AUSTIN — Oliver D. Worthy and R. V. Cunningham have asked the Texas Water Rights Commission for a permit to 185 acre-feet of water a year for irrigation, from a Soil Conservation Service flood retardation reservoir on a tributary of Turkey Creek, in Callahan County.

A hearing by the commission has been scheduled for March 23, at 10 a. m. on the application. The water would be used to irrigate several tracts of land.

FEBRUARY 20-27 IS FUTURE FARMERS WEEK IN TEXAS

The Future Farmers of America organization is in its 42nd year in Texas. There are over 50,000 members studying vocational agriculture in 940 high schools in Texas. In these vocational agriculture classes, students are provided an opportunity to secure technical and scientific training in all phases of agriculture as well as to receive training in leadership, citizenship and cooperation.

Texas membership has grown from 28,643 in 1950 to over 50,000 in 1970. In a study conducted by J. A. Marshall, State Director of Vocational Agriculture, it was found that over sixty percent of the vocational agriculture students who graduate from high school and are available for employment are employed in full-time farming or in agricultural related occupations.

The FFA support and supplements training for those involved in production agriculture as well as those processing and distributing agricultural products. Many people are employed in agricultural occupations such as engineers, scientists, management personnel, sales

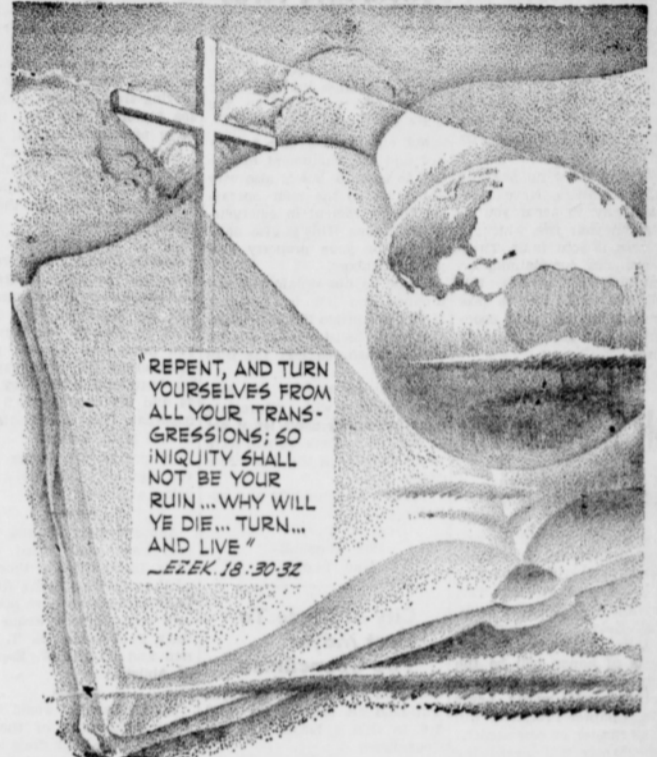

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)
Special Election May 18, 1971.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)
Special Election May 18, 1971.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: "(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; "(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; "(3) Needy blind persons; "(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children." The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate. "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes. In accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. "Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

AUSTIN — Legislators have cleared major emergency finance hurdles and are moving to other fronts to hold down the size of the tax bill.

A \$34.9 million appropriation bill to avert reduction in aid to needy families with dependent children passed both houses and went to Comptroller Robert S. Calvert for certification.

Before he would accept the bill, Calvert advised passage of another which would re-align priorities in the state's massive omnibus tax clearance fund. In effect, this would permit turning over to welfare some \$35 million that normally would go to the teacher retirement fund between April and August.

Teacher association and retirement fund leaders had no formal objection to the latter, although it would cost the retirement fund an estimated \$100,000 to \$600,000 in short-term interest. However, the fund will be repaid in full when the ultimate new tax bill goes into effect on September 1.

While these measures were moving methodically through the House and Senate, the House passed a bill to establish a \$185 million bond plan to finance construction of eight new college campuses. Bonds would be repaid from tuitions, and would cost taxpayers little. Final approval of the plan in the Senate would relieve the tax bill of a heavy load in order to build new institutions already authorized by the 1969 Legislature.

Still another potentially-important money bill won quick approval. It would require all cities and counties, population 10,000 and above, to report to the state all welfare spending for the medically needy. If federal officials will agree, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes proposes subsequent

legislation to require all these local funds be routed through the state treasury, where hopefully they would attract an extra \$100 million in two-to-one matching federal aid.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Preston Smith nominated Lester Clark of Breckenridge to succeed David E. Clemens of Mineral Wells on the Texas Water Quality Board.

Dr. Charles Max Cole of Dallas was named to succeed the late Dr. Noble Price of Lamesa on the State Board of Health.

J. Wonne Hand of Dallas, James M. Ray of Austin and Dr. Bobby Gene Smith of Arlington to the Crime and Narcotics Advisory Commission.

Edwin A. Flieller of Floresville to the San Antonio River Authority board of directors.

Warren Woodward of Dallas and Truett Smith of Wylie were selected Texas Industrial Commission vice chairman and secretary-treasurer.

"PEOPLE'S LOBBY" FORMS — A new liberal group - including representatives of labor, ethnic and environmental interests - has organized an "issues-oriented" people's lobby.

About 300 attended the organizational meeting. Former U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough and former U. S. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark were the main

speakers.

