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



Tatum, Texas, located about halfway between Longview and Carthage made the state news the other day when a train carrying volatile chemicals and liquids derailed. Officers said the train originated at the Texas Eastman plant near Longview and one of the cars contained liquid propane. When the train derailed one car exploded and four more burnea through the night as officials decided to let the flames burn themselves out. Yeras ago, when I published a newspaper at Carthage, Texas, a motor car made a daily round trip run to Longview. The car made two stops-one at Beckville and one at Tatum. In those days some of the "boys" would go on a binge on Saturday night at Tatum and go down to the depot to watch the train come in. Frequently pistol fire would vent the air as the celebrants sought to terrorize the passengers with horse play. On one such occasion, a Jewish piece goods salesman was accidentally shot when he alighted from the train in Tatum. The man recovered but from that time on for years the motor car was called the "Crimson Limited." It was said that as the motor car neared Tatum the conductor would order all blinds lowered before announcing the station stop. The conductor's call was cloaked in sadness as he chanted: "Tatum, Tatum, prepare to meet thy God."
