(Editor's Note: Veterans ings thousands of questions their government prevides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.)

Q-If a veteran has an annual income of \$1,576, how much VA monthly pension will he get under the new law?

A - A monthly pension of \$57 is payable to veterans who do not have dependents, and whose annual income ranges between \$1,500 and \$1,600.

Q - I have the "Toal Disability Income Provision" on my National Service Life Insurance. When applying for the total disability income benefit after the six month period, will payment be made retroactive from the first month of total disability?

A - Payment of the total disability income benefit starts with the seventh month and continues as long as the total disability exists.

Q - I am a disabled veteran of World War II. I dropped my life insurance many years ago. Can I apply for G. I. n-

A - No. Disabled veterans of World War II were given the opportunity of applying for insurance from May 1, 19-65, through May 2, 1966



Cotton producers in Glasscock County planted approximately 60 per cent of their 1969 cotton acreage to Acala varieties, according to Donald W. Gratton, in charge of the Carlsbad classing office. Acala 1517 BR-1 was the predominate variety and accounted for 44 per cent of the total.

The next leading variety was Lockett 4789A and 22 per cent. Acala 1517 BR-2 accounted for 16 per cent, followed by Acala 3080 with six per cent. Other varities planted in the county and percentages include: Payment 111 - four per cent; Lankart 3840 three per cent; Western Stromproof - three per cent; Stoneville 7A - two per cent, and Northern Star-less than one-half of one per cent.

Growers in the county planted 84 per cent of their acreage to Acala varities in the 1968 season.

Cotton producers in Glasscock County harvested 15,100 bales last season- up from 12,800 bales the previous year. Nearly 100 per cent of the production was classed under the Smith-Doxey Act by the Cotton Division's Classing Office

T. L. Roach, Jr. of Amarillo, blasted critics of the price rise and said beef today still is a bargain. "Cowmen offer no apology," he said.

Roach made his remarks at a two-day summer meeting of association directors. He invited critics to make a realistic comparison of beef prices with prices of other items and said that the price level to cattle producers and feed lot operators must continue to rise on par with their costs to enable continued production of beef required.

"Inflation increased prices in excess of 40 per cent for all goods and services," Roach said. "Yet beef is at the price structure of 18 years ago," he added.

Roach said some news media and government officials have published incomplete stories, insinuating that cattlemen held back animals to force up prices. "Nothing could be further from the truth and such reports are gross diservice," the cattle official emphasized.

Roach said beef production costs had almost doubled the past 20 years and that even with today's improved cattle prices, the industry receives in comparison to what it buys

He concluded, 'the nation's cattle industry doesn't ask for anything unfair. Cattlemen are devoted to supplying their country with good beef and will do so if given the oppor-

He earned a PhD. in 1952 from the University of Texas.



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
