### Pointeau's effort called 'two fronts' as INS date nears

The Jack Pointeau family of Snyder, facing another deportation date Monday from the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), is working toward a second approach to remain in the U.S. while continuing to lobby for legislative changes which would make foreign investors like themselves "legal.

The Pointeaus, owners of the White Buffalo Motel here, have also gained additional support from U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm (D-Stamford), who filed a private bill on their behalf last year.

The head of the family, Jack Pointeau, says the effort is now on "two fronts," a struggle underway as the latest date for their ordered departure, June 26, is at hand.

Attorneys for the Pointeaus are now attempting to gain working visa status, called an H-1 card, for both Françoise Pointeau and her eldest daughter, Isabelle.

On a second "front," the French family has received renewed support from Stenholm, whose private bill filed on their behalf last September failed to receive support from the members of the subcommittee which deals with immigration legislation.

## **Paving** now set to start

### Clairemont Hwy. to take two years

A pre-construction hearing is scheduled Monday related to the \$3.3 million project to repave and widen the Clairemont Highway in north Scurry County.

Work is to begin in July and the job is expected to take up to two years to complete.

Contract for the work has been awarded to Ajax Construction out of Lufkin. Total bid cost was \$3,332,000

A completion date within 230 working days is set once the project begins.

Upon completion, the highway will gain an 8 ft. paved shoulder on each side.

This will make the roadway a total of 40 ft. wide, 12 ft. for each of two vehicle lanes plus the two 8 ft. shoulders.

Passing lanes will be added also for several of the hills along the route

The Ennis Creek bridge is to be rebuilt and widened also.

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## Unusual happenings haunt Shakespeare play

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — There was the explosion. And the fire, the theft, the rain, the injury, the sound and light board failure and - ahem - the torn

All that, and the Shakespeare in the Park production of Macbeth in Trinity Park isn't even finished yet.

The inexplicable goings-on have fewer and fewer people associated with the production discounting the centuries-old notion that a theatrical curse surrounds the play.

Producing director Michael Muller is not by nature a superstitious man. But after the Macbeth set caught fire during Tuesday's performance, he's taking no chances.

Before Saturday night's performance of Macbeth, he was planning to place four crystals on the stage in a manner recommended by a local witchcraft expert.

"The idea is to set up a shield of psychic energy," Muller told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. "We were told to soak the crystals in salt water for 72 hours, which we have done. I hope it works."

According to legend, the curse stems from the witches' "double double" scene, in which they prophesy Scottish nobleman Macbeth's rise to the throne while chanting over a gurgling

The "word" is the name of the play. One of the oldest traditions in theater is that it is considered bad luck to speak the name of the play backstage.

Coleman is a reformed scoffer. experiencing it, he did some research and learned that the first mishap associated with the play occurred the very first opening night in 1606 and involved the actor playing Lady Macbeth.

"A young man played the role, associated with Shakespeare in because back then women weren't allowed on the stage," Coleman said. "After the opening night he went home with a stomach ache and died in his sleep. Shakespeare had to take on the role himself."

Coleman cited the time that Laurence Olivier, seated on a bench backstage during a perfor-

mance of Macbeth, heard his cue and rose to go on stage.

"At that point, a huge stage where he had been sitting," Coleman said.

"Another time, when Olivier was doing the big climactic sword fight between Macbeth and Macduff, the other actor's sword shattered. The tip went flying into the audience and passed right through an empty seat in the first row. It was one of the few empty seats in the house.'

Coleman said he hasn't completely made up his mind about the superstition, but he's apparently leaning toward acceptance. When interviewed about the production, Coleman refers to the work only as "this play" or "the Scottish play."

"I just don't ever say it," he said. "I'm not going to ask for trouble."

DALLAS (AP) — If new Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones really intends to change the Cowboys Cheerleaders uniforms, Texans say they are squarely opposed to

More than 93 percent of those responding to a Dallas Times Herald survey say Jones has no business messing with the cheerleaders uniforms or allowing fraternization between the women and Cowboys players.

