City Council Approves 6% Increase in Electric Rates

The City Council met Tuesday evening and approved a 6 per cent increase in electric service rates here. D. L. Tollison, manager of Texas Electric Service Company met with the council and presented the request for the hike.

In announcing the action, Tollison stated: "Texas Electric Service Company, because of sharply increased costs that it can no longer absorb or offset, and facing its largest construction program in history, must request a 6 per cent across-the-board increase in its rates."

"This is a minimum amount needed to continue to provide dependable electric service for the growing needs of our customers."

"For the residential customers with a \$15 electric bill, the increase will amount to 90 cents per month or 3 cents a day. For a customer with a

\$10 bill, the increase will be 60 cents, and for a \$5 bill, 30 cents."

The rate increase is expected to go into effect in about 30 days.

The Council aired one complaint from a concerned citizen of Stanton. Dogs are becoming a problem all over Stanton. Many dogs are allowed to run loose and many people are concerned about it. The dogs go about upsetting trash cans, keeping people awake at all hours prowling and howling around.

The Council recalled a city ordinance which specifically states that dogs must be fenced in. Therefore, the Council decided to enforce the ordinance.

First, they hired Truman Rich as City Dog Catcher. They then set a deadline for getting dogs fenced in or

chained. The deadline is February 15.

The Council was unanimous in their support of the action taken. "The ordinance will be enforced," Mayor Epley stated. "Truman has full authority to act as he sees fit to carry out the duties of his office."

If you have a dog (dogs) running loose over town, you have until February 15 to provide some means of keeping them in your yard. After that date, they can be impounded by the city.

The Council also put Truman in charge of the entire outside work force of the City of Stanton. He will also serve as purchasing agent for the city. The Council raised his salary along with his responsibilities.

An election for City Officials was called for April 1, 1972. At that time, the mayor and three city councilmen will be up for re-election.

matched up in pairs by busy-body Dolly. Virginia Wood, David Flinn and Michelle Parrott play characters who get tangled in the matrimonial machinations.

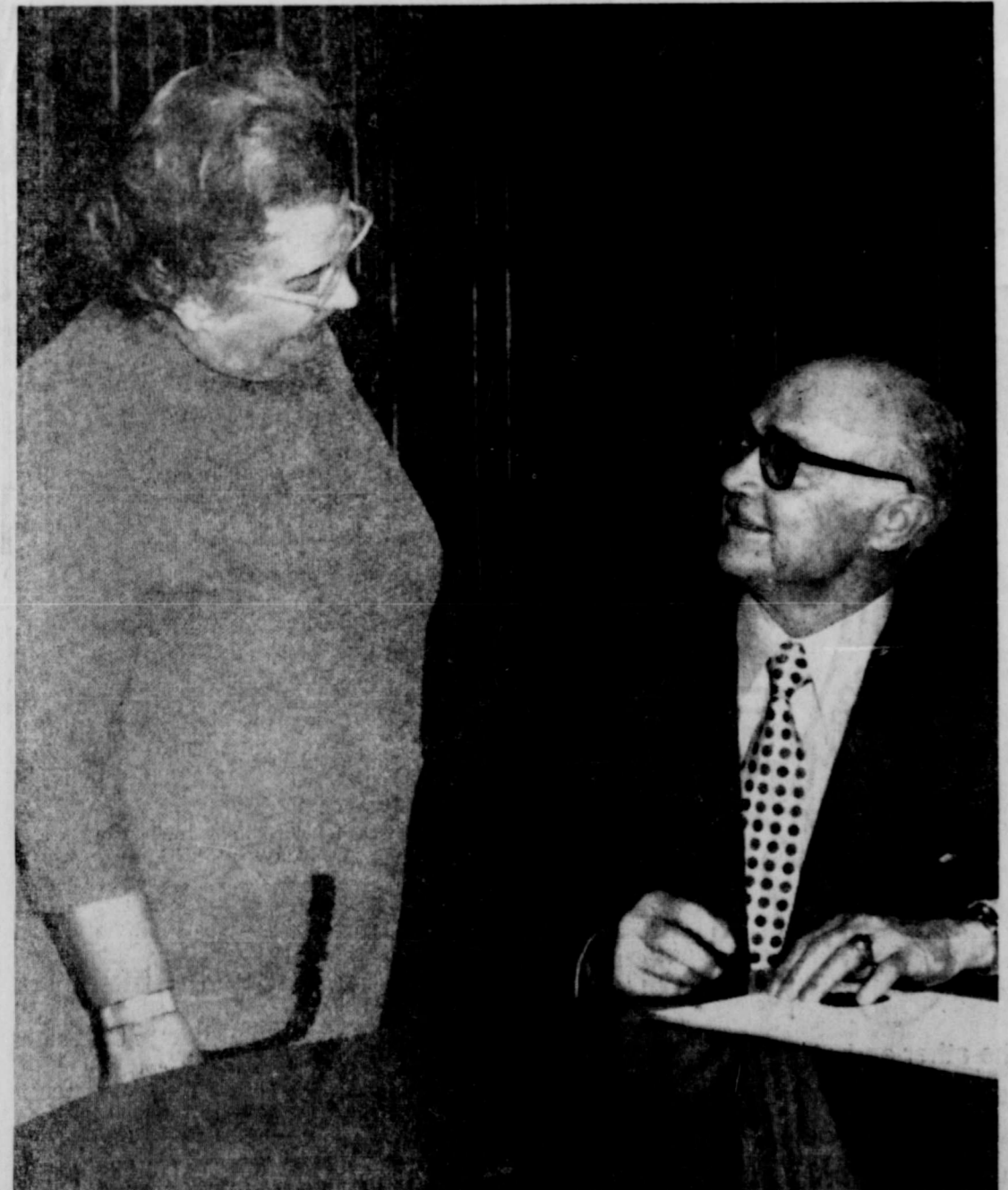
It's the same directing team that produced "Fiddler," Paul Laverty musical director, Cherry Jones choreographer, and Art Cole director.

