





I would Ifke to suggest that he turn in his resignation. Being rejected by the most august body of men in the worldthe U.S. Senators—should have served as rebuke enough to cause him such humiliation he wouldn't want to continue as a member of the nine-man panel of judges. Now the revelation that such a small amount of money was tendered to purchase his legal talents as a member of the highest court in the land and by his own admission, has surfaced, he must know any confidence the public had in him has been badly shaken.

TYNDON JOHNSON made three appointments to the Supreme Court while in office. He named ARTHUR GOLDBERG and THURGOOD MARSHALL and FORTAS. MARSHALL was the first Negro ever named to the top tribunal. LBJ's appointees reminds me of the story the wags used about the dialogue between a Baptist preacher and a Jewish rabbi after the late MARI-LYN MONROE and another famed actress and SAMMY DAVIS, JR., all accepted Judism. The preached said: "I wouldn't brag so much about those three converts. Really, all you have is a couple of much-married bags and a one-eyed Negro." Of course, in justice and fairness it is only right to say that MR. GOLDBERG resigned from the Supreme Court to accept the ambassadorship to the United Nations. Colonel William E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety and state director of defense and disaster relief, today reminded Texans that the peak tornado season has arrived.

Information obtained from the U.S. Weather Bureau's State Climatologist indicates that Texas reported 140 tornadoes during the past year. This figure compare with a record number of 232 during 1967, of which more than half occurred September in connection with Hurrincane Beulah, Since 1951, Texas has reported 1,659 tornadoes.

There were no months free from twister in 1968. The peak tornado months, April, May, and June, produceds 13, 48, and 21 tornadoes, respectively. Other totals included January, 2; February, 1; March, 3; July, 4; August, 8; September, 5; October, 8 November, 11, and December,




