Pilot was shot

MIAMI (AP) — A pilot who miraculously survived an 800-mile flight while he was unconscious had been shot through the abdomen at some point before he crash-landed in the Bahamas and swam to rescuers, police said today.

"It was unquestionably a gunshot wound," said Hollywood Police Chief Richard Witt. "The surgeons at the Hollywood Hospital said there was a wound that passed through the left rib cage, (and the colon), exited and struck him in the arm and exited again.'

Authorities have not recovered the small-caliber gun and believe it would have gone down with the plane.

Authorities earlier had speculated that Thomas Root may have had a heart attack or inhaled carbon monoxide.

County to pledge tax support in '90 for hospital funds

By BOB CAMPBELL **SDN Staff Writer**

In a budget discussion with more than a dozen Cogdell Memorial Hospital supporters present, Scurry County commissioners Thursday indicated that they will grant the county-owned hospital's request for a tax subsidy next year of \$560,000.

This reflects an increase of the current subsidy of some \$200,000 and approaches levels provided by the county at least twice dur-

ing this decade, in 1983 and 1986. Hochwalt made the budget presentation. He characterized Cogdell as at a "juncture." "One path leads to mediocrity and a constant struggle for survival and the other leads to growth and to excellence in patient care.'

The administrator also asked for a \$40,000 increase in this calendar year's \$360,000 subsidy in addition to the \$560,000 subsidy for next year.

Pct. 3 Commissioner C.D. Gray

Jr. told Hochwalt he was in favor of the proposal, but he asked the assemblage if they would support a tax increase to finance it.

Several of those in attendance then said they would be willing to pay more taxes to meet the hospital's needs.

Hospital board members, county economic development committee members, hospital auxiliary leaders, Drs. Paul Thompson and James Burleson, Mayor Troy Williamson, Senior Citizens Center leaders, BCD members Cogdell administrator Tom Jack Denman and Bill Parker and other interested persons attended and spoke at the meeting, which ended with expressions of support from each of the four county commissioners.

Pct. 4 Commissioner Ted Billingsley, the senior court member, ended the 30-minute session by saying, "Tom, I believe you're going to be all right. I believe you're going to get everything you want.

The court has been conducting budget hearings all this week, listening to presentations by department heads, in preparation for developing a final document by mid-August.

Hochwalt said in his prepared statement that increases have been made necessary by start-up expenses associated with providing medical services to the **Texas Department of Corrections** and by the necessity of replacing hospital equipment, 79 percent of which has reached a state of full depreciation.

He said modernizing equipment will be necessary to attract new physicians to the medical staff, with four more doctors currently being sought.

"This requested increase is a last resort and one which I had hoped to avoid through the drastic cost reduction budget measures that we have taken over the last 18 months," he said. "This budget is realistic, and we

The affidavit was filed to obtain a warrant to search two of Stevens' residences in Spokane, 290 miles east of Seattle.



records have produced the following facts that tend to establish that Stevens is a viable suspect in the Green River homicides and possibly others in the Pacific Northwest.'

Police searched the residences Wednesday, producing an additional truckload of material including crime reports, 1,800 videotapes, maps, credit cards, 14 police badges and two Seattle police uniform shirts, according to court documents.

The Green River case involves the deaths of 41 women and the disappearance of at least eight others in Washington state and Oregon from 1982 to 1985. Most of the victims were young and almost all were linked to prostitution. Early victims were found along or near the Green River, southeast of Seattle.

The nationally syndicated television show "Manhunt" aired a program on the slayings Dec. 8. It generated thousands of calls, including one from a viewer who told police to check a third-year student at Gonzaga University Law School in Spokane, said King County Capt. PALMDALE, Calif. (AP) The B-2 stealth bomber is ready to fly after successfully completing ground tests, and takeoff could come as early as Saturday, the Air Force says.

The bat-winged aircraft sped down a desert runway Thursday, hitting a top speed of 132 mph and lifting its nose wheel off the tarmac, said Brig. Gen. Richard Scofield, director of the B-2 pro-

"We've completed all the taxi tests prior to going to first Scofield said. "The airplane is in good shape."

The bomber, in development for more than a decade, has been subjected to extensive computersimulated flights but has never actually lifted off a runway.

It incorporates revolutionary technologies and the use of lightweight composite material to elude radar by absorbing radar energy, rather than reflecting it as conventional aircraft

But although the bomber appears ready to fly, congressional opposition to the costly defense program threatens to ground the B-2 just as it is rising to prove its secret capabilities.

Congressmen warned Air Force officials earlier this week that they face a tough uphill fight with the B-2, which recent estimates indicate would be the most expensive aircraft in history.

"Put it in perspective or there's a real possibility that the B-2 will become a museum piece," said Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been taking thyroid medication for over 15 years. Does the hormone trigger steoporosis?

