





same rates of plant nutrients are used, says County Agent, Liquid fertilizers can be

applied as individual materials or as mixtures of the plant nutrients. Most liquid. mixed fertilizers contain two primary elements - nitrogen and phosphorus; some may also contain potassium.

Producers should keep in mind that it requires the same number of pounds of nitrogen, phosphoroums and potassium from liquid sources to produce a given yield, as required from dry fertilizer.

The ease of handling is one distinct advanages in using liquid plant foods. They can be handled by mechanical methods (gravity, pump or air pressure) to avoid lifting and carrying fertilizer bags. Also, with proper equipment, liguid fertilizers can be applied very accurately and combine easily with many herbicides, fumigants, and insecticides.

Disadvantages include the necessity for special application equipment and storage facilities. Some nitrogen solutions must be handled under pressure. Also, with variations in temperature there is some chance the disolved solids may "salt out" resulting in the clorging of storage facilities and application equip-Most agronomists agree the

use of liquid fertilizers will continue to increase, but any advantage they enjoy lies in convenience and east of handling and not in any special agronomic value, says the county agent.

If you overstate your arceage by more than 10 percent or understated your acreage by more than 5 percent, you are out of compliance and will be ineligible for any program payments, unless you can prove to the county committee, the state committee, and to the Washington office


