

ROBERTS BILL WOULD AUTHORIZE HALF DOLLAR HONORING RAYBURN

Rep. Ray Roberts of McKinney, this week introduced a bill to authorize a 50c piece honoring the late House Speaker Say Rayburn, whom Roberts succeeded in the House after Rayburn's death in 1961.

Under Roberts' bill, which is cosponsored by 48 House members from 25 states, the Rayburn Half-dollars would be sold at face value to the Sam Rayburn Foundation, in turn, would sell the coins to the public for a profit that would help support the Say Rayburn Library.

The bill was sent to the House Banking and Currency Committee, which is headed by Rep. Wright Patman of Texarkana, who served in the House with "Mr. Sam" for more than three decades. Patman has promised to hold hearings on the bill as soon as possible.

EVI STRAUSS COMPANY will establish a clothing manufacturing pilot plant in Midland Industrial Park. Decision to locate the plant in Midland County followed a comprehensive campaign in the area to line up prospects for a huge labor pool. The Martin County followed a comprehensive campaign in the area here. Applications will be accepted by interested parties from this county for employment in the STRAUSS operation. The manufacturing facility will be in a 3,000 square feet building to be erected by the Midland Industrial Foundation at a cost of \$200,000 and leased to STRAUSS operations. The initial number of workers now being considered by STRAUSS amounts to 1.500. This will the tenth STRAUSS plant in Texas.
