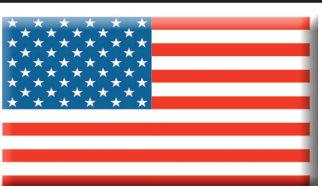

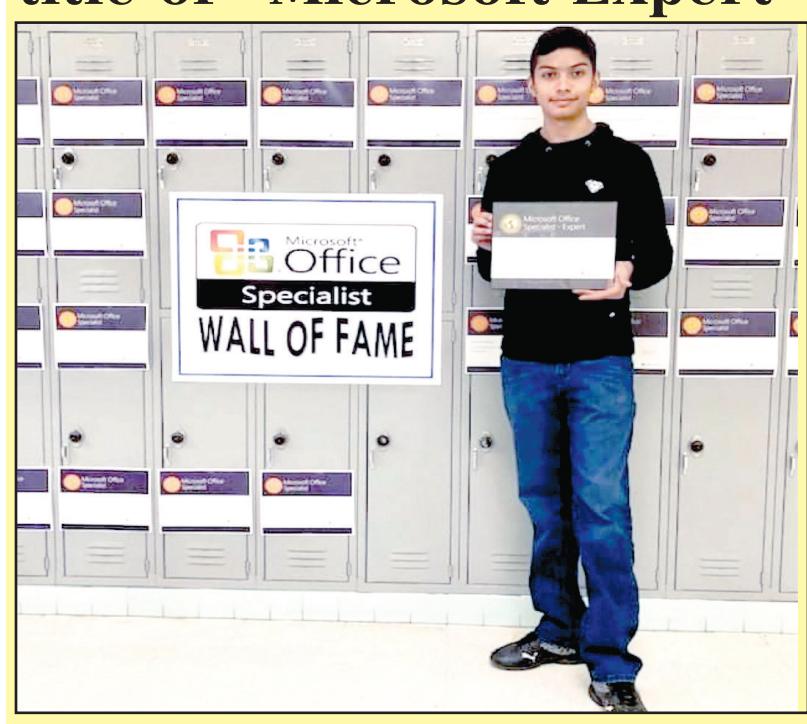

Gas Prices Soar with No Sign of Slowing Down as Russia-Ukraine Conflict Pushes Crude Oil Prices to 11-Year Highs

The statewide gas price average in Texas is \$3.38 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is 17 cents more than from this day last week and is 92 cents more per gallon compared to this day last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in El Paso are paying the most on average at \$3.58 per gallon while drivers in Amarillo are paying the least at \$3.24 per gallon. The national average price for a gallon of regular unleaded is \$3.73, which is 19 cents more when compared to this day last week and 99 cents more than the price per gallon at this same time last year.

Gas price averages in Texas and across the country have increased significantly in the last week, similar to a price spike following a major hurricane. The statewide gas price average has not been as high as \$3.38 since August 2014. The energy market has been volatile in recent weeks due to the war between Russia and Ukraine, causing uncertainty about Russia's large crude oil supplies making it on to the global market. That uncertainty is causing crude oil prices to spike well over \$100 a barrel and means that gas prices will more than likely continue to rise as drivers gear up for spring travel season.

"Oil prices have skyrocketed to 11-year highs due to the volatility in global crude markets caused by Russia's invasion of Ukraine," said AAA Texas spokesperson Daniel Armbruster. "Demand for gasoline will only increase as spring approaches and more people travel. Couple that with rising crude oil prices and drivers can expect to continue to see even higher fuel prices in the days and weeks ahead."

Drivers in Texas are paying the third lowest gas price average in the country, tied with Mississippi, according to gasprices.aaa.com. Meanwhile drivers in California are paying the most at \$4.94 on average for a gallon of regular unleaded.

AAA Tips to save money on fuel:

- Slow down and drive the speed limit. Higher speeds result in more aerodynamic drag.
- Avoid “jackrabbit” starts and hard accelerations. These actions greatly increase fuel consumption.
- Use cruise control on the highway to help maintain a constant speed and save fuel. However, never use cruise control on slippery roads because a loss of vehicle control could result.
- Minimize your use of air conditioning.
- Avoid extended idling to warm up the engine, even in colder tem-

peratures. It's unnecessary and wastes fuel.

- Download the AAA App to find the cheapest gas prices near you.
- Maintain your car according to the manufacturer's recommendations. Regular service will ensure optimum fuel economy.
- Make sure your tires are properly maintained and inflated to the correct level.
- When driving in town, adjust your speed to “time” the traffic lights. This reduces repeated braking and acceleration that consume additional fuel.
- When approaching a red light or stop sign, take your foot off the gas early and allow your car to coast down to a slower speed until it is time to brake.



Something to think about...

