The month of November has been designated "Texas Food and Fiber Month." Purpose of the month-long observance is to promote appreciation for the abundance of food and fiber that is provided for our population by the farmers and ranchers and others in the agri-business industry.

It is a tribute that is well deserved. The fantastic productivity of our agricultural plant has given us a plentiful supply of a wide variety of wholesome, quality foods at reasonable prices.

Because of agriculture's efficiency, all of us live better for less. One farm worker today produces enough food and other farm products for himself and 48 others. Only about 16 per cent of our disposable income is spent for food. This compares with about 30 per cent in Western Europe and more than 50 per cent in Russia.

Texas agriculture is a huge consumer as well as producer. Production of items used in growing crops and livestock creates a lot of off-farm jobs. Over \$21 billion is invested in improvements related to agricultural production.

It is well that we pause during the Thanksgiving season to reflect on the importance of agriculture to our daily lives.

From our tabulation and last year's newspaper story indicate a fine turnout at the Martin County Capon Show last Saturday. Last year there were 135 birds reported entered compared to 115 for this year. But with a decrease in birds an increase in sales was noted. Last year \$2,471 was netted to \$2,874 bid on the 1972 bird show.

We have been asked to inform everyone that they may pick up their Capon anytime Saturday, Nov. 11, at Bill's Friendly Food Store.

In the October 26 issue of The Stanton Reporter, I made a comment about everyone being well informed as to the weather, and that I wouldn't. A letter received last week prompts us to reconsider talking about weather conditions each week. We appreciate hearing what we might include in The Stanton Reporter to better inform anyone reading it.

Martin Picks Nixon, Tower, Briscoe

Balloting Follows State-Wide Trends; Some Write-Ins Added

Martin County voters turned in some 1,223 ballots unofficially Tuesday, to pick their choice in the presidential race, statewide races, and although local races were uncontested, write-in votes were polled to cause excitement in the Commissioners Precinct 3.

Eldon A. Welch, incumbent for Commissioner, Precinct No. 3, polled 95 votes. Write-in voters shelled some 42 ballots for Neil McMorris, and Van Glaz received 27 write-ins.

Absentee balloting counted 101, to nearly double any previous absentee count, it was noted Tuesday night.

Martin County picked Nixon over McGovern, 935-287,

for no contest. In the Senate race Tower over Sanders, 695-524. Amaya counted 13.

The governor's race saw Briscoe outpoll Grover, 695-Lieutenant Governor's race 503. Muniz picked up 38. There was no contest for Hobby over Canales, 928-18.

In the Attorney-General race, Hill carried Martin County over Kincaid, 951-1. Calvert polled 943 to Springer's 5 in the contest for Comptroller.

In one count that resembled a race, James received 715 votes to Angley's 473. Soils netted 23, for the State Treasurer's job.

costs of gasoline and were to consider obtaining a tank and purchasing gas on the wholesale basis.

A request had been made to open up a street to the cemetery near the old Catholic nunnery. It was decided to have the property surveyed for the correct property lines.

A Mr. Mahoney with a cable service in Big Spring appeared requesting to be on the next month's agenda. Mayor Epley said he would be. Mr. Mahoney stated his company had been surveying Stanton recently and had decided a cable TV service was needed for Stanton. He will appear next month to discuss the possibility of a franchise with the city.

City Hall then was filled with some 12 members of the Stanton Jaycees and interested citizens, 3 members of the Missouri-Pacific Railroad, that met with the council to discuss improving the safety factor at the crossings in

Kathleen Lewis ran unopposed on the ballot for the unexpired term of County Treasurer, and netted 1,047 votes. A host of single write-in ballots named Ruth Lewis, Tommy Hursch, Jess Miles, Mrs. Flanagan, Bobby Snodgrass and Kathryn Stewart.

Troy Bradshaw, Commissioner, precinct No. 1, unopposed, counted 518 votes.

Jimmy Wheeler received a ballot for State Representative.

In the local races, Sheriff Dan Saunders placed the largest number of votes. All counts were unofficial, ballots will be canvassed some time early next week.

Martin County voters obviously felt negative when they voted on the Amendments Tuesday in the General Election. Of 14 Amendments, only 5 carried in Martin County.