The newspaper conducted the poll after more than a third of the Cowboys Cheerleaders walked off the squad on Friday, saying Jones was threatening their wholesome image with tighterfitting costumes and looser rules that would allow them to drink in uniform.

Jones called the 37 cheerleaders "the pick of the litter" and said at a news conference he wouldn't change their

But he did concede that a change was being considered in the cheerleaders' familiar uniforms of white hot pants, gogo boots, blue shirts tied at the midriff and fringed vests.

Several cheerleaders said they had learned they might be required to wear Spandex cycling shorts and halter tops.

"I like the traditional way that we have looked. That is not to say that there might not be changes, Jones said. He added: "People don't wear their hair the same way in '89 as they did in '69. People don't wear the same boots. People don't have the same feeling about what is appealing or what is exciting to our fans.'

Mitchell told the Times Herald that Jones complied.

Because most of the state's refineries are in East Texas, West Texas filling stations would have to go miles out of their way to get regulation gas, and that could run up gas prices in West Texas, state officials warned.

Running from the Wilbarger-Wichita county line on the Oklahoma border south to Falcon Dam in Zapata County, the line split the city of Brownwood.

Sen. Phil Gramm said the line was creating "absurd situations" in Texas and complained, along with several other congressmen, to the EPA.

The agency crafted the guidelines, designed to reduce smog by cutting down on the fumes that escape at the gas pump, along lines recommended by the automobile and oil industries, officials said. Because West Texas is hotter than East Texas, the agency reasoned, stricter volatility standards were needed on the west side of the 99th longitude.

"We didn't think we would have a problem because we did what the industry wanted," said Richard Wilson, director of the EPA's office of mobile sources.



### Red Cross will stop housing C. Americans in South Texas

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - American Red Cross officials say because the flood of Central American asylum-seekers is easing in South Texas, the relief agency at the end of July will not renew its government contract to operate refugee shelters here.

A document soliciting other service agencies to take over the job of running the Red Cross' two shelters for Central Americans will appear Monday in the Federal Register, said Daryl Borquist, spokesman for the Community Relations Service of the U.S. Department of Justice.

David Townsend, director of midwestern operations for the American Red Cross, said the agency sought to end its involvement because the crisis stage is

"We believe there are other agencies or groups that can do Townsend we're doing told The Brownsville Herald.

The Community Relations Service awarded the contract to the Red Cross in February

Red Cross officials signed the contract after having been involved in an emergency operation to shelter Central Americans who were being removed from makeshift homes and from a field outside Casa Oscar Romero, a shelter run by the Catholic Diocese of Brownsville.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service on Feb. 20 announced a new policy of no longer granting travel permission to asylum-seekers who made it to the INS' Harlingen office without being detected by the Border Patrol. The Red Cross

that had been detained.

At the Red Cross program's peak, there were more than 1,000 Central American detainees packed into a former U.S. Department of Agriculture laboratory complex near the main international bridge in Brownsville.

Thursday night, 286 people were housed at the Brownsville shelter, while another 220 stayed at a shelter in San Benito, 20 miles to the north.

Townsend said the Red Cross has spent between \$200,000 and \$250,000 monthly to run the two

The Community Relations Service also funds three shelters in South Texas for Central American juveniles traveling unaccompanied by their parents or guardians.

INS officials say the new gettough policies have discouraged people from venturing north. Under the new procedures, asylum requests usually are decided in a day. Those refused are immediately detained and marked for deportation.

Immigration officials say most Central Americans come here for economic reasons and are not fleeing persecution, which is a requirement for obtaining political refugee status.

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## Bomber critics shocked by cost figures

declassified Pentagon figures on the cost of the B-2 stealth bomber bolster their argument against spending for the costly program.

"The Department of Defense has produced a B-2 program that won't fly financially," Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the tee, said Friday after the Defense Authorization Act. estimates were released.

'Members of Congress are balking at spending \$4.1 billion this year for SDI (Strategic Defense Initiative)," he said.