Oilpatch Outlook

George O. Shettle of Midland filed application to drill a 6,600 foot wildcat test in southwest Glascock County, surrounded by production in the Spraberry Trend Area. It is No. 1 ARCO-Cox.

Drill site is 25 miles southwest of Garden City, 2,173 feet from south and east lines of section 48, block 37, T-4-S, T&P survey.

Universal Resources Corp., Dallas, completed a 1/2-mile west extension to the Sulphur Draw (8,790 Dean) in Martin County.

No. 1-C Slaughter completed to flow 155 barrels of 39.7 gravity oil and 5 1/2 barrels of water daily, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 8,994-9,164 feet, after acidizing with 1,000 gallons and fracturing with 50,000 gallons and 100,000 pounds.

Location is 1,320 feet from north and west lines of section 5, block 36, T-3-N, T&P survey, 26 miles northwest of Stanton.

Monitor Petroleum Corp., New York City, has completed four projects in the Spraberry Trend Area of Martin County.

On a 24-hour potential test, it pumped 168 barrels of 39.8 gravity oil, plus 22 barrels of water, with a gas-oil ratio of 900-1.

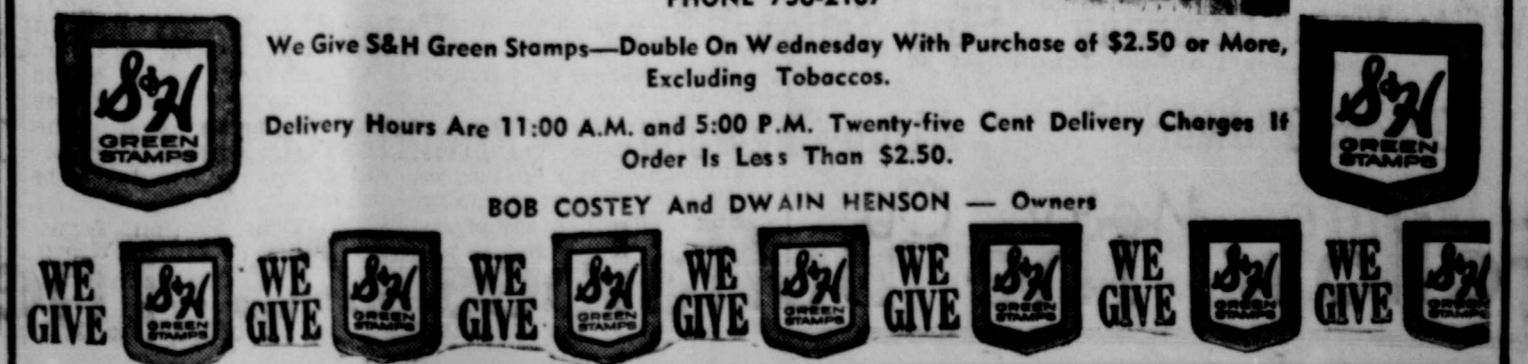

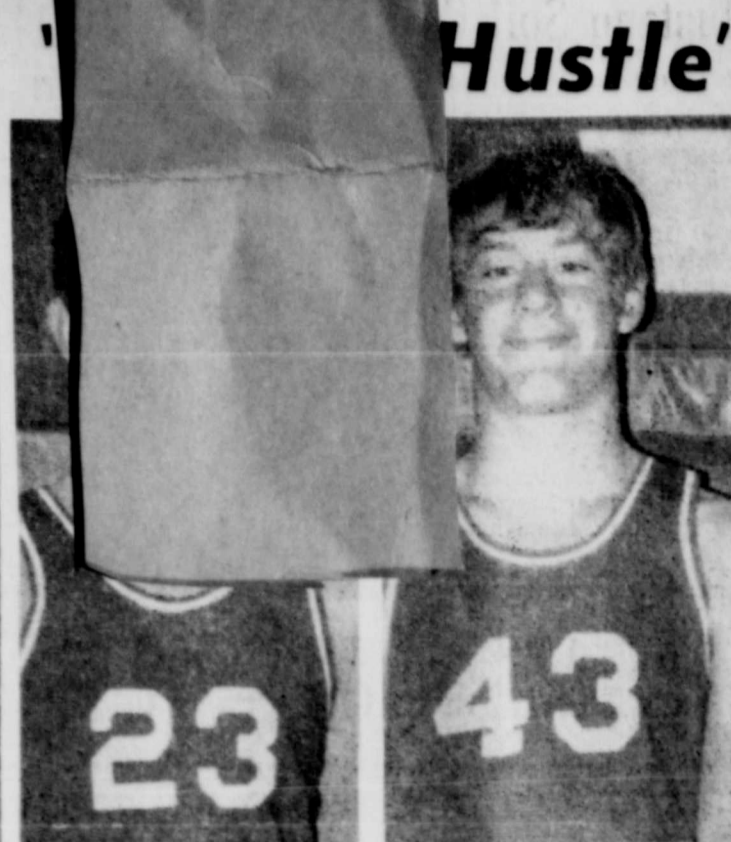
Chem. Conference At KoKo Palace

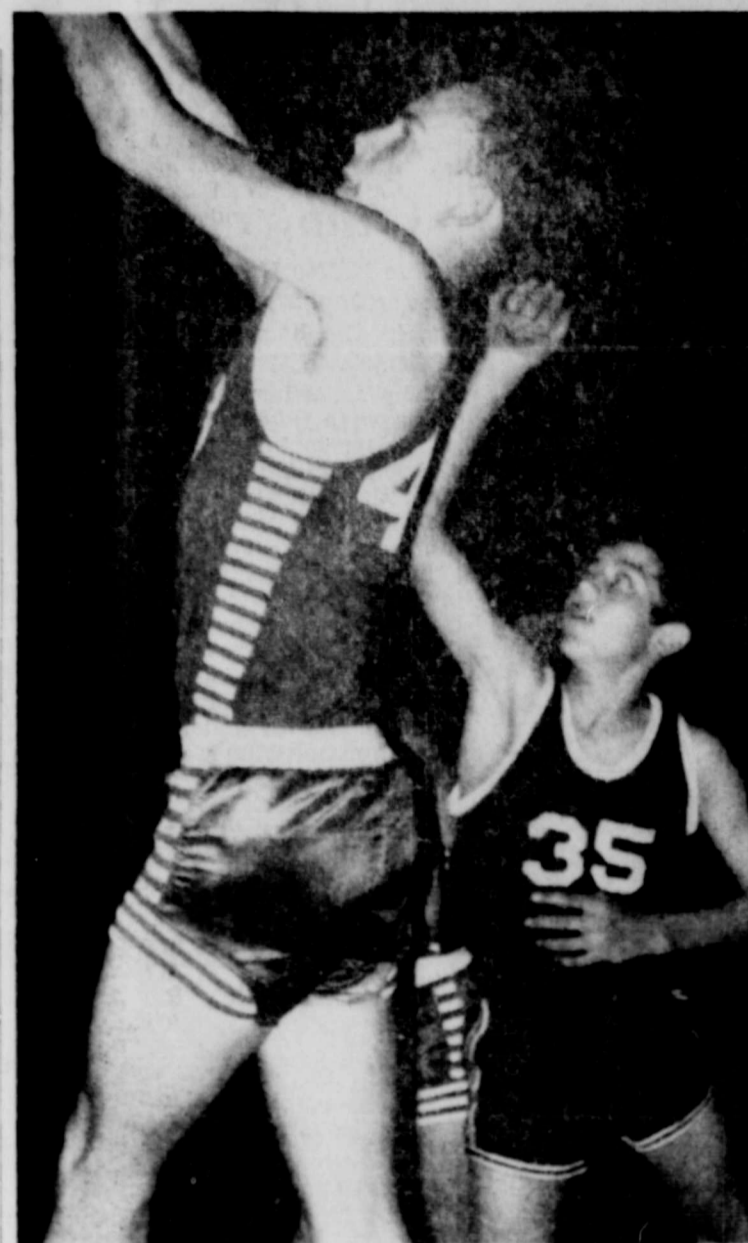

Mustang Soil Conservation News

A firebreak may mean the difference between profit and loss reports the Soil Conservation Service. The rangeland is extremely dry and is a fire hazard.

