



A number of woody plants provide food for the quail during the winter. Quail occasionally eat mesquite beans, wild grapes, hacberry seed, Sumac berries, and other products of weedy plants. Stockmen should note the grass contributes very little to the food needs of quail. Grass seeds are not large enough to provide worthwhile food. All farm grown grains, including corn, are acceptable to quail. In general weeds are the cost widely disbuted sources of quail food.

Quail cannot live without cover. The cover requirement may be provided by protection of woody cover on rangeland. shallow discing adjoining wide fence rows, or some inexpensive food and cover planting

with protection from grazing. The bobwhite requires acreage out of proportion to his small size. The maximum population attainable is believed to be one bobwhite per acre for any large block of range, such as a farm or ranch. Becausethe average covey consists of 10 to 15 bobwhites, a block of 115 acres will seldom support more than one covey. The acreage requirements of a bobwhite covey are equal to, or greater than, the acres required per cow over most of native grazing ranges of Tex-


