

A mesh wire or board pen makes a good container for keeping the material from scattering. Keep the pile moist as an aid to the decomposition process, suggests Reagor.

Layers of manure or commericial fertilizer, placed alternately with the leaves will make the resulting compost even more valuable. The compost will not only supply organic matter, but will also have value as plant food, says the county agent.

Compost can be made anytime during the year, but the decaying process is slower during the cooler months of the year. Now is good time to start a compost pile, because of the generous supply of composting materials available during the fall season.

Your flower and vegetable gardens next year can become more beautiful and productive as a result of the compost you can have ready for next spring. And finally, points out Reagor, composting eliminates burning and result air pollution.

maturation. Therefore, plants with mature bottom bolls but with immature fruit in rank top growth with no opportunity to mature, would benefit most from topping. Yet, even under the conditions, beneficial results are not always assured

One problem, explains Reagor, is that topping will remove some mature bolls that should be kent, while leaving some immature bolls that should be removed. In other words, mature and immature bolls are usually not distinctly separated on the cotton plant. On the other hand, little or no advantage can be expected on cotton with quaater size and larger bolls near the top. In fact, reduction in yield can be expected; when topping this type cot-

Another reported advantage of topping is reducing foliage to aid in stripped harvesting adds Reagor. This may be especially beneficial in rank cotton receiving exthe field. However, most cotton this years is generally not too large due to the hot, dry summer. Therefore, the need for topping is less than in

Of course, reminds Reagor, the primary factor to consider is the cost of this practice. Topping costs will range from \$2-\$4 per acre. This means a yield advantage of at least 25 to 30 pounds of lint is needed for a break-even proposition. So the producer should take a careful look at this practice before considering it. If you only expect to preak even, the time and money can be more profitably spent on other enterprises. contends Reagor.

The Launching Pad

One of the finest television programs I have seen in many months was put on the air from New York Sunday afternoon. If all tv programs followed the line of the dedicatory concert of the Julliard Orchestra when new facilities were opened to complete Lincoln Memorial Center the industry would not longer be called a vast wasteland. The famed Julliard School of Music. moved to the Lincoln Center, to complete the complex. I especially admired the contribution made to the program by the master director LEOPOLD STOWKASKI. The late President EISENHOWER turned the first shovel of dirt for the new Lincoln Center ten years ago. MRS. RICHARD NXON and her children, DAVID and JULIA EISENHOWER, occupied the top box at the dedication.

The report of FBI activities during the 1960 fiscal year is more than an informative record of outstanding accomplishments-it informative record of outstanding employees who faithfully serves the F31 and our nation. In his introduction, DIRECTOR J. EDGAR HOOVER said: "During the 1969 fiscal year, out Nation suffered grave and often unpareled threats to its freedom and internal security. From without, forces antagonistic to a free government sought through espionage and other clandestine-type activities to weaken the United Staes and its contribution to the defenses of the Free World. From within, shocking excessas of criminal activity-organized and otherwise-and violent attempts to subvert democratic processes and promote racia! discord lacerated our society. Destructive acts of senseless rebellion by increasing numbers of our youth and widespread contempt for properly constituted authority greatly supported the cause of lawlessness and subversion throughout the country.

"To those sworn to uphold the law and maintain public order, the challenges of the past year were many and profound. Already overtaxed, law enforcement agencies at all levels of government were burdened with new and increasingly complex responsibilities in a rapidly changing society. To the men and women of the FBI, the year demanded the fullest measure of dedication and professional competence. No less was given. With unstinting devotion to the highest ideals of justice and publicitrust, they effectively carried out the Bureau's heavy investigative and service responsibilities.

Two bigwigs in the Democratic Party who have known in the past to level heavy blast of criticism at a lot of public figures have come under the spotlight of unfavorable publicity. Former Vice-president **HUBERT HUMFHREY**, and House Speaker JOHN Mc-CORMICK, both found themselves trying to explain certain deals pulled off for the benefit of cronies right under their very noses. McCORMICK apparently let an aide and an "old friend" occupy his office for the purpose of eddling influence. With or without the knowledge of the Speaker, a sizeable sum of money was allegedly passed to one of the McCORMICK buddies to help get the favor done for a man up on an income tax evasion charge. McCORMICK has denied any knowledge of the transaction. He couldn't do anything else. I have always thought the man from Massachusetts was a weak leader but I have always preferred to think he was honest. The second scandle literally rocked the nation. HUBERT HUMPHREY is said to have intervened repeatedly with high U. S. and Indian officials from 1961 through 1964 to help a Minnesota firm in a \$2.3 million deal for which the company is now being sued for fraud.
