WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush, marking the 20th anniversary of man's first step on the moon, today called for establishing an American base there in the 21st Century to be followed by a manned mission to

Bush offered no firm timetable or price tag for a daring program he said would take the nation 'back to the moon, back to the future, and this time back to

"Then a journey into tomorrow," he proposed, "A journey to another planet, a manned mission to Mars," at least 35 million

In a ceremony from the steps of the National Air and Space Museum, the president reasserted the goal of establishing Space Station Freedom in the 1990s, the necessary first step to the moon and Mars.

The technological hurdles of getting to Mars could be matched nolitical ones however At a time of huge budget deficits, Congress already is balking at the start-up costs for the \$30-billion space station, and it is the essential first step to the moon and

WASHINGTON (AP)

Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, saying the central bank faces a "difficult balancing act," told Congress today the Fed has been pushing interest rates lower in an effort to keep the country out of a reces-

After a year of raising interest rates to dampen inflationary pressures, Greenspan said the Fed switched course in June and began lowering rates because of widespread signs of a weakening economy.

Greenspan, making his midyear report to Congress, indicated that the Fed stood ready to lower rates further, but he said its best efforts might not be enough to stave off an economic downturn.





Bicycle riders need precautions for road

PHILADELPHIA (AP) -Bicycle riding can be an enjoyable sport, a good form of exercise and a great way to spend time outdoors.

But riders need to consider necessary precautions against bike injuries that may result from accidents and overuse.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A good friend of mine has Bartter's syndrome. All I know is that she has trouble keeping potassium in her body. She's sick so often and I want to help.

DEAR READER: Bartter's syndrome is a complex metabolic disturbance, resulting from a person's inability to handle certain minerals. It is characterized by inappropriately high losses of sodium and potassium through the kidneys, leading to an imbalance of salt and water in the body. This, in turn, sets in motion a cascade of hormonal reactions — primarily an increase in renin and aldosterone, the two substances that control blood pressure. Although Bartter's patients do not have hypertension, they often suffer from low blood potassium and magnesium.

The cause of the syndrome is unknown; however, it appears to be an inherited genetic disorder. Treatment

While I applaud your desire to help your friend feel better, I think you have to realize that you are really powerless to help her - except to the extent that you can be caring and supportive. She will get her most useful assistance from her doctor, whose job it is to prescribe the most effective combination of drugs to overcome her excessive mineral losses. I am sure just "being there" will give your friend enormous encouragement and

DEAR DR. GOTT: What do you think of the grinding process for bunion removal instead of major surgery? I believe we should all avoid surgery if there is any alternative.

DEAR READER: Several techniques have been tried to correct bunions, the swellings at the bases of the big toes. A bunion consists of bursitis of the first joint, which causes the big toe to drift outward and override the second toe. This makes it difficult for the foot to bear weight normally, leading to pain and deformity.

In my experience, the most satisfactory treatment for bunions is a surgical procedure to re-align the big toe. This is almost always successful because the mechanical abnormality is repaired and the toe is straightened, as opposed to a pure "grinding" process, which removes only part of the deformity, without the necessary reconstructive element. Usually, this surgery is performed by orthopedic surgeons, although I understand that podiatrists in some parts of the country are equally skillful. 





Rangers lose to Red Sox

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) Mike Boddicker was on track, and Charlie Hough wasn't.

The result was a 4-0 victory by the Boston Red Sox over the Texas Rangers on Wednesday night, in a game played in temperatures that stayed at 93 degrees or higher.

Boddicker's fourth straight win broke Boston's four-game losing streak and dropped Hough to 5-11, his worst record ever for 20 starts.

"He pitched like the Boddicker we all knew," Boston manager Joe Morgan said. "He missed a few fastballs, but he didn't make many mistakes.

While Boddicker, 8-7, was giving up only three hits in the 6 2-3 innings he worked, Hough was shelled from the start.

Wade Boggs, Danny Heep, Mike Greenwell, Dwight Evans and Kevin Romine all picked up first-inning singles for a 3-0 lead Then Greenwell hammered a 390foot homer to rightfield in the third.

"We got just enough hits in the first inning against a clutch pitcher to turn the tide," Morgan

Boddicker walked Julio Franco to lead off the seventh, then hit Steve Buechele with one out. Morgan brought in Rob Murphy in relief, and Murphy got Jeff Kunkel on a double play ball, then struck out five in the eighth and ninth to pick up his fifth save.

"I hit a wall in the seventh, and I was kind of slinging the ball," Boddicker said.

"I felt fine in the sixth, but then got tired all of a sudden. It might have been the heat. Joe asked me how I felt ... and

I said I didn't have a lot. It turned out good because Murph needed one pitch and got a double play." Hough battled into the fifth inning, giving up four more hits.

The Red Sox got only two hits the last 4 1-3 innings off relievers Gary Mielke and Kenny Rogers, but they already had all the runs they needed.

Texas manager Bobby Valentine said Hough "has had better knuckleballs, that's for sure, but they weren't scalding them. Three of those groundball singles could have been double plays. Greenwell was the only one who really hit it well."

Hough said: "Those were terrible pitches. ... They all broke flat. I had no arm speed.'

Of Boddicker, Valentine said: He had us off balance. We didn't hit many good ones at all. We had a few we just missed."

Evans' first-inning single was his 2,200th career hit.