“But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved. And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus, in order that in the coming ages he might show the incomparable riches of his grace, expressed in his kindness to us in Christ Jesus. For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast.” ~ Ephesians 2:4-9

This story from my recent devotional reading really challenged me: “People often ask me what Mother Teresa was like,” writes Shane Claiborne in his book *The Irresistible Revolution*. “Sometimes it’s like they wonder if she glowed in the dark or had a halo. She was short, wrinkled, and precious, maybe even a little ornery, like a beautiful, wise old granny. But there is one thing I will never forget – her feet. Her feet were deformed.

Each morning I would stare at them. I wondered if she had contracted leprosy. One day a Sister explained, ‘Her feet are deformed because we get just

enough donated shoes for everyone, and Mother does not want anyone to get stuck with the worst pair, so she digs through and finds them. And years of doing that have deformed her feet.’ Years of loving her neighbour as herself deformed her feet.”

“I try to give to the poor people for love what the rich could get for money. No, I wouldn’t touch a leper for a thousand pounds; yet I willingly cure him for the love of God.” ~ From *A Gift for God* by Mother Teresa

When people are asked about the person whose life they most admire, so often the answer is ‘Mother Teresa’. She made the most of her life. It is a paradox, because her life was a life of self-denial, taking up her cross and following Jesus. She exemplified the kingdom economy of extravagant grace.

What economy are you living in? What value system guides your actions? Do you operate with the you-get-what-you-deserve or the what’s-in-it-for-me mindset or are you motivated by the economy of extravagant grace that says what-can-I-give-for-the-One-who-has-given-me-everything? Let’s be a people who live with such grace that it leaves people of the world scratching their heads wondering what has “gotten into us”. #Extravagant Grace

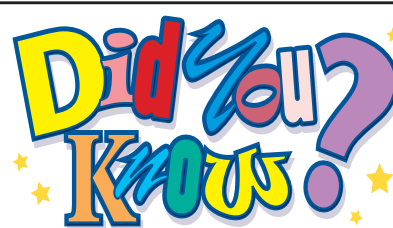

Today in History

Today is Friday, March 4, the 63rd day of 2022. There are 302 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On March 4, 1933, Franklin D. Roosevelt took office as America's 32nd president.

On this date:

In 1789, the Constitution of the United States went into effect as the first Federal Congress met in New York. (The lawmakers then adjourned for lack of a quorum.)

In 1863, the Idaho Territory was created.

In 1865, President Abraham Lincoln was inaugurated for a second term of office; with the end of the Civil War in sight, Lincoln declared: "With malice toward none, with charity for all."

In 1917, Republican Jeannette Rankin of Montana took her seat as the first woman elected to the U.S. House of Representatives, the same day President Woodrow Wilson took his oath of office for a second term (it being a Sunday, a private ceremony was held inside the U.S. Capitol; a second, public swearing-in took place the next day).

In 1966, John Lennon of The Beatles was quoted in the London Evening Standard as saying, "We're more popular than Jesus now," a comment that caused an angry backlash in the United States.

In 1981, a jury in Salt Lake City convicted Joseph Paul Franklin, an avowed racist and serial killer, of violating the civil rights of two Black men, Ted Fields and David Martin, who'd been shot to death. (Franklin received two life sentences for this crime; he was executed in 2013 for the 1977 murder of a Jewish man, Gerald Gordon.)

In 1987, President Ronald Reagan addressed the nation on the Iran-Contra affair, acknowledging that his overtures to Iran had "deteriorated" into an arms-for-hostages deal.

In 1994, in New York, four extremists were convicted of the 1993 World Trade Center bombing that killed six people and injured more than a thousand. Actor-comedian John Candy died in Durango, Mexico, at age 43.

In 1998, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that sexual harassment at work can be illegal even when the offender and victim are of the same gender.

In 2015, the Justice Department cleared Darren Wilson, a white former Ferguson, Missouri, police officer, in the fatal shooting of Michael Brown, a Black 18-year-old, but also issued a scathing report calling for sweeping changes in city law enforcement practices.

In 2018, former Russian spy Sergei Skripal and his daughter were found unconscious on a bench in the southwestern English city of Salisbury; both survived what British authorities said was a murder attempt using a nerve agent.

In 2020, federal health officials investigated a suburban Seattle nursing home at the center of a coronavirus outbreak.

Ten years ago: President Barack Obama, in an address to the American Israel Public Affairs Committee in Washington, said he didn't want war but that he would not hesitate to attack Iran if that were the only option left to stop it from getting a

nuclear weapon. Vladimir Putin scored a decisive victory in Russia's presidential election to return to the Kremlin and extend his hold on power. Nearly 300 people in the Republic of Congo were killed after a series of blasts at an arms depot in the capital Brazzaville.

