcotics from the pusher have begun their life sentence through addiction from that purchase. Medical evidence has shown that he or she may well be passing this problem to a future generation through permanent damage to his or her chromosomes. However, the courts have been reluctant to convict where mandatory sentences are prescribed. For this reason I trust we can confine the second offender for the minimum of 10 actual years."

Tax Man Sam Sez:

The good tax folks try real hard every year to get tax instructions that taxpayers can follow without getting mixed-up. Of course, the law is real complicated and the IRS folks that write the instructions have their work cut out for them. Taxpayers have more trouble getting the right tax table, and the right line or column on the tax table than anything else. Since the law requires a lot of different tax tables, the instruction must be detailed or even tedious. About the only thing we can do is to re-check our tax computation carefully.

More than half of the errors reported by the computer for Dallas district taxpayers, are caused by taxpayers getting mixed-up and getting the wrong tax table, line, or column. So re-check your instructions, your computations, and everything. Be real careful! If you don't the computer may send you a little notice pointing out your error.

Veterans Benefits Not Taxable

The Veterans Administration reminded veterans today that VA benefits are generally tax exempt and need not be reported as income on federal or state income tax returns.

Except for interest earned on GI insurance dividends left on deposit with VA (which is a reportable item), all proceeds from GI insurance policies are major exempt.

Other major items of income that need not be reported include educational assistance allowances, pension and compensation payments, subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees, and grants for special automobiles and "wheelchair homes" for the severely disabled.

Also tax exempt are all benefits to surviving dependents of deceased veterans and compensation allowances for dependents of disabled veterans.
