'New' School Board Starts Work Monday

Council Eyes Budget Needs

Discussion of proposed municipal employe salary schedules and other items to be included in the new City

of Stanton budget launched new terms of councilmen and Mayor J. C. Epley at a meeting Tuesday night.

Burial Conducted For Mrs. Houston, Pioneer Resident

Mrs. Susan Harriett Houston, 96, one of the early settlers of Martin County, died Tuesday, April 4, in the Stanton hospital following a lengthy illness.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the First United Methodist Church in Stanton with the Rev. Floyd Dunn, pastor, officiating. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery directed by the Gilbreath Funeral Home.

Mrs. Houston was born Sept. 10, 1875, in Hays County. She came to Martin County in 1887 from Mitchell County and married Calvin Monroe Houston Dec. 7, 1893, at Stanton. He died Feb. 13, 1952.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Inez Woody of Stanton; three grandchildren, J. N. Woody Jr. and Houston Woody, both of Stanton, and Johnal Woody of Odessa, and seven great-grandchildren.

Members of the council, in addition to those elected Saturday, are Cecil Bridges and F. O. Roads, who both are in their second terms.

The National Safety Council announced recently that Cap Rock Electric Cooperative, Stanton, Texas, has been presented the Council's Certificate of Commendation for its excellent safety record.

The award is presented only where an establishment's record satisfied rigid requirements laid down in the Council's Award Plan for recognizing good industrial safety records.

Howard Pyle, President of the National Safety Council, Chicago, explained that Cap Rock Electric Cooperative qualified for the award because of its injury-free period of 260,446 man-hours from March 10, 1969 to December 31, 1971.

Municipal, Trustee Election Winners Take Their Seats

A "new" Stanton school board will be organized next Monday night as Tommy Newman and Billy Mims are sworn in and new board officers are selected following the trustee election last Saturday.

Newman and Mims won the election by substantial margins, although some voters here apparently did not take seriously the non-candidacy statements of incumbents George Glynn and Dwain Henson.

Also elected Saturday in the City of Stanton election were city councilmen Howard Jenkins, Floyd McArthur and Billy Coggins.

The elections went this way: For school board, Place 1, Newman drew 212 votes to unseat Henson, who got 119.

And in Place 2, Mims polled 211 to top board president Glynn's 122.

Both Henson and Glynn had withdrawn from the race — after the ballots were printed and absentee voting commenced — the wake of the recent second-time defeat of a \$12 million school bond issue proposal.

There were 345 votes cast in the school election, 54 of them absentees — indicating the incumbents had some support Saturday despite withdrawal.

Meanwhile, Douglas Church defeated Buddy Norville by count of 188 to 67 to win the Stanton seat on the Martin County school board, replacing Pete Morrison, who was not a candidate. Elsewhere in the county, Lloyd Wiggins won uncontested election to the county board to replace non-candidate Joe Mullins.

In the City of Stanton election, which drew 151 voters in a somewhat heavier-than-usual turnout, incumbent (Continued On Page 2)

Grady Voters Re-Elect Three Incumbents

GRADY — A poor voter turnout in this Independent School District board of trustees election was reported Saturday, however, enough votes were cast to return three incumbents back to office for three-year terms.

Most votes were cast for Bruce Key, as he captured 18. Newell Tate placed second with a total of 17 votes, while H. D. Howard was returned to office on a count of 12.

Voters made two write-in suggestions, one for Coy Welch and one for Myrl Mitchell. Absentee votes only stood at one this year, bringing the entire vote total to just 21.

The GISD board of trustees is composed of seven members.

Trustees Get New Terms At Flower Grove

FLOWER GROVE — Incumbents Vernon Holcomb and Daniel Cave were re-elected here Saturday.

Cave led the ballot with 30 votes, while Holcomb polled 28.

Challenger Ralph Williams 18 votes was not enough to unseat either of the incumbents.

State Looking For Turkey Hunters

AUSTIN—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is looking for turkey hunters.

