The Justice Department has taken steps aimed at prompting the Supreme Court to soften its controversial Miranda V. Arizona decision, which limited the authority of the police to interrogate suspects and obtain confessions. With the naming of WARREN BUEGER to the Supreme Court, the influence of former Chief Justice EARL WARREN is fading and the liberals are unhappy. The notorious Miranda decision shoved down the throats of the American public shocked followers of law and order throughout the land.
