Young Voters Beat Powell

Adam Clayton Powell's Democratic primary defeat appeared to have been due largely to the flamboyant congressman's absenteeism and the addition to his Harlem district of a young, liberal voting bloc that preferred a new man.

This analysis emerged from a series of interviews in the 18th Congressional District whose Democrats chose another negro, State Assemblyman Charles Rangel to be their nominee. Powell has held the seat for 24 years.

Rangel had 7,804 votes to Powell's 7,599 in Tuesday's five-man race. The other three candidates, two blacks and a Puerto Rican drew a total of 8,516 votes.

"I don't think Powell had been doing too much for the black people. I think it was time," said a white woman in her 30s, who lives on Manhattan's Upper West Side. She is one of the new voters in the district.

Several young blacks said Powell had lost both his credibility and his ability to communicate with them. Barbara Cottrell, 30, said she did not "trust the things he said."

Powell could not be reached for comment on his plans but there was some talk among his supporters of an independent campaign for the congressional seat in the fall.

McCormack Will Testify At Trial

House Speaker John McCormack has agreed to testify July 2 at the federal trial of his suspended administrative aide, Martin Sweig, on charges of conspiring at influence peddling and with lying to a grand jury.

Sweig's co-defendant, lobbyist-lawyer Nathan Voloshen, as pleaded guilty to both charges.

The announcement that McCormack, 79-year-old Massachusetts Democrat, would like the stand was made at the end of Tuesday's session of the trial in U. S. District Court by U. S. Atty. Whitney North Seymour Jr.

Lady Bird Draws \$15 Accident Fine

AUSTIN — Police said Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson, wife of the former president, entered no plea and was fined \$15 for failure to yield right of way.

The charge grew out of a traffic accident Tuesday afternoon in which the former First Lady's car and another automobile collided at an intersection.

A charge of failure to display a driver's license was dismissed after, officers said, they determined that Mrs. Johnson owned a valid license.

Mrs. Johnson did not appear in court. Damage to the Johnson car was estimated at \$800. The other car suffered \$150 damage.

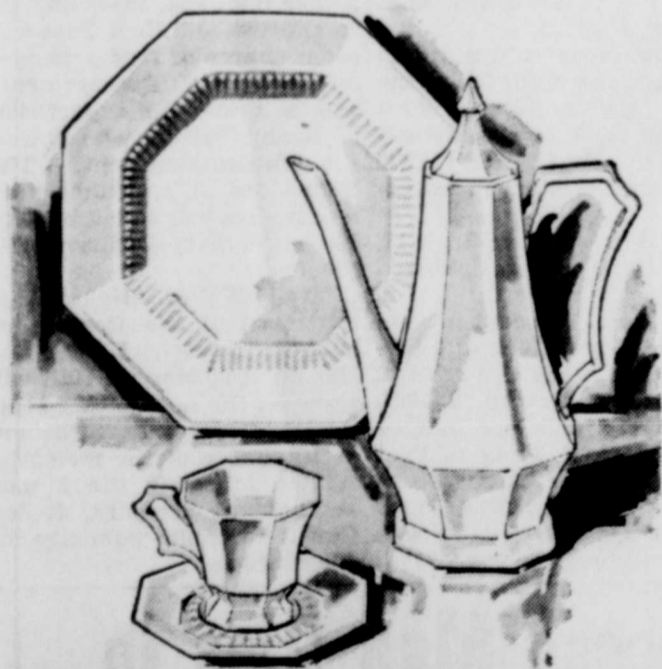

Some Schools Thinking About 12-Month Term

Texas schools are "out" for another summer vacation.

Except for limited summer school programs, the schools have banked the fires of learning until next September.

And from Louisville, Kentucky, came word last week that the schools there are going to replace their traditional nine-month school year with a "year-round school" by September, 1971.

The idea of a "12-month school" has been bouncing around the country for at least 50 years. Some educators see it a possible way to save money in school construction costs, make better use of facilities and personnel, and provide improved instruction.

Others, including parents, object to the idea. Arguments against "year-round school" in Texas include these:

1. Texas first should adequately finance its present school program.

2. Children should not be forced to attend classes without air conditioning during the sweltering summertime.

3. Added building maintenance and depreciation would increase costs, as would added salaries for teaching personnel.

To seek answers to these questions, Texas school systems are authorized by state law to try the "extended year" idea as a pilot operation — either on a four-quarter, or on a trimester basis.

The Legislature in 1967 authorized pilot four-quarter programs, and in 1969 authorized three-semester pilot programs in schools that operate 12 months.

Only two Texas school districts are known to be experimenting with the new plans. One high school has been "piloting" a tri-semester program for the past two years. Another high school has asked

summer. These classes were financed by tuition charges and local and federal funds. No state funds are available for summer school operation.

An interim committee authorized by the 61st Legislature is now studying the feasibility of four-quarter public school operation. Members are Representatives Jack Blanton,

Carrollton, chairman; Delwin Jones, Lubbock; and Dan Kubaek, Rockdale; and Supt. H. M. Landrum, Big Spring ISD; Leon R. Graham of the Texas Education Agency, Austin; and A. H. Hooser of the Texas State Teachers Association, Austin.