"It is not realistic to think we can spend twice as much per year on a plane.

According to the Pentagon, the radar-evading plane will cost about \$24 billion over a threeyear peak spending period. The estimated cost for the bomber in fiscal 1990 is \$4.7 billion, including \$2 billion in research. development, testing and evaluation and \$2.7 billion in production.

Estimated costs in fiscal 1991 total \$5.3 billion with costs in peak years of fiscal 1992 at \$7.8 billion, fiscal 1993 at \$8.4 billion and fiscal 1994 at \$7.7 billion.

Recent estimates have shown the aircraft will cost between \$500 million and \$650 million a copy. The figures released Friday showed the Pentagon has invested about \$22.4 billion in the program and total cost to complete the project would be about \$70 billion.

The Defense Department plans to purchase 132 of the planes, including three in fiscal 1990, five in fiscal 1991, 10 in fiscal 1992, 21 in fiscal 1993 and 24 in fiscal 1994.

## Midwestern states residents enjoy western art museum

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - A 12foot bronze sculpture of a Blackfoot Indian chief with bought well, before the boom in outstretched arms welcomes visitors to the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indian and Western Art. He carries no weapon, only a feather in his right hand.

Harrison Eiteljorg would not have it any other way.

"In this museum you will not see one battle scene," said Eiteljorg, whose voluminous private collection becomes public when the museum opens today.

'The Indians had a beautiful art or religion, whatever you want to call it. They worshiped the sun, the rain, their crops and fields. They never killed except for their own needs. I wanted the museum to show that. It has a romantic feeling about the western Indians and their life."

The museum's collection of primarily 20th century paintings and bronzes chronicles the westward movement American settlers and the Indians' way of life.

### Bio says Tyson hit wife

NEW YORK (AP) - Heavyweight champion Mike Tyson is quoted as saying the best punch he ever threw sent Robin Givens, his wife at the time, bouncing off the walls.

Tyson's description of the incident is contained in a new biography which portrays the fighter as a sadistic thug.

Tyson told biographer and one-time friend Jose Torres that he never hit an opponent as hard as he did Givens.

The biography, titled "Fire and Fear: The Inside Story of Mike Tyson," provides an insider's view of the volatile champion. Excerpts of the book provided by its publisher, Warner Books,

Inc., indicated Givens was not the only woman abused by Tyson. "I like to hurt women when I make love to them. I like to hear them scream with pain, to see them bleed," Tyson says in the book, which will be excerpted in the August Playboy. Copies of the magazine will be available Monday.

The book also provides unflattering portraits of a gold-digging Givens and an anti-Semitic Don King.



### **Tankers** collide; spill oil

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) -An oil tanker and a bargepushing tug boat collided at the mouth of the Houston Ship Channel on Friday, spilling up to 4,000 barrels of oil near Galveston Bay, authorities said.

The vessels collided about 6:20 p.m. as a tugboat owned by Coastal Towing was heading into the mouth of the ship channel while the Panamanianregistered tanker Rachel-B was heading out into Galveston Bay, said Petty Officer Charles Jones of the U.S. Coast Guard.

Jones said the Coast Guard is supervising cleanup operations private contractor tries to contain the oil with booms.

"We have no idea who was at fault now," Jones said. "We'll have to wait until the reports are finished."

But Jones said the tugboat captain's quick action kept the spill from becoming much larger. He drove the leaking barge he was pushing aground after the collision, stemming the flow of oil and preventing more destruction.


"He may have saved the tugboat and other barges," Jones explained. "It was going to flip on him unless he let it out."

The tugboat captain's name was not immediately available, officials said.

Jones hesitated to call the captain a hero for his action, saying he preferred to wait to see who was at fault for the collision.

Jones said the Coast Guard was monitoring the operation "and making sure they protect the environment."

The spill was minuscule in comparison with the Alaskan William Sound.

"I'll never believe he was involved in the death of Michael Donald," Cox's mother, Sarah Cox, said in an appeal for mercy.

