Subscribers will notice that on their address label is an Wellsite is 660 foot from expiration date. It will read the month and year that the readers subscription to the Reporter expires. Each time a person renews the paper it is necessary to make a new name plate with the new expiration date on it. Actually, this is just a duplication of what is kept on file in the office, all subcribers are on file in alphabetical order, and monthly expiration date files.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Sec-tion 49-d-l to read as follows: "Section 49-d-l.