A good firebreak can protect fence lines and keep a range-fire located in a given area. The firebreak is nothing more than a strip of bare land or fire retarding vegetation. A firebreak can be made by plowing a strip of land around the fences and dividing the pastures. Any farm tractor and a plow that will destroy the vegetation can be used to

make an effective firebreak.

This is a good time for ranchers to check their rangeland and adjust their stocking rate to avoid overgrazing. Some rangeland is being overgrazed and will not make efficient growth this spring. Over-used plants cannot produce a deep root system that is necessary for large top growth. Overgrazed plants are also more susceptible to freeze kill during the winter months. A plant is considered properly used when it is grazed no closer than 50 per cent of the normal season's growth.

More and more area farmers are applying cotton burrs as a mulch on their cotton land. This growing practice will benefit not only the farmers but everyone living in the area by protecting the land from blowing. Mulching will not only add much needed organic matter to the sandy

soils, but will also hold a lot of moisture for next year's crop. In fact, a one inch rain falling on 160 acres is 4.34 million gallons of water. Load burrs on irrigated land is considered the same as a soil improving crop. A one inch rain doesn't sound like a lot of water. But it is. In fact, a one inch rain falling on 160 acres is 4.34 million gallons of water. Load that amount into railroad tank cars and the train would be 3.3 miles long, not including the engines.

Former Martin County Resident Killed In Gas Plant Explosion

PYOTE — One man was killed and two others injured Friday afternoon in an explosion of a tank the men were cleaning at a gas processing plant south of here.

Funeral services for Verlon Brewer, 50, who lived in Odessa until about a month ago when he moved to Fort Stockton, were held at 10 a. m. Monday at Vine Avenue Baptist Church in Odessa.

Interment was in Sunset Memorial Gardens, Odessa, under direction of Hubbard-Kelly Funeral Home of Odessa.

Ronald T. Speer, 24, of Pyote remained in critical condition Saturday in the intensive care unit at Medical Center Hospital in Odessa. He and Brewer each received severe burns and leg injuries.

The dead man's son, Billy W. Brewer, 23, of Odessa, received minor injuries and was treated at Medical Center and released, hospital authorities said. The three men were em-

ployes of Perry Gas Processors of Odessa and were cleaning tall slender tanks at the firms plant when the accident occurred.

A spokesman for the Ward County Sheriff's Department said there apparently was still gas in the tank when the men began working on it, but an investigation has failed to determine what ignited the gas, he said.

The three victims were taken to Odessa by Monahans ambulances and Brewer died in the intensive care unit almost immediately after being admitted, about two hours after the explosion.

Verlon Brewer was born in Montague County and moved to Odessa about 1953. He worked for Sival's Tank Inc. until four or five years ago, when he joined Perry Gas Processors.

Survivors include his wife, Melba of the family home; two daughters, Mrs. Carl Fisher of Garland and Mrs. Rodney Casey of Odessa; two sons, Billy and Les Brewer both of Odessa; a brother, Alvis Brewer of Odessa; a sister, Mrs. H. N. Green of Odessa; and six grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Brewer both are former residents of Martin County, having been raised here. They attended school here. They moved to Odessa in 1952. Mr. Brewer had two brothers, Loyd and Garland who preceded him in death. Garland was a long time County Treasurer of Martin County.

Veterans News

From the Office of Martin L. Gibson Veterans Service Officer Martin County

Increases in Dependents Indemnity (DIC) and veterans pensions will amount to \$11,952,000 in the State of Texas, according to the VA Regional Office in Waco, Texas.

Additional payments under the new law signed by President Nixon last month will be received in monthly checks starting February 1, 1972.

Widows rates under DIC go up 10 per cent while children eligible for these payments will get 5 per cent more and parents 6.5 additional. In Texas DIC payment total increase is \$4,529,000.

DIC is payable to survivors when (1) a military service member dies on active duty, and (2) when an ex-serviceman or retiree dies of a service connected disability.

In addition, the legislation signed by President Nixon provided for a 6.5 per cent cost of living increase for 2.2 million U. S. veterans, widows and children who draw VA benefits based on death or disability of veterans for non-service-connected causes.

This cost of living increase will amount to \$7,323,000 for Texas eligibles, said Martin Gibson.