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


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DEAR DR. GOTT: Is cod-liver oil good for arthritis treatment?

DEAR READER: Despite the claims of some health-food proponents, cod-liver oil has not been shown to be a particularly effective treatment for arthritis. Better treatment includes aspirin, ibuprofen and a variety of prescription drugs, such as Feldene, Voltaren, Naprosyn and others. DEAR DR. GOTT: Would you please give me some information about G6PD and thalassemia? I have hemolytic anemia and my doctor said these were the cause

DEAR READER: Glucose-6-phosphate dehydrogenase (G6PD) deficiency and thalassemia are two types of inherited anemia.

G6PD deficiency is a genetic defect in the way the body manufactures hemoglobin — the red, oxygen-carrying blood pigment. It occurs primarily in blacks and in the Mediterranean races. The defect causes a peculiar brittleness of the red blood corpuscles. When they are exposed to certain compounds - such as aspirin, sulfa antibiotics or fava beans - they break open (hemolyze) and cease functioning. Therefore, when a G6PD patient takes certain medicines or eats fava beans or has an infection, the red blood cells are destroyed and anemia develops. When such patients steer clear of the anemia-producing compounds, they are otherwise healthy. There is no treatment other than avoidance of the substances that trigger hemolysis.

G6PD is an intriguing genetic abnormality. It is particularly common in New Orleans, where I trained, because of the large French-ancestry population in and around that city. Each spring, Louisiana doctors can bet on seeing several cases of G6PD anemia because fava beans, which are a seasonal dietary staple in that part of the country, initiate acute anemia in some of the rural residents who eat them.

Thalassemia, too, is a genetic defect that causes the body to manufacture an abnormal form of hemoglobin. Thalassemia can be either minor (mild) or major (severe), depending on the extent of the inherited genetic defect. Life expectancy is normal for people with thalassemia minor; they experience a chronic, low-grade anemia, with pallor, fatigue and enlarged

Thalassemia major is the cause of an untreatable, severe chronic anemia that can be quite disabling. Patients often experience profound fatigue, jaundice and leg ulcers; they have to make extensive modifications in their lifestyles (for example, careful medical supervision and no strenuous activity).

Thalassemics should not receive iron therapy or blood transfusions because they are particularly prone to iron-overload, a dangerous condition that can lead to heart and liver failure

Both G6PD deficiency and thalassemia can be readily diagnosed by blood tests that analyze either enzyme deficiencies or the type of hemoglobin present in the red corpuscles.

The selling of Retin-A, as described in Money magazine (April 1989), is one of the decade's great marketing triumphs. Due more to promotional hype than to product superiority, Retin-A sales jumped from about \$13 million in

1985 to more than \$62 million in 1988. Extensively plugged as more than a pore-unplugger, this derivative of vi-

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pound almost overnight, capturing both the imagination and the pocketbooks of men and women alike. In contrast to the glowing press re-leases, Retin-A has been shown to produce a youthful glow in only about 15 percent of users. In many patients, the cream causes such extensive skin irritation that cortisone treatment is

necessary for relief. It seems to me that people are pay ing too much attention to wrinkles. I, for one, want to go on record as favoring wrinkles. I am unabashedly prowrinkle. I think we ought to demand that Congress set aside a National Wrinkle Week. For the other 51 weeks, we should pledge to ignore wrinkles and other dermatological

blemishes that accompany aging.
Do you know why advertising agencies hire 20-year-old models to promote anti-wrinkle beauty products in television ads? Older women won't do. June Leaman, a senior vice president at Estee Lauder, was recently quoted in The New York Times as saying: "I don't think we want to show someone older. Consumers say they want it, but when they see it, they don't love it."

Bull. I love it, and I think we ought to see it. (Neutrogena is doing this with some success.) We're being told that ads featuring older women using wrinkle-removers don't sell. In other words, if you want to publicize a product that smoothes the skin, you have to boost it with a model who already. has smooth skin. We need a little verisimilitude here.