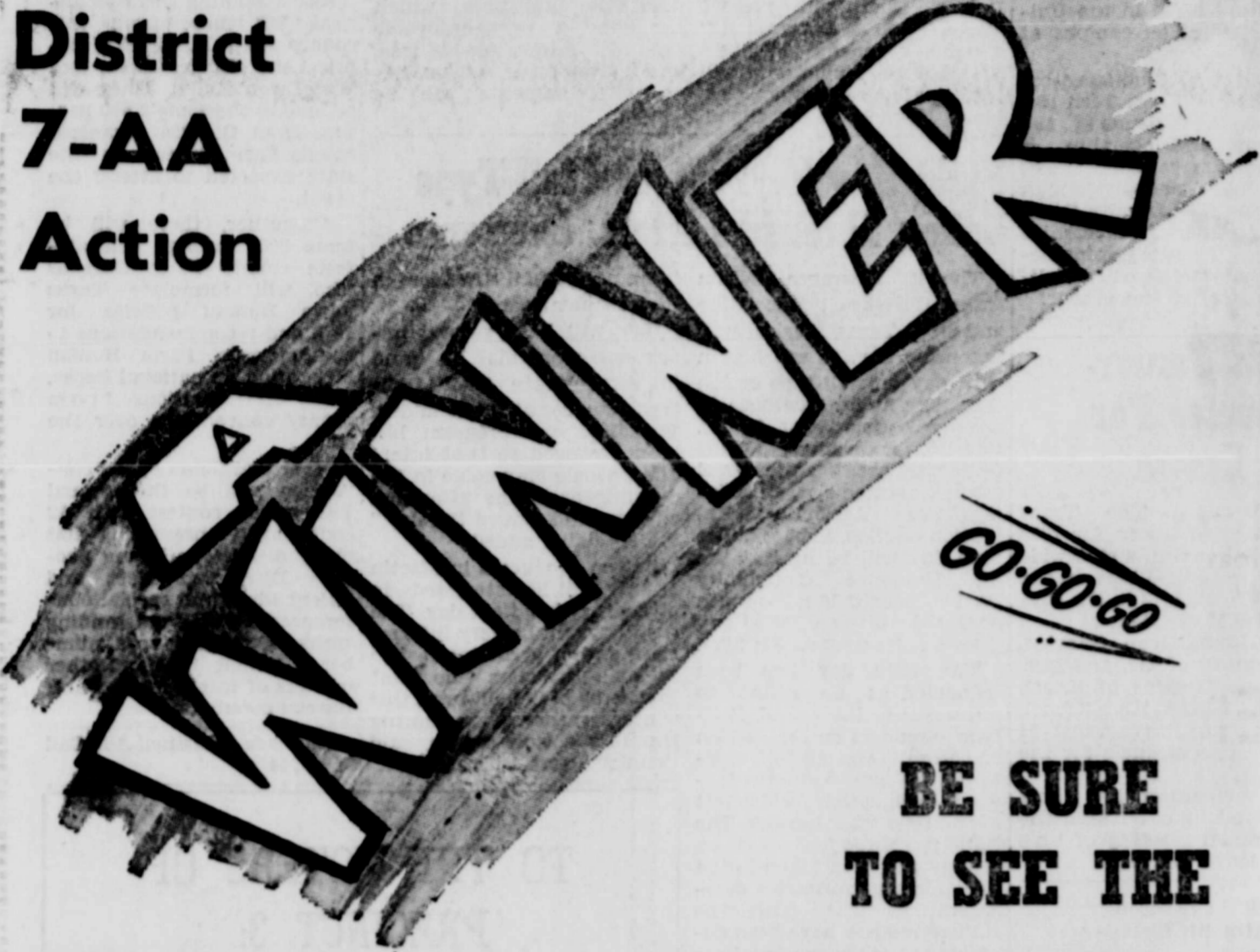

ed the Buffs back 15 for 1st and 25 at the 45 yard line. Dillard grabbed a deflected pass for 6, but 2 incomplete passes stalled this Buff drive. McCamey's ball after touchback on 20 and again the Buffalo defense was fired up and hard tackling stopped the Badgers.

Perryman kicked and the ball was touched in mid-air by a Badger and Paul McCalister scooped it up on the bounce and showed some fancy footwork combined with speed and found the end zone 60 yards later for the Buffaloes' second TD. Point after attempt was no good. Stanton led 13-0 with 1:05 remaining.

The Badgers came back on the kickoff by Vernon Brown to their 43. Stephens combin-

ed Perryman's running and passing to Leland Bolen to march downfield. Perryman burst through for a 25 yard scoring run with 5 seconds left in the half. McMeans blocked the extra point attempt.

The second half saw Stanton run out of downs on their 1st possession. McCamey cranked up a drive to the 7 yard line when on a 4th and 1 to go, the ball popped loose and Vernon Brown recovered for Stanton.

The Buffs via a penalty were in business at the 20. Eight plays later Stanton ran out of downs at the 48 and kicked to McCamey's 25. A rock hard defense by Stanton shut the Badger offense down again and a short kick was taken at the 43 of McCamey.