Department officials say they are still short of applicants for the free turkey hunt on the Kerr Wildlife Management Area in Kerr County April 22-29. Names of 80 hunters will be drawn April 6. Deadline for applications is 5 p.m. April 3.

Successful applicants will be issued permits for a two-day hunt, and a limit of one gobbler per hunter will be in effect.

The spring hunt on the Kerr area is part of the department's continuing research program, and it is not necessarily indicative of a high turkey population on the area.

In addition to the Kerr hunt, a nine-day spring turkey season has been set for April 22-30 in 36 Texas counties this year. The one-gobbler limit also is in effect for these counties.

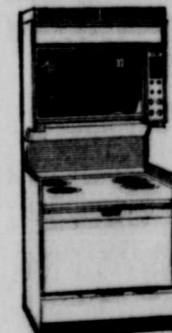

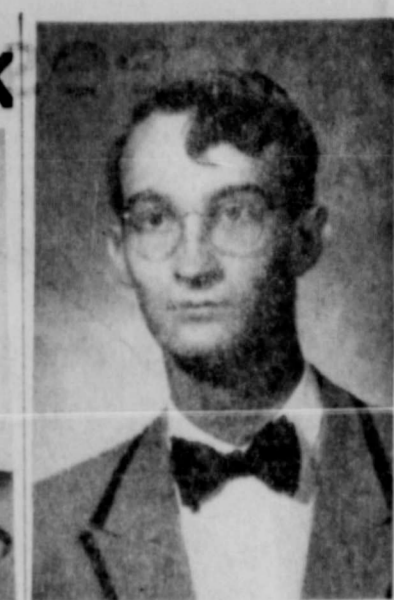

An Open Letter To The People Of Texas

Dear Voter:

I'm a candidate for attorney general of Texas because I believe it's time for a change in the office.

Crawford Martin is seeking a fourth term. It's the first time in the history of Texas an attorney general is running for a fourth term. Campaigns should be run on the issues and I don't like to inject personalities and personal relationships into a political campaign. But, the relationship between Frank Sharp and Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin cannot be swept under the rug.

The new book about the Texas stock fraud scandal, "Texas Under a Cloud," tells about that relationship. On page 128 the book says: "Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin... got some free newspaper publicity when it was revealed in October, 1971, that he received a 'stock tip' from Frank Sharp — while Martin and his family were Sharp's ranch guests late in 1969 and again at Sharp's Houston office early in 1970."

Sharp was trying personally to sell National Bank Life stock to Martin, although the attorney general said that Sharp never mentioned the possibility of Sharpstown Bank loans to buy the stock. "Martin said that he turned the stock offer down because it would have cost too much, because NBL was in 'shaky' condition, and because he did not buy 'speculative' stocks."

"He did not comment on the ethical aspects of a state official's accepting a stock tip of that sort — perhaps, because Martin, as attorney general, had ruled in favor of Sharp on a key legal issue about Sharpstown State Bank only two and one half years before Sharp made the stock offer to Martin."

"Martin's ruling had the effect of increasing the bank's capitalization dramatically and thus its ability to make large loans, ultimately giving Sharp the financial resources he used in the manipulations charged by the SEC."

"As you know, hundreds of Texans lost their life savings because of Sharp's stock manipulations and it probably wouldn't have happened but for Atty. Gen. Martin's legal opinion."

"Don't you agree, it's time for a change in the office of attorney general of Texas?"

"Just so you'll know what you'd be changing to, I'd like to tell you a little about John Hill. I'm a native Texan, grew up in Wink and Kilgore, was national debate champion at Kilgore Junior College and graduated from the University of Texas Law School. I served in the Navy during World War II, practiced law (much of the time in courtrooms) in Houston, and was secretary of state from 1966 to 1968."

"I certainly would appreciate your support."

