WTTTC SCHEDULES \$2.5 MILLION EXPENDITURE IN YEAR 1971

Scheduled expenditures totaling almost \$2.5 million for new construction in 1971 were announced today by officials of West Texas Telephone Co. Local representative Harvey Womack made the announcement and pointed out some of the specific projects, costing more than \$125,000, planned for Baird and the surrounding area.

About 12 miles of new underground cable will be placed south of Baird along Highway 283 in that exchange, and the old aerial wire removed. The new cable will provide facilities to upgrade 26 customers from 8 and 10 party to 4 party service, and connect at least 4 new customers. Also in Baird, new cable placed west on 3rd Street will serve a housing subdivision and allow all the old wire to be removed.

In the Moran exchange, new cable placed along Farm-Market Road 2408 to the northeast will provide facilities to upgrade 30 customers from 8 party to 4 party service, and allow connection of 2 new subscribers. A 3-mile extension of buried cable north of Moran will replace inadequate aerial wire in that area.

East of Baird in the Putnam exchange, 86,000 feet of underground cable will be installed to the north toward Moran. This buried cable will upgrade 40 rural 8 and 10 party customers to 4 party service, and make service available for about 10 new customers. Completion of this job will cost almost \$63,000. An addition 100 lines to be installed in the Trent exchange was of Abilene, will provide facilities for service improvements

and future growth in that area.

Major improvements representing an additional investment of \$102,000 are planned by the Texas Telephone & Telegraph Company for its Rising Star and May exchanges. Texas Telephone & Telegraph Co., like West Texas Telephone Co., is a member company of the Continental Telephone System.

Work scheduled for the first quarter of 1971 in the Rising Star and May exchanges includes new underground cable to be placed along Highway 183. Placement will be completed in conjunction with a state highway widening project. This cable will upgrade existing 8 and 10 party customers in the area to 4 party service and provide facilities for future growth. Another project, planned for the second quarter, will provide an additional 16,000 feet of new aerial wire to replace existing facilities in the area. The new higher capacity cable will allow upgrading about 65 customers from crowded multi-party lines to 4 party service and connect 10 new customers.

Womack said that the removal of damaged and inadequate cable, and the addition of new aerial and underground facilities, would improve existing service and prepare the company to meet service demands brought on by future growth in the area. "These large expenditures, especially at a time when the cost of borrowed capital is so high," Womack added, "furnish evidence of the Continental System's desire to provide the kind of dependable telephone service our customers want and expect."

Baird Students Participate In Cisco Band Festival

CISCO — Students from area Junior High schools met in Cisco Saturday to try for places in the West Central Texas Junior High All-District Band. Approximately 400 young bandsmen from schools in the area competed for places in the 92-member honor band.

The meeting began at 3:30 a. m. Saturday morning, with try-outs scheduled until noon. Students making the band rehearsals from 1 to 5 p. m., and presented a concert at 7:30 p. m. The activities took place at the Cisco High School.

Paul Strickland of Baird, a trumpet player, was the 1 member of the Baird group that won a place in the honor band.

Clyde won the honor of placing the most students in the band, placing 23 members.

Schools participating in the event were Cisco, Brownwood, Ranger, Cross Plains, Hico, De Leon, Baird, Granbury, Eastland, Dublin, Clyde, Stephenville and Comanche.

MINIMUM WATER RATE TO BE INCREASED, SANITATION CHARGES TO BE DROPPED MAR. 18

BAIRD — A new ordinance, setting up new water rates and dispensing with sanitation charges has been approved by the City Council of the City of Baird, and will go into effect March 18, 1971.

For the past several years, the sanitation department has lost considerable money, this year the income from sanitary hauling was \$7,111.68, with expenses at \$11,469.60, or a loss of \$4,357.92 for the year.

The water rates will now include hauling for everyone in the City Limits, and will now include quite a few that did not use the sanitary hauling service.

The new regulations are as follows:

There shall be charged and collected from each occupied residence, including apartments and trailer houses, a monthly minimum water charge of \$3.00 for 4000 gallons of water and there will be no sanitary hauling charge.

Water Meters that serve multiple residences with water will be charged and additional \$1.00 per residence or occupancy, whether it be an extra house, apartment or trailer house, etc., with no sanitation charges to said residences.

Commercial monthly minimum water for all business houses will be \$4.50 for 4000 gallons, except small businesses such as barber shops and dental offices, will be charged a monthly minimum water charge of \$3.00 for 4000 gallons, and hos-

pital, nursing home, cafes, grocery stores and school will be charged a monthly minimum water charge of \$5.00 for 4000 gallons of water and there will be no sanitation charges.

Addition water charges for all over 4000 gallons will remain the same as originally charged:

35c per 1000 for next 3000 gallons.

25c per 1000 for next 3000 gallons.

25c per 1000 for all over 10,000 gallons.

For Water Meters outside the Baird City Limits, a minimum charge of \$4.00 per month for 4000 gallons will be charged.

Existing sanitation hauling rules are as follows and must be observed if hauling is desired:

1. One or more galvanized metal garbage cans, not to exceed 32 gallons, with lid, must be provided.

2. All wet garbage shall be wrapped in paper before being placed in container.

3. It is not necessary to burn your trash - but if you do, burn in separate barrel. However, no burning is allowed in Fire Zone.

4. All garbage cans must be at alleys where easily accessible. In blocks where alleys do not exist, the cans must be at the curb in front or at the side, as the case may be.

5. Grass cuttings will be picked up if placed in container without dirt.

6. Small tree limbs, etc., will

be picked up provided they are stacked near the can and cut in lengths not to exceed 3 feet.