Instead of implying that a model in her 20s has beautiful skin because of a beauty cream, we should be allowed to make the judgment ourselves by seeing a "real woman" (advertising jargon for a non-model) who uses the product.

Of course, if this were the case, no one would buy wrinkle-removers. And this brings me back to my pro-wrinkle

Getting rid of wrinkles is a tough job. They don't go away by themselves. They are resistant to creams and gels. Collagen injections are expensive and short-lived. Surgical procedures, such as face-lifts, can cost from \$7,000 to \$10,000 each and usually do not produce dramatic benefits, according to Dr. Paula Moynahan, a plastic surgeon writing in The New

Although there's strong justification for long-term investing, even the staunchest investors buckled under the stock market crash of October 1987 as investor confidence eroded. Despite the logic and evident rewards in long-term investing, there was still the nagging doubt, "Does it still make sense to own mutual funds"

According to a Wall Street Journal study, during the first quarter of 1988 "money flowed out of stock funds sold by brokers." The lack of confidence appeared to be in the sales people who recommended the funds rather than the performance of the funds themselves. John Markese, research director for the American Association of Individual Investors, a Chicago-based nonprofit group, suggested the sales people just weren't available when needed.

The Wall Street Journal discovered that investors were pressing for more reliable guidance. One mutual fund group offered a worksheet to help investors set goals and received roughly 40,000 replies. Another mutual fund group received several thousand requests from concerned investors after advertising a free brochure on how to be your own portfolio manager.

The results of this study suggest that in the euphoria of a run-away bull market many investors purchased mutual funds with unrealistic expectations. Unfortunately, in many cases salespeople stressed the benefits of mutual funds without explaining the risks. When an inevitable market correction came, the salespeople who had painted this rosy picture were nowhere to be found.

Changing Times magazine ran a special report on mutual funds in February 1988 that showed how the stock market topped out Aug. 25, 1987. By December 1, the Dow Jones Industrial Average had fallen 32

How did the five basic groups of mutual funds compare to the overall market averages? The aggressive growth and sector funds lost about 32 percent as did the overall market indexes. Balanced funds, because their holders owned both stocks and bonds, fell only 17 percent. Income funds, invested in mostly bonds and few equities, suffered least with a 10 percent drop.

Keep in mind that these figures reflect the time from when the market peaked until just after the crash. This isn't a representative picture of overall long-term performance.

Since mutual funds are long-term investments, next week we'll examine how they weathered the entire year of 1987 and also what hap-



of any new rules. Such "amnesty" would be similar to that granted illegal aliens by the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) two years ago.

The senior aide for Stenholm, Marc Lubin, noted that both the U.S. House and Senate are both currently considering reform measures related to U.S. immigration laws.

Jack Pointeau indicated of all the options now possible for the family, he believes the one involving working permits for his wife and daughter offers the most hope. The legal option of amnesty is also the fairest, he said, commen-

ting, "Give me the same rights as the illegals."

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

When Clinton Matthews and his wife, Anita, leave Snyder this weekend they said they will "leave a part of our hearts here." The couple has lived in Snyder since 1984 and for the past five vears he has served as an umpire for countless baseball games.

Matthews, who is 59, called his first ball game 31 years ago and he recently said that he "wouldn't take anything for that

experience." Matthews was newly settled in Snyder, following a transfer by Chevron, when word got around that he had umpired games in the past. Since it was then difficult for Little League to find people to call the games, he said they approached him and he said "yes.

Since then, Matthews has called countless games including the teenage league, freshman and junior varsity games and twice weekly regular season games which lasted from 4 to 41/2 hours.

He also called playoffs in Snyder, Abilene and Lubbock, but he notes he was never able to call a state playoff game.

Matthews said that to him baseball is a lot like life. Some games are won, some are rained out and some are lost. He said he prides himself on the fact that all the players continued to like him even if he made a call that was not in their favor.

"I always called each game just like I saw them. I never tried to favor one team or player over the other. Consistency is the name of the game and the Snyder Little League is one of the greatest organizations I have

Matthews was born in Alabama and raised in Mississippi. He has a bachelor's degree from the University of Georgia where he majored in English and minored in theology.

