### \$6,915 Savings Bonds Sold In February

Series E and H United Sta Jahan County during February totaled \$6,915, according to Co. Bond Chairman Howard Far-mer. Sales for the first two months were \$17,396 - 13 per cent of the 1971 sales goal of

Treasury figures show that Texans purchased \$17,302,962 in Savings Bonds during February compared to 1970 sales for the same period totaling \$16,678,-196 - an increase of \$624,766 or 3.7 per cent. Sales for the two month period were \$34,678,727 for 19 per cent of the state's goal of 181.9 million.

Nationally, sales of E and H Savings Bonds were \$431 million - an 11-year peak for February. Sales for the first two months totaled \$861 million - 12.8 per cent above 1970. Redemptions were 22 per cent below 1970 for the lowest February in five years.



"The only encouragement in this unbelievable toll of bloodshed and hearthreak is the fact that there were nearly 500,000 more drivers in Texas at the end of 1970 than there were in 1969 at the same period. In addition, there were at least a billion more miles of travel than the preceding year."

"I know of no time in Texas history when a more concerted effort has been made in the area of traffic safety than during the past two years. The newspapers, television and radio stations, private citizens, the legislature, government agencies are all making an increasing effort to make an impact on the driving public."

### WHY INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC IN CHRISTIAN WORSHIP IS WRONG

Christ told His aposties to teach Christians to observe "all things whatsoever I have commanded you." (Matt. 28:19) The apostles gave no teaching for having instrumental music in worship, therefore it is not the command of Christ. Is it right to teach and practice something that Christ has not commandated?

Since Christ did not command it, those who use t do so by the authority of man and not by the authority of God. Jesus said. "But in vain do they worship me. teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." (Matt. 15:9)

Christ told His apostles that the Holy Spirit "will guide you into all truth." (John 16:13) But, since the Holy Spirit did not guide them to include instrumental music in the worship of God, it is not a part of the truth. If it is not according to truth, can any Christian conscientiously engage in it?

Paul the apostle said the scriptures furnishes us completely unto all good works (2 Tim. 3:16,17). They do not furnish us with authority on instrumental music in worship, so can using such in worship be "good works?"

Paul tells us "faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God." (Rom. 10:17) The word of God does not teach men to use instrumental music in worshipping God in the Christian age, therefore man cannot so worship in faith. And, Paul says that "Whatsoever is not of faith is sin." (Rom. 14:23) These are just a few of the many reasons why instrumental music in Christian worship is wrong. Why does man persist in that which is without divine authority before God?