DEAR READER: In excess, thyroid loss of bone calcium that comes with age. Note, however, that I say "excess"; a therapeutic level is beneficial for patients who need thyroid replacement. This is one reason people taking thyroid supplements should have periodic blood tests to determine wheth-

er they are receiving the proper. amount of medicine. Using appropriate analyses of thyroid hormone in the blood, physicians can adjust the dose of medicine and avoid the possibility of drug-induced osteoporosis

DEAR DR. COTT. Eight I was found to be a biological false positive. I underwent lumbar puncture and three shots of Bicillin for three weeks. My pregnant wife was also found to be positive. My physician has indicated I can look forward to having yellow jaundice, hepatitis and arthritis. Is this true? I've questioned other physicians who say they've never heard of this.

with the older syphilis tests because people with certain diseases, notably lupus erythematosus, commonly exhibited false positives. This is less a worry now, with the advent of newer blood tests that are more specific for syphilitic infection.

am confused why, if you are a BFP, you needed a lumbar puncture (to test for syphilis in the central nervous system) and penicillin (to treat syphilis). Also, I'm concerned that your wife, too, tested positive. Frankly, your story sounds as though you are not a false-positive reactor; you were treated as though you had

I do not understand the reference to your getting hepatitis and arthritis. These afflictions are not consequences of a BFP or syphilis itself.

I think you need to go back to square one. Find a doctor who is familiar with current tests for syphilis and request a repeat blood test. In this way, your eight-year mystery may be solved. (Your wife should also be tested.) Depending on the results, the new doctor can offer further advice and testing, if indicated.

Lt. governor blasts state education board

'What this board has done has been to attempt with some degree of success to turn the clock back on progress toward quality in education in Texas," Hobby said.

Although he said there are 'some very responsible" board members, Hobby strongly disagreed with the support given vocational education by Chair-

man Monte Hasie of Lubbock. The board that was appointed to implement the 1984 reforms has given way to the elected board headed by Hasie.

Hobby said members of the board who "are against quality education" should resign, and he

included Hasie in that group. "I don't think he's done a good job, and as I indicated, I don't think he's complying with his

OSHA fines funeral home over \$50,000

\$50,000 in fines for allegedly violating Occupational Health and Safety Administration rules, including properly instructing employees how to avoid AIDS exposure.

The federal agency accuses Martin Funeral Home in El Paso of not monitoring employees' exposure to formaldehyde and not providing protective clothing that would protect embalmers from coming into contact with blood that could be tainted with the viruses that cause AIDS and hepatitis.

OSHA's 18-page complaint accuses Martin Funeral Home of six "willful" violations carrying \$8,000 fines each and four "serious" violations carrying fines of \$720 each, for a total fine of \$50,880.

About half the allegations concerned exposure to for-maldehyde, an embalming-fluid ingredient that causes cancer and blindness and irritates the skin, eyes and lungs.

About a dozen embalmers and driver-assistants are affected. Employees declined to comment on the record for fear of being

The federal agency inspected the funeral home in mid-February and issued the intent to fine June 30, OSHA area director **Edward Cosgrove said Thursday** from his office in Lubbock. Martin Funeral Home has until July 28 to respond, he said.

Bill Barrett, spokesman for Service Corp. International of Houston, the funeral home's owner, said company representatives have arranged a meeting next Thursday with OSHA of-

"Some of the allegations we were not aware of and agreed with at the time and have since corrected," Barrett said Thursday. "Some we disagree with, and some we want to find out more about what OSHA wanted."

The federal agency said the funeral home did not teach embalmers and assistants how to avoid infection from AIDS, hepatitis and tuberculosis. It said employees were endangered from being splattered with for- backfires maldehyde or tainted blood because they were not provided By James Jacoby with protective clothing or with eyewashes and showers.

The agency also said the funeral home failed to label containers of blood-contaminated other items, did not warn em- spades and willingness to compete.

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - A balmers about the dangers of forfuneral home faces more than maldehyde and did not monitor their exposure to the chemical.

According to federal regulations that went into effect in February 1988, funeral homes must monitor employees' longterm and short-term exposure to formaldehyde and notify them of the test results within 15 days.

Barrett said the training and monitoring were being done. He said the funeral home had been sending formaldehyde exposure test results to the corporate office, but is now posting them for employees to see.

"It was as simple a matter as outting up the results on a bulletin board," he said.

One allegation — that bottles of chemicals were unmarked — has since been corrected, Barrett






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Rangers scalp Indians

CLEVELAND (AP) - Julio Doc Edwards said. "They made six hits feelings, no extra incentives, when he steps to the plate against his former Cleveland teammates.

"I put those things behind me," said Franco, who had a reputation as an unsettling influence during his six years as an Indian. "What they did, they thought was best for the organization. I'm glad they traded me, because Texas wanted me."

The Indians traded Franco to the Rangers for Pete O'Brien, Jerry Browne and Oddibe McDowell. O'Brien and Browne have played well, but McDowell started slowly and has since been traded away.

"I still talk with them (Cleveland's players)," Franco said. "It's fun being with them. But I love being in Texas.'

He's hitting .334 with 64 RBIs for the Rangers, who have won four of their last five games. The Indians have lost three straight.

Cleveland scored single runs in the first and third innings on a pair of O'Brien RBI singles. The second one was his 1,000th career hit.

The Indians added a run in the fourth on Felix Fermin's RBI forceout.

They didn't have a runner in scoring position over the next seven innings against four Texas pitchers. Jeff Russell, 5-2, got the win by striking out the only batter he faced in the 10th.

Texas scored once in the second on Franco's double and twice in the fifth on consecutive RBI singles by Jim Sundberg and Cecil Espy. Espy had a careerhigh five hits.