He umpired his first game in Macon, Ga. in 1958. Umpiring became the natural thing for him to do since he had always played in the grammar and high school league baseball games as a youth. Little League had not been organized then. He also played in "hamburger leagues," christened because each player received \$2 and a hamburger for playing in the game.

Matthews served as a catcher and second baseman.

In 1958, the 12-year-old Little League players in Macon didn't have anyone to call their games so when Matthews was approached he said yes.

Snyder's Little League season Mississippi, where he umpired League and high school games until 1976. During that time, Matthews was certified to umpire games in both Georgia and Mississippi and he officiated at Little League playoffs in both states as well as The Dixie Youth League World Series in 1968 and 1969.

In 1976, Matthews was transferred to New Jersey. Since he "was on a new job" he said that he didn't "do much calling then.'

In all, Matthews is certified to umpire games in seven states including Georgia, Alabama, Wyoming, Texas, Mississippi, New Jersey and Florida.

In 1982, he was transferred to Evanston, Wyo. Two years later he was living in Snyder.

Matthews explained that anyone who wants to umpire a playoff or higher ranking baseball game has to be certified by the state in which the event is taking place.


In past years, he said he attended a six month umpire school in Sarasota, Fla. and numerous one day seminars. Certification is granted for a lifetime.

While umpires usually do earn money for each game they call, Matthews said he always did it "for the love of the game and the players," rather than for the money. "It is always a blessing for me to see how the kids improve.

Matthews has seen some changes in the rules and regulations of Little League games during the past 31 years. Umpires' clothes and equipment have also changed.

Umpires have to go by the Little League rule book and sometimes that changes. In addition, the way an umpire makes a call is sometimes changed. For instance, umpires used to be able Matthews remained in Georgia to "thumb their nose" if a player

### Homemade bran muffins add fiber, low saturated fat

Not all bran muffins are created equal. Many commercially baked muffins contain high amounts of saturated fat and cholesterol, erasing the benefits of the fiber in the bran.

These muffins have no cholesterol and little saturated fat. You get the benefits of both insoluble fiber from bran flakes and soluble fiber from the apples.

You can have a muffin for breakfast any morning by baking a batch ahead and freezing them. To defrost muffins in the microwave, cook one muffin, uncovered, on 100 percent power (high) for 30 to 45 seconds, 2 muffins for 45 seconds to one minute.

### Keep batter on hand for fresh muffins

Keep the batter and streusel topping in the refrigerator for up to seven days for freshly baked muffins any day of the week.

To bake: Spray muffin cups with non-stick coating. Without stirring batter, fill muffin cups two-thirds full. Sprinkle 1 teaspoon nut mixture over each muffin. Bake in a 400-degree F oven 20 to 25 minutes or until brown.

## Supreme Court decision denounced by Bush

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush says he'll enforce the Supreme Court's ban on flag desecration laws, but he doesn't like it one bit.

Bush returned to the White House late Thursday after a day trip to New York where he mixed politics with a patriotic call to all Americans to join his crusade for volunteerism.

He made clear his distaste for the Supreme Court's 5-4 ruling striking down the 48 state laws against flag burning and other desecration.

The president told 1,000 business leaders he understands the legal basis for the ruling, and "will see that the law of the land is fully supported, but I have to give you my personal, emotional response: flag burning is wrong,

Bush's distaste for the ruling was matched in Congress as a bipartisan Senate passed a resolution condemning the

One-branch Preston North National Bank Thursday became the 64th Texas bank to be shut down this year. Preston North was purchased by Sequor National Bank Texas, a subsidiary of Los Angeles-based Security Pacific, the nation's fifth largest bank holding company whose subsidiaries include California's second-largest bank.

Security Pacific also has been seeking entry into Texas through its bid for Texas American Bancshares Inc. and National Bancshares Corp., the states' two largest remaining insolvent banks still privately operated.