7. Reasonable size rocks will be hauled if they are stacked near the can.

8. Large tree limbs, lumber and miscellaneous debris will be hauled when requested, but additional charges will be made according to the size of the load.

9. Two pickups per week will be made at residences, when weather permits.

10. For Commercial customers, three pickups will be made each week.

11. For grocery stores, hospital, nursing home, schools and cafes, daily pickups will be made, except Sundays and holidays.

AUSTIN — Contracts for highway construction in the Abilene district have been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer J. C. Roberts, and will be in Callahan, Howard, Scurry, Mitchell, Nolan, Fisher, Shackelford, Stonewall, Jones, Haskell and Kent Counties.

Strain Brothers Inc., of San Angelo was awarded a contract for asphalt stabilized base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement on 12.7 miles of State Highway 36 in Callahan County. Low bid was \$657,117.46.

The project extends from US 263 to 10.0 miles southeast and from Cross Plains east to the

Eastland County line. C. W. Westbrooks of Abilene is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 90 working days.

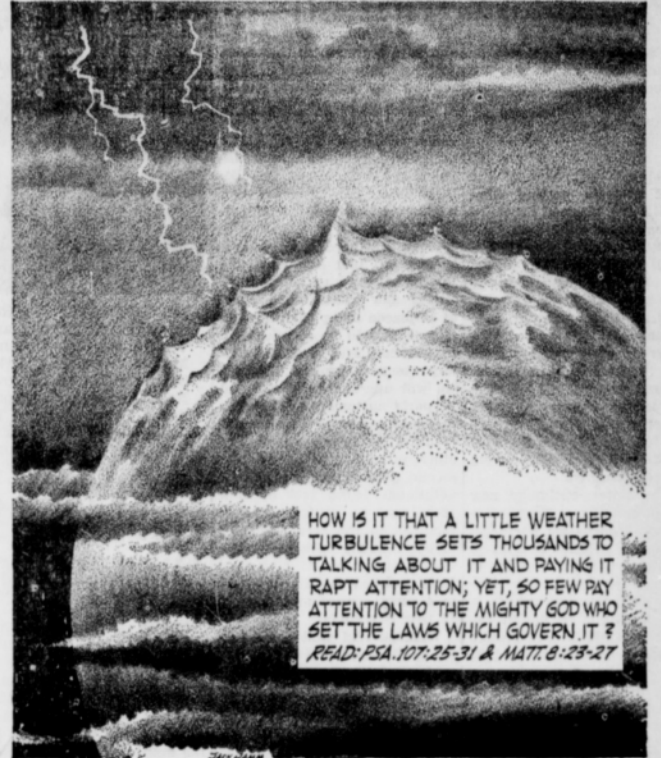

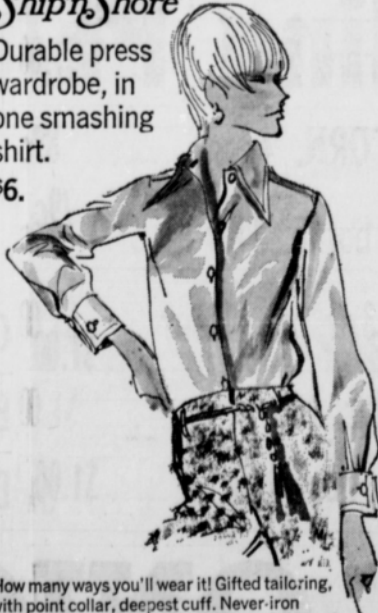

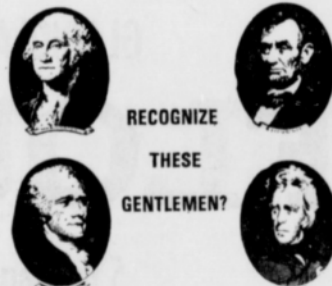

AN ORDINANCE RAISING THE WATER MINIMUM RATE AND DROPPING SANITATION HAULING CHARGES AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the expense of the Sanitation Hauling in the City of Baird, Texas, has in the past been much greater than the income, and

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Baird desires to reduce the overall expense of the Sanitation Hauling by increasing the water minimum rate and using the increase to help finance the expense of Sanitation Hauling

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD, TEXAS,

1. That there shall be charged and collected from each occupied residence, including apartments and trailer houses, a monthly minimum water charge of \$3.00 for the first 4000 gallons of water and there will be no sanitation hauling charge. Two pickups per week will be made when weather permits.

2. Commercial monthly minimum water charge for all business houses will be \$4.50 for first 4000 gallons of water, except small businesses such as offices, barber shops and dental offices, etc., will be charged a monthly minimum water charge of \$3.00 for first 4000 gallons, and hospitals, nursing homes, cafes, school and grocery stores will be charged a monthly minimum water charge of \$5.00 for first 4000 gallons of water and there will be no sanitation hauling charges.

To regular commercial customers there will be pickups three times per week and for the hospital, nursing homes, cafes, school, and grocery stores there will be daily pickups, except Sunday and holidays.

Water Meters that serve multiple residences with water, will be charged an additional \$1.00 per residence or occupancy whether it be an extra house, apartment or trailer house, etc., with no sanitation charges at said residences.

Additional water charges for all over 4000 gallons will remain the same as originally charged. Water Meters outside the City Limits of Baird shall be charged \$4.00 for the monthly minimum of 4000 gallons

The fact that the need for additional funds for sanitation hauling is urgent and creates an imperative public necessity that the rule requiring the reading of ordinances at more than one session or meeting of the City Council be suspended, and such rule is hereby suspended by the emergency aforesaid, and it is accordingly ordered this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force immediately after its adoption, approval
