### Dairy Calves Do Well In Feedlot

Research at Texas A&M revealed that dairy caives can compare favorably with beeftype calves in overall feedlot performance. Rate of gain was comparable, feed efficiency was greater, and there was no major difference in physical and chemical properties of the meat. 

## The Launching Pad