This series by the Buffs carried over into the 4th period. Irvin, Rios, and Howard set up a 14 yard burst by McMeans for the third TD and Wilson added the point after.

McCamey went to the airways and the Buffs intercepted a Stephens pass to cancel out their drive. The Buffs were point hungry and went to stretch their lead, driving all the way to the 4 yard line where an official called an unrecovered fumble dead, then gave it to the Badgers.

Field Day To Feature Flail-Type Cotton Shredders At St. Lawrence

The St. Lawrence Cotton Insect Control Association and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will host a field day on flail-type cotton shredders at St. Lawrence in Glascock County at 9 a.m. Nov. 15, according to Roy Childers, area agricultural engineer-cotton mechanization, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Lubbock.

The field day will be held at the St. Lawrence Community Center, located 10 miles south of Garden City on FM 33 and then 5 miles west on FM 2874.

The field day has been scheduled as an effort to demonstrate the use of flail-type shredders on destruction of cotton stalks and of overwintering pink bollworm larvae in seen cotton residue left in the field after harvest. The flail-type shredders will be on display and then taken to the field for a performance demonstration. The flail-type stalk shredders have been superior to the conventional rotary-type shredders on destruction of overwintering pink bollworms left in the field after harvest.

Cotton producers have not utilized flail shredders in the past because of initial cost, maintenance, and operation cost time required to shred an acre of stalks, etc. However, implement companies have made many improvements on operation and performance of flail shredders in the past few years.

"We will have several implement companies on hand to demonstrate their flail-type shredder at the field day. The field day program has been arranged so that interested people may come in the morning or in the afternoon or come and spend the day," the specialist added.

Cotton producers in Martin County will be interested in attending this field day. The field day will be very informative and of great interest to cotton producers who want to destroy pink bollworms this winter, rather than during the 1973 cotton season, said County Agent Billy Reagor.

town. Meeting prompted after recent collision that took the lives of two people.

The representatives of Mo-Pac stated the high cost of flashing lights (\$12-\$15,000), which would be borne by the city mainly. They noted the 50 m.p.h. speed limit is observed by the railroad since no ordinance regulates them.

The railroad reps said that slowing the trains down would not improve safety in their opinion. However it was noted that nearly all other towns have ordinances slowing them down. They recommended the installation of stop signs at both sides of a crossing and seeing that a \$25.00 fine be enforced as a deterrent of keeping people aware of the danger when crossing RR tracks.

The trains do whistle at crossings and one notes when a train enters Stanton that it is a continuous whistle through town. The group held a lengthy discussion that seemed to come back to the stop sign idea.

After representatives of Mo-Pac left, the Jaycees assembled before the council once again and tabled five recommendations. They are: (1) Slow trains down to 30-35 m.p.h.; (2) Close all but 3 crossings; (3) Install stop signs on rest; (4) Enforce a \$25.00 fine for failure to obey; (5) Repair right-of-way at crossings to afford better view of oncoming trains.

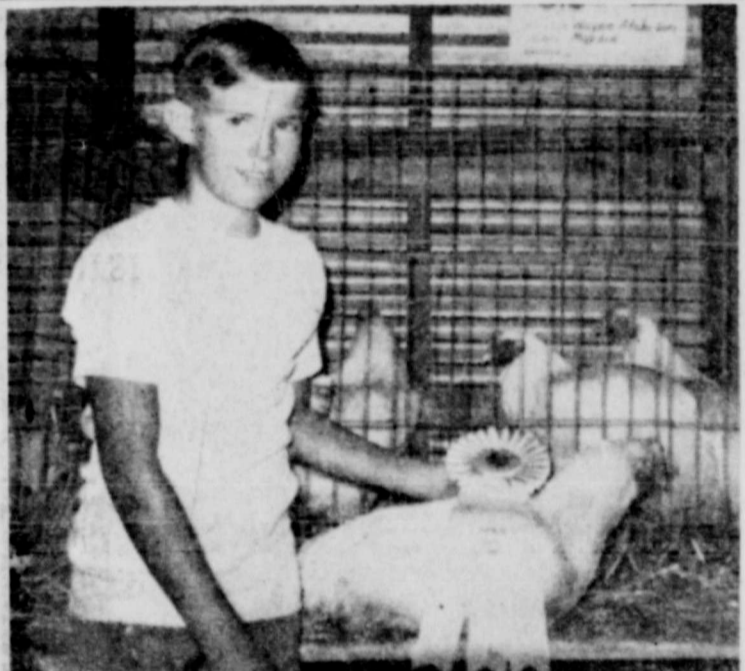
