health hazards, there also appears to be a growing effort among non-smokers to saddle the habit with the stigma of social unacceptablity.

Emil Corwin, the national clearinghouse for smoking and health, has this to say about the trend:

"I think we're experiencing the same kind of revulsion against a popular habit which in another period caused spitting to be outlawed and spit-toons to disappear from Tashionable parlors and the halls of Congress."

Corwin's assessment may be premature, but there are unmistakable sgins that a growing band of misocpanists haters of tobacco smoke - is making itself felt, including the following:

-Pan American World Airways has established the first no-smoking sections in the air in its new 747 jets, and a petition has been filed with the Federal Aviation Administration to require such steps on all carriers.

- Recent railroad surveys have shown that about 80 per cent of commuters prefer to ride in non-smoking cars, against less than 60 per cent a few years ago, and the railroads have reduced the number of smoking cars on each train accordingly.

The tobacco tribunal of Heenepin County, Minngapolis, distributes a "smoker's eti-



#### Sandhill Crane Harvest Set At 991 Birds

Sandhill crane hunters managed to bag 991 of these fast flying birds during the 1969-70 season

This figure, significantly lower than last year's kill of 1.339 cranes, was due to several factors, according to Jack Parsons, wildlife supervisor in San Angelo for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Cranes were plentiful, and another large West Texas area was opened to hunting. But low hunter participation, coupled with clear weather, with little ground fog to offer hunter concealment, and few strong winds to cause the cranes to fly low and within shotgun range, kept the kill down.

Crane hunters are generally in agreement that to bag a sandhill is to earn him. Seldom is a crane killed by accident. Crane hunters say the sport calls for preparaton, markmanship, and a degree of hunter skill required by very few other game speces in )




# The Launching Pad By NEAL ESTES

The new name for the foundation hospital in Big Spring will be effective at once. The board of trustees of Hogan and Malone Foundation Hospital have enhounced that the new name is MEDICAL CENTER MEMORIAL HOSPITAL. Consultants recommended the name change and stated that the community owned hospital which has operated since 1951 would get "more recognition as a voluntary, non-profit, community owned hospital."

Crisis broke out in the ranks of the Texas Welfare Department last week when it was announced welfare checks were going to be drastically cut on April 1 due to shortage of state funds earmarked for that purpose, LT. GOV. BEN BARNES yelled for a special session of the Texas Legislature to find more tax money to finance the welfare program. GOV. PRESTON SMITH said no. SMITH simply announced his intentions of taking funds already appropriated for Texas Tech and the Texas University Branch of the proposed medical school at Houston and paying the money out to the welfare clients. This is what SMITH'S hometown newspaper. The Lubback Avalanche-Journal had to say editorially about his action: "Decisions such as that by Gov. Preston Smith not to call a special welfare session of the Legislature are of the sort which do not cause anybody to jump with joy. Only partially pleased are members of the Legislature running for office and re-election who thus will be spared attendance in Austin while they need to be campaigning. They know, however, that the evil day of levying new taxes is only postponed for them, if re-elected. The general public will feel approximately the same. They are happier when the Legislature is not in session, but know they'll catch it next year. Proponents of the new Texas Tech Medical schools at Lubbock and Austin are not overjoyed that \$13.5 million of their construction funds will be transferred." GOV. SMITH also announced that he is stepping up rehabilitation and work training efforts to remove more recipients from the welfare rolls. In a nutshell, SMITH hopes to keep the welfare rolls going, favors delayed appropriation for funds which will be needed next year, will ask for money to replace the money transferred from the proposed new college schools of medicine, thinks a special session would result in a lot of political time-wasting, and is working to find ways to get free loaders off the welfare rolls by encouraging them to get jobs if able to do so.






