He described the prints to be about 24 inches long and about 12 inches wide and seven feet apart. Naturally, being in the land of "Bigfoot." this was the first thought we had. He then suggested that we come up and look for ourselves as he had covered up the tracks with boxes to keep the falling snow from covering them up.

Well, after rounding up some friends and a four wheel drive vehicle we proceeded up the trail to Sky Line Ranch. The ranch is located up in the mountains and we had quite a time getting there.

After walking the last three miles through threefoot snow drifts we finally arrived at the scene.

Now, what we saw and I'm not saying what they were ... only that they did indeed resemble a human footprint and that they were almost two feet in length and about 12 inches in width. They came out of a group of trees and led across an open field and then disappeared into another stand of timber. I had my camera along and took pictures of the prints and printed them in the paper. This led to phone calls from all over the country and three television interviews on the tracks.

To this day I'm not sure what made the prints that I saw. We discussed several possibilities but none of the animals of that region could possibly have made them. To think it might have been a prank was also ruled out due to the remoteness of the area and the fact of the snow storm.

Personally, I think they were the prints of "Bigfoot," for he has reportedly been seen several times in the region. Anyhow, it gave us an erie feeling to be standing up there in the middle of what can be called a wilderness area and gazing at those tracks, each of us wondering silently just what kind of creature could have made them.



There are approximately 30 paintings hanging in different areas of the hospital that were done by the 4 artists.




