



Former County Commissioner's Services Held

Services for P. O. Hughes, 84, were held Friday, in River-Welch Funeral Home Chapel, in Big Spring, with burial in the City Cemetery.

Hughes died December 23, in a local hospital after a long illness.

He was born January 17, 1885, in Georgia. He first came to Howard County in 1904. He lived in Martin County from 1926 to 1948. He was a farmer here, and was a county commissioner for eight years. He later moved back to Howard County in 1948, and was a county commissioner there from 1956 to 1960.

He married Maggie Ray, December 17, 1903, in Brownwood. She preceded him in death on February 5, 1951.

Hughes was a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include a son, Vernie Hughes, of Knott; a daughter, Mrs. Cecil Allred, of Ackerly; a sister, Mrs. W. B. Morris, of Midland; a granddaughter, Mrs. Derwood Blagrove, of Ackerly, and two great-grandchildren.
