### **DPS** expects 34 fatalities

The Texas Department of Public Safety will have all available troopers patrolling the state's highways, hoping to curtail traffic accidents during the Labor Day weekend.

It is estimated that 34 people will die as a result of a traffic collision during the 78-hour Labor Day period, which begins at 6 p.m. Friday and concludes at midnight on Monday, Sept. 4.

"The more we can do to get people to buckle-up, slow down and not drink and drive, the better off all motorists will be, and therefore be aware of possible traffic problems," said a DPS spokesman.

The department is encouraging motorists to make sure they are aware of weather conditions if they are planning a trip. They should also make a thorough check of their vehicle, including seatbelts, tires and brake fluid,

to insure a safe tri "We believe safety awareness does make a difference," said Joe Milner, DPS director. "So far, no traffic fatality has been reported anywhere in Texas for June 13. If this holds up, it will be the first time since 1977 we have had a day with no traffic deaths in Texas. Let's make it happen again this Labor Day.'

The Snyder Jaycees will operate a travelers' rest stop at 6 p.m. Friday to 6 p.m. Monday with soft drinks, coffee, donuts, snacks, cots and restrooms to be provided free.

## Do U.S. drug laws work?



Penalties against drug use in the United States have escalated infiltrating the nation's cities about five years ago.

During that time, Congress and nearly every legislature have overhauled drug laws to make them stronger, more consistent and - in a few cases - more creative.

All signs suggest that the tougher laws haven't been enough to discourage drug abuse from spreading, but there's little doubt that those who are caught are paying a higher price.

-In Tallahassee, Fla., recently, a 30-year-old man was sentenced to life in prison without



parole for dealing crack. It was his first conviction.

"The laws have gotten tougher," said Hubert Williams, the former police chief of Newark, N.J., who now heads the Foundation in Police Washington. "They are good and strong and effective for our purposes.

The federal government has been a leader in the crackdown, with Congress passing anti-drug bills in 1984, 1986 and 1988. The laws established mandatory prison terms and fixed sentences for drug offenders, taking much of the sentencing discretion from

DALLAS (AP) - Some city officials have denounced a Dallas Patrolmen's Union billboard designed to draw attention to a \$17.9 million pay and benefits proposal the union wants the City Council to approve.

"I don't know of anyone who supports police officers as much as I do, but they're getting almost into propaganda and coercion. I think it alienates people," said Mayor Pro Tem John Evans.

The billboards, at three downtown locations, depict a dead police officer lying face down next to a police car.

Among the benefits the union is seeking is a 6 percent pay raise for officers.





### Lean look suits pork

The lean look is fashionable for pork, too. Hogs today are bred and fed to have less fat. Pork cuts are trimmed of fat more closely. Pork tenderloin and center loin are the cuts lowest in fat. As you cut the meat into strips, trim away any fat around the outside

**PORK WITH PAPAYA** 1 pound lean boneless pork Non-stick spray coating 3 cloves garlic, minced

2 cups broccoli flowerets 4 green onions, bias-sliced into 1-inch pieces

1/2 cup water 1/4 cup soy sauce

1 medium papaya

2 tablespoons cornstarch

2 tablespoons cold water

2 medium tomatoes, chopped 3 cups hot cooked brown rice

Partially freeze meat. Cut on the bias into thin bite-size strips. Spray a 12-inch skillet with nonstick coating. Cook pork and garlic in skillet until meat is brown, stirring occasionally. Stir in broccoli, bias-sliced onion, 1/2 cup water and soy sauce. Bring to boiling. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 3 to 5 minutes or until broccoli is crisp-tender and meat is done.

Meanwhile, quarter papaya lengthwise. Seed and peel. Cut crosswise into 1/4-inch slices. Stir together cornstarch and 2 tablespoons water; add to skillet. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly; cook and stir 2 minutes more. Stir in papapya and mix tomatoes. Heat through. Serve with hot cooked rice.

Against six hearts, West led the ace of diamonds. If West fails to continue diamonds, declarer can pitch a diamond on dummy's ace of clubs, draw three rounds of trumps and then play spades. Even though spades do not split, a spade can be ruffed in dummy and the rest of the spades will be good. But what about when West plays a second diamond? Now declarer must ruff in dummy and the hand gets tricky. If declarer plays two rounds of hearts right away and then plays ace and king of spades, West will ruff. But p.m. there is a way for declarer to succeed.

After ruffing the second round of diamonds, declarer should ruff a club high and lead a low heart to dummy's nine. Then he ruffs a second club and leads a heart to dummy's jack. A third club can be ruffed with declarer's last heart, and a spade is then led to dumtake West's last trump, and dummy's clubs will be good after the ace is cashed. There will be no need for the spade suit to split, since declarer will have enough tricks for the contract.

### Pokes release 10-year veteran running back

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Dallas "He really helped me." Cowboys coach Jimmy Johnson could not give 10-year fullback Timmy Newsome a starting job. So he gave the veteran player the next best thing - his walking

In a meeting Wednesday morning with Coach Jimmy Johnson, Newsome requested his release if he could not be a starter.