Congressman Bob Eckhardt of Houston was named temporary chairman and State Sens. Barbara Jordan of Houston and Joe Bernal of San Antonio, temporary vice-chairmen. Twelve steering committee members were chosen to work with them.

By a divided vote, the group decided to steer clear of candidate endorsements (although there was plenty of speculation at the meeting that Yarborough may run for governor in 1972) and concentrate on specific legislative goals.

COURTS SPEAK — Houston's Kirkwood Civic Club, which insures endorsement of deed restrictions and sponsors lawn beautification contests, is not exempt from the state franchise tax, says the State Supreme Court.

A letter terming a woman an "undesirable" renter (filed with an apartment association) was a privileged communication and not libelous, High Court ruled in another Harris County case.

Supreme Court dismissed for want of jurisdiction a San Antonio-Bexar County dispute over a cancelled incorporation election for "Hills and Dales Community" along Interstate 10.

Brownsville lawyer ordered disbarred by a district judge lost his appeal to the Supreme Court.

In a Cherokee County deed-interpretation case, High Court concluded that iron ore which can be produced only by surface destroying strip-mining is not a mineral.

Third Court of Civil Appeals held that Humble Oil & Refining Company is entitled to get back \$92,000 in taxes paid the state, plus interest, on oil and gas leases at Corpus Christi Naval Air Station.

Third Court agreed that Merton Independent School District had the right to annex Barnhart ISD.

FIRST BILL SIGNED — First bill of the legislative session - reopening voter registration through February - was signed into law by Governor Smith.

Voters who register this month cannot take part in elections before April 1. Those who registered before the close of the old deadline, in January, can vote by March 1.

Peanut Production Shortcourse To Be Held in Clyde - Cross Plains

BAIRD — A Peanut Production Shortcourse will be held at Cross Plains and Clyde on Feb. 22 and 23 for all peanut producers in Callahan County.

The meetings will be held at the Vocational Ag. Building at each location and will begin at 7:30 p. m. each night.

At Cross Plains on Monday night, Feb. 22, James Denton,

Area Farm Management Specialist and Dr. John Chapin, Area Agronomist will be the featured speakers. Topics to be covered include management, cultural practices, weed control, fertilization and harvesting techniques. These two speakers will also be at the Clyde Vocational Ag. Building on Tuesday night, Feb. 23 to cover the same topics.

Monday night, Feb. 22 at Clyde, Dr. Clifford Hoelscher, Area Entomologist, and Dr. Wendell Horne, Plant Pathologist will speak on insect and disease control. Both speakers will be at Cross Plains Tuesday night to close the shortcourse.

Producers are invited to attend one or both of these sessions being sponsored by the local County Extension office.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — In football the only sure way to break up a forward pass is to block the passer. Iran, one of the heaviest producers of opium has applied this tactics to dope peddler with what they say is maximum effects.

Poppy farmers in Iran are under Government supervision. The acreage devoted to poppy raising is allotted and all production is sold to the Iranian Government at a fixed price. As would be expected there is also a large amount grown outside that allowed. It is sold illegally at a higher price than that sold under regulation. The same situation exists in Turkey, where there is ever larger poppy production.

Poppies sold on the black market and crudely processed in clandestine plants in Iran and Turkey. The rough product is then taken to France where, again, its is illegally refined into heroin and other drugs for illicit sale, a large amount of which finds its market in the United States.

Our country's representatives have been in consultation with Turkey and Iran in efforts to curb the illicit traffic of drugs to this County. A subsidy to the farmers of both countries to reduce acreage has been considered, with the U. S. contributing.

In the meantime, we are discussing with France her responsibilities of taking action against dope refineries. It seems some headway has been made but certainly more needs to be done.

Iran itself has a narcotic problem and has recently invoked the death penalty against peddlers convicted of a second offense. Iranian officials say that since a number of peddlers have faced a firing squad, their drug problem has come under control.

The drug problem in this country is common knowledge. Even one addict is a problem to someone - himself and to

the family. Multiplied by two million or more - and no one really knows for sure - it becomes a crisis. To make the matter more sad and alarming is the fact that addiction has spread to grammar school children. This is known to be happening here in Washington and is declared to be the case in a number of our large cities.

Murder in the first degree, since about the beginning of time, has been the most serious offense under any kind of legal order. In this century the murder of the soul of a child might well be considered a more dastardly crime than the killing of the physical body of a man.

The dope addict not only becomes the victim of the drug seller but a menace to all society. A victim in the awful grip of addiction is under compulsion to satisfy his habit which may run to a cost of \$100 or more a day. As a result a huge percentage of the crimes of violence are committed to obtain money to buy drugs. Our Nation's Capitol is an appalling example.

Vast sums of money are being spent for the care and treatment of narcotic victims. The numbers continue to grow - the results in treatment appear doubtful.

This is not a dissertation on the moral question of the death penalty - a subject of many dimensions. It is, however, an issue currently debated in many State legislatures. Also debated is the distinction for punishment between the possession of narcotics by the user and the possession by the dope pusher. There is obviously a great difference if it can be identified.

The observation of President Thomas Jefferson might be appropriate when he noted that "the choice of two evils is often a necessity of political life." The most severe penalty on the dope peddler, as between the conversion of school children to drugs, is the lesser of evils. It is not a matter of the care of the criminal but rising to the defence of children.
