Pre-Election Fever Rising In State

Homecoming Program Is Announced

The homecoming queen and other class candidates will be recognized before the game, and will be joined at halftime by the coming home queen of the Stanton and Courtney exes.

The Student Council will be in charge of the dance to follow the game, to be held in the high school gym. Everyone is invited to attend.

The Stanton - Courtney exes will be joining at the high school cafeteria at 5:30 for registration and dinner.

The Student Council has designated that during homecoming week, Thursday of that week will be color day, and Friday will be dress-up day.

The Board of Directors for the Martin - Howard - Midland Soil and Water Conservation District voted to petition the State Board to divide the district into possibly three divisions, one for Howard County, one for Martin County, and one for Midland County.

Two Extensions Made In Sprayberry Trend

Two extensions were completed in Martin County's portion of the Sprayberry Trend Area.

Hanson Oil Corp. of Roswell, N. M., completed No. 1 R. B. Brown, 16 miles northwest of Stanton.

It flowed 220 barrels of oil, with gas-oil ratio measuring 632-1, on 24 hour potential test, through a 10-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,140-8,289 and 8,690-8,890 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons and fractured with 116,000 gallons and 175,000 pounds.

Drilled to 9,020 feet, it has 5 1/2-inch casing set on bottom.

It spots 1,320 feet from south and east lines of section 15, block 36, T-2-N, T&P survey.

John L. Cox of Midland, completed No. 4 Dickenson, 12 miles northwest of Stanton, to flow 249 barrels of 40-gravity oil per day, with gas-oil ratio measuring 690-1.

Production was through perforations at 8,380-9,120 feet, in 4 1/2-inch casing set at 9,240 feet, total depth. The producing section has been fractured with 80,000 gallons.

It spots 990 feet from north and east lines of section 7, block 37, T-1-N, T&P survey.

Eleven sites were staked in Martin County's Area. John L. Cox of Midland, staked two, 9,300-foot projects in section 18, block 37, T-1-N, T&P survey, about 11 miles northwest of Stanton.

No. 9 Dickenson link well 1/2-mile east and west, is 1,320 feet from south and west lines of the section.

No. 10 Dickenson, 1/2-mile west of production, is 1,320 feet from north and west lines of the section.

Adobe Oil Co., of Midland, plans six of the eleven sites in Martin County.

No. 1 Webb is a 1/2-mile east offset to production in the Sale Ranch part of the county's Sprayberry Trend Area. It spots 1,320 feet from south and west lines of section 33, block 36, T-2-N, T&P survey, one mile west of Lenorah.

Four of Adobe's sites were slated to 9,200 feet, all in block

37, T-1-N, T&P survey, about nine miles northwest of Stanton.

No. 1-B Hazelwood, 3/4-mile southwest, is 1,320 feet from south and west lines of section 33.

No. 2-B Hazelwood, 1 1/8-mile southwest, spots 1,320 feet from south and west lines of section 33.

No. 1 Kyle Shoemaker, 1/2-mile north, is 1,320 feet from north and east lines of section 40.

No. 1 Leonard Shoemaker, 1/2-mile west and 3/4-mile northeast, is 1,320 feet from north and west lines of section 39.

No. 1-B Williams, 1,320 feet from north and east lines of section 15, block T-1-N, T&P survey, 11 miles northwest of Stanton and 1/2 mile south of production. Scheduled depth is 9,200 feet.

Nor-Am Petroleum Corp. plans No. 1 Hazelwood, 1,324 feet from south and 1,380 feet from east lines of section 12, block 37, T-1-N, T&P survey, 10 miles northwest of the three-well Stanton (Sprawberry) pool. It is to go to 9,100 feet.

Collier - Diamond Oils, Inc. of Midland, accounted for No. 1 H. E. McNew Estates as a 1/2-mile south offset to a recent long extension to the Sulphur Draw (Dean) pool, 19 miles north of Stanton.

The project, slated to 9,100 feet, spots 1,320 feet from north and west lines of section 2, block 36, T-2-N, T&P survey.

Tom Brown Drilling Co., Inc. staked location 1/2 mile north and one mile south of completed producers in the Martin County portion of the Sprayberry Trend Area, 10 miles northwest of Stanton. It is No. 2-39 Welch.

Drillsite is 1,320 feet from north and east lines of section 39, block 37, T-2-N, T&P survey. The test is slated to 9,200 feet.

The recent extension, Young Oil Corp., Fort Worth, No. 1 Lester, was completed Sept. 30 to flow 299 barrels of 38.9-gravity oil daily, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,649-8,858 feet. It earned

Residue management should begin now reports the Soil Conservation Service. The stubble that is left after the grain sorghum is combined can provide adequate soil protection if it is managed right. It should be left on the soil surface through the critical erosion period ending about April 1. Tillage operations should be done that will not destroy the stubble and leave the land in condition to blow. Adequate residue will not only help control wind erosion but also hold extra moisture on the land. Chisels and sweeps destroy only about 10 per cent of the stubble where as tandem and one-way destroy 25 to 50 per cent of residue.

Extra soil protection can be provided by using cotton burrs and planting small grain around roads, bar ditches, and turn rows. Cover crops can also be used to protect terraces and waterways. Much has been said about the boll weevils and how they overwinter. It is an established fact that the weevils do not overwinter in sorghum stubble, sorghum alum, or cotton fields as is commonly thought. Boll weevils cannot be controlled through the destruction of crop residue. There is also no danger of spreading the boll weevil through the application of cotton burrs. The state law requires that burrs be run through a fan which will destroy any weevils present. Any weevils or larvae present in the burrs will not survive the winter.