Cowboys officials tried to trade Newsome but found no interest. So they released him along with University of Houston. rookie Tyrone Thurman, a 5-3, 145-pound wide receiver-punt returner formerly of Texas Tech.

Newsome, who played in the same backfield with Tony Dorsett and later with Herschel Walker, is ranked ninth overall and third among running backs on the Cowboys' career receiving list with 212 catches.

His best rushing season came in 1984 when he carried 66 times for 268 yards.

The development of free agent Broderick Sargent and rookie Daryl Johnston made Newsome

expendable.
"They were performing better so we felt it was in Timmy's best interests to give it a shot with another club," Johnson said. "We're set at the fullback position. Timmy would have been 50-50 as far as making the team (if he hadn't requested his release)."

When asked if Newsome could still play in the NFL, Johnson said, "There weren't a lot of people jumping up and down wanting to get a 10-year veteran who was talking about retiring. I think Timmy's got talent and I'll leave it at that.

Newsome's best season came in 1986 when he caught a careerhigh 48 passes. With 32 receptions last season through the Cowboys' first nine games, he was on pace to better that mark when he was sidelined.

Sargent said Newsome's departure came as a surprise.

Center Tom Rafferty, a 14-year veteran, said he didn't believe Johnson was trying to rid the team of its long-time veterans in his first season since replacing Tom Landry as coach.

"I really don't read anything like that into it," Rafferty said. Johnson also announced the



Authorities said he is expected to be charged in the shooting deaths of his wife's parents once the district attorney's office completes its investigation.

Officials say that after Coble shot the three Tuesday evening, he bound and gagged his three daughters and a nephew and then abducted his wife.

The children were later found by Chad Stanley, 16, a friend of one of the daughters.

"We got them out of the house because they said he was coming back, and he said he was going to kill himself," Stanley said.

The incident ended late Tuesday after Coble, in what officials called a suicide attempt, crashed the car he and his wife were in near Meridian, about 45 miles northwest of Waco.

"The chase didn't last very long," said Bosque County chief deputy Dewell Harper. "The guy sped up to 80, then intentionally ran into a truck that had pulled over to the side of the road.

'That's what he was trying to - suicide and another murder," Harper said.

The Cobles were not living together, said Lt. Coy Jones.

Sources who had seen the classified section of the draft containing information about proposed aid to the three Latin American countries had said the figure could reach \$300 million, and National Security Adviser **Brent Scowcroft indicated Tues**day that it would be even higher.

Scowcroft had included the \$65 million in military equipment that Bush announced on Friday for Colombia. That money comes from a discretionary fund available for fiscal 1989, which ends Sept. 30. The strategy covers fiscal 1990.

Although Bush met with his top lieutenants in the drug war Tuesday at his vacation home in Kennebunkport, Maine, to discuss the strategy, the focus of the meeting was Colombia, sources said Wednesday.

"The fundamental issues of the strategy ... did not change," a third source said, noting that the final strategy had gone to the printer before the meeting occur-

Colombia has been wracked with violence since President Virgilio Barco imposed emergency regulations allowing the immediate resumption of extraditions of alleged drug traffickers to the United States. The move came after the Aug. 18 assassina-tion of a leading presidential candidate who was an outspoken foe of drug traffickers.

Colombian Justice Minister Monica de Greiff met for about 40 minutes Wednesday with Bennett, said Bennett spokesman



DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm interested in maintaining my present weight. I've been told to calculate calorie intake by taking my age, subtracting 18 and multiply by 20. The total is subtracted from 2,100 to determine the total calories to be consumed daily without weight gain. Is this correct?

DEAR READER: Many schemes like the one you describe have been published to calculate proper calorie intake. They all have at least two

First, the calculations are based on This may not be appropriate for everyone. For example, you may be short and muscular or tall and slender. Depending on your body-build, you may need more - or fewer calories to maintain your weight.

To a large degree, our body weights depend on our inherited, genetic makeup. You and I could weigh the same but, because of our genetic inheritance, we might burn calories (or store them as fat) at different rates. Therefore, on the same caloric regi- Nash said Wednesday. "Before, men, you would gain and I would lose - or vice versa.

Second, calculations do not take into account physical activity. Take two people with the same weight, take. One is a trained athlete, the other is sedentary. Obviously, the active person will require more calories to maintain weight than will the inactive individual.

### No action taken in Penry case

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles said it was premature to act on a request to commute the death sentence of a mentally retarded man convicted of capital murder.

Curtis Mason, attorney for Johnny Paul Penry, had asked the board to commute his client's sentence to life in prison.

But spokeswoman Karin Armstrong said the board's policy is to await a commutation recommendation from a majority of the officials in the court in which the person is convicted.

"The board agreed that it was premature until trial officials take some action," she said Wednesday.

Penry, 33, who has the mentality of a 7-year-old, was convicted and sentenced to death for the slaying of Pamela Moseley Carpenter of Livingston. She is the sister of former Washington Redskins kicker Mark Moseley.

The U.S. Supreme Court in June voted to vacate Penry's death sentence for the October 1979 rape-slaying because the trial judge refused a defense attorney's request for further instructions to the jury concerning Penry's mental illness.

Last week, a federal judge entered an order sending Penry's case back to the trial court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals with instructions to retry