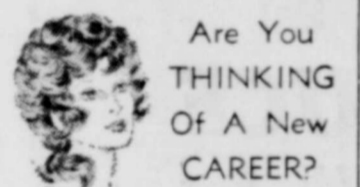

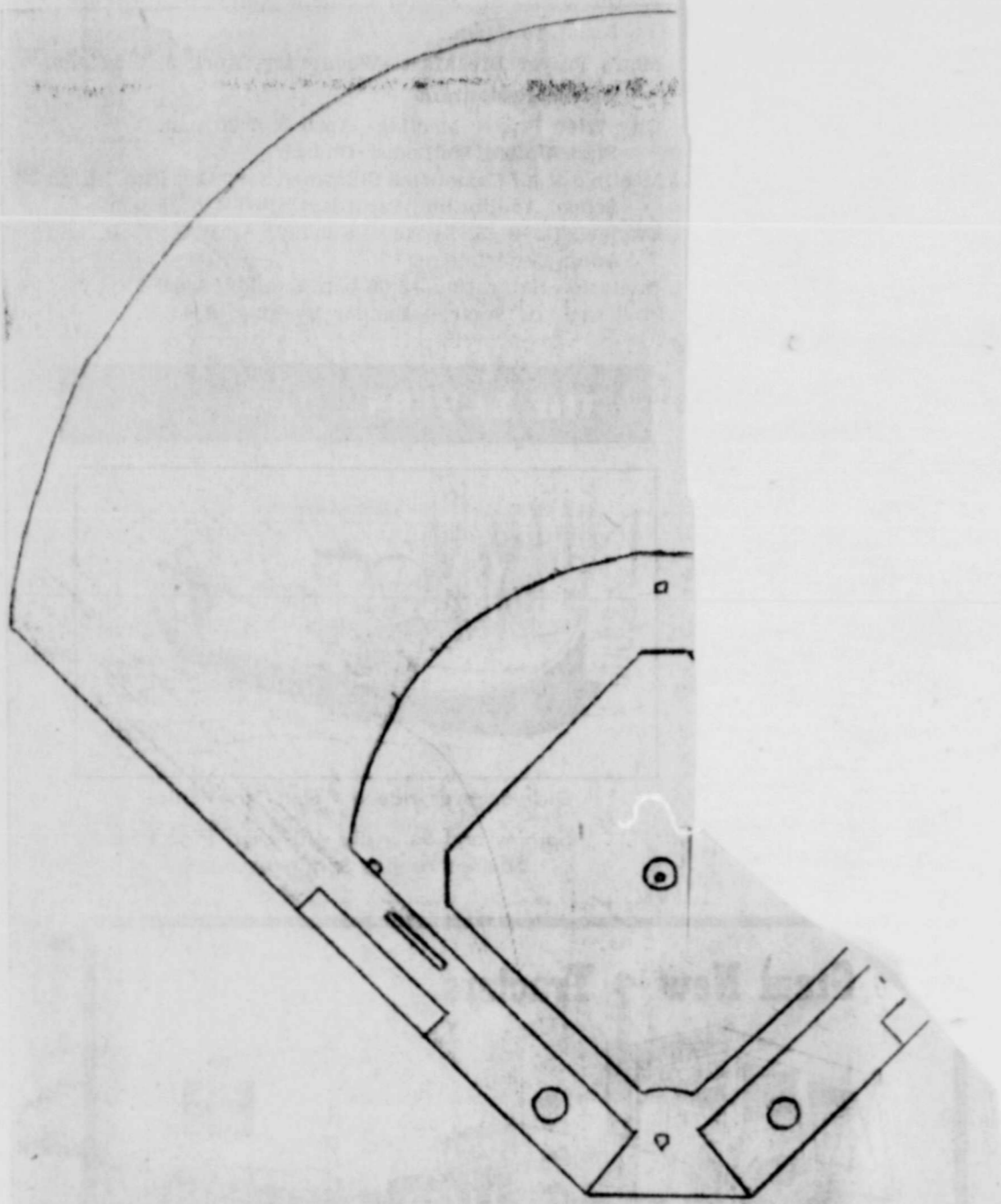