Five years ago: President Donald Trump accused former President Barack Obama of tapping his telephones during the 2016 election; an Obama spokesman declared that the assertion was "simply false." Tommy Page, a former pop star whose song "I'll Be Your Everything" went to No. 1 in 1990 and who later became a record company executive, died in New York at age 46.

One year ago: Breaking from other Southern GOP governors, Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey extended her state's mask order for another month but said the requirement would end for good in April. Demonstrators in Myanmar protesting the previous month's military coup returned to the streets, undaunted by the killing of at least 38 people a day earlier by security forces.

Bidding quiz

You are the dealer, both sides vulnerable. What would you bid with each of the following four hands?

- ♠ 6♥ AK1095♦ KQ8753♣ 9
- ♠ AK8♥ Q652♦ AJ9♣ A85
- ♠ 5♥ 93♦ QJ1085♣ AKJ106
- ♠ KJ97♥ QJ4♦ QJ7♣ Q52

- One heart.** In general, a six-card suit is named before a five-card suit. But when the suits are adjacent in rank and the high-card content of the hand is close to a minimum, the higher-ranking suit is bid first — even though it may be shorter. The purpose is to keep the bidding at a relatively low level with a hand of limited strength. Bidding diamonds first and hearts next would constitute a "reverse," indicating 17 points or more.
- One club.** Players who are not point-count conscious might open the bidding with one notrump. Admittedly, this 18-point hand looks very notrumpish, considering its flat distribution and scattered high-card strength, but it is far better to show the nature of your hand at your next turn. Nowadays, an opening one-notrump bid promises at most 17

points. This upper limit is inflexible and cannot be varied without risking a calamity. It is better to open one club and then jump to two notrump to deliver the message more accurately. If partner passes one club, the odds are that there is no game in the hand.

- One diamond.** The fact that you have only 11 high-card points is not a good reason for passing. If you did pass, you would have a hard time later convincing partner that you held a hand containing seven or eight potential tricks. Once you decide to open, it is better to start with one diamond than one club, in line with the general rule of first bidding the higher-ranking of two equally long suits.
- Pass.** Though many 12 points hands are worth opening, this one, with no aces, one king and no distributional features, is not one of them. Furthermore, if you begin by bidding one club, a suit in which you don't even have four cards, you may wind up with a minus score when partner forces the bidding to a game that goes down, or you stop short of game after you decline an invitational bid by partner and then fail to make your partscore.

Ukraine

Last week our world was rocked by the Russian invasion of the Ukraine, a sovereign Democratic nation that has resisted Russia's attempts to pull it into its orbit. When I was pastor of an English speaking church in Nuremburg, Germany, we often had visitors from the Ukraine. Since I started writing this column, I have received more than 2,000 online views in the Ukraine.

Though the Ukraine is half a world away, our connections are strong. Over 1 million Americans have Ukrainian descent. According to The Ukrainians in America, the first Ukrainian immigrant arrived in Jamestown in 1607 along with Captain John Smith.

I was moved this week by a post by one of my young friends, Ryan Russell, Associate Pastor for College & Missions at First Baptist Waco, Texas. He and his wife, Raechel married in 2015 and adopted a new-born son last year whose mother is Ukrainian. With Ryan and Rachael's permission, here is what he wrote:

"Our adopted son Griffin is half-Ukrainian. His biological grandparents likely still live there today. It's unlikely I'll ever know them, and yet I care for them deeply. They've made our world possible. They may be strangers, but it hurts to think they could be in danger. We'll never know.

"Lately, Griffin has been getting lonely on car rides across town. A rear facing car seat means staring into the unknown. Talking helps, but I've found the best thing I can do is to stretch back and offer a finger for him to hold. "Hey bud, I got you. I'm here.

"Silly as it may sound, I've begun to imagine these lonely cries as the vicarious cries of his people. Also staring into the darkness, they sorely need a finger to grasp onto. Yet halfway across the globe, it is easy to feel powerless in the face of evil, easy to give into despair.

"Writing in the early third century, Origen, an early church father, once said: 'One saint who prays is much more powerful than countless sinners who wage war.'

"I find this to be an outrageously audacious claim: that there is a power in the world stronger

than violence, and it will have the last word. Further, this power is made available here and now when we pray. Prayer seems passive and soft, and yet for those with eyes to see, is the true power that runs the world.

"So every night for the foreseeable future, I'll get on my knees in the dark near his crib, and do what I can to unleash more of this power into the world. I'd invite you to do the same. As we pray, we know God has not forgotten Ukraine. The darker the night grows, the louder his voice resounds: "I got you. I'm here."

David wrote in the Psalms, "The Lord is righteous in all His ways and faithful in all He does.

The Lord is near to all who call on Him, to all who call on Him in truth. He fulfills the desires of those who fear Him; He hears their cry and saves them." (Psalm 145:17-19).
