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### 9/11 Memorial slated Sunday at Spring Creek remember those who have fallen, but **Herald Staff Report**

Life has changed many times, many ways over the years, but nothing impacted us more than the events that transpired 21 years ago in New York City when the World Trade Center was attacked by members of Al Qaeda.

We still feel the loss of the thousands that died, but none more-so than the first responders. While the attack was almost 2 thousand miles away, it effected all of us and has given us a new appreciation for those who run to the fire while the rest of us run away. # 370 new words and definitions added to Merriam-Webster

Today Merriam-Webster announced the addition of 370 new words and meanings to its iconic dictionary. Some of these new terms, like shrinkflation and metaverse, have recently been in the news; others, like *yeet* and *janky*, are more lighthearted. All have met the dictionary's criteria by demonstrating sustained and widespread use. None of this, to cite another new entry, is sus: the English language is always changing and expanding, and the dictionary's

mandate is to chronicle it. A number of the new words surged into use via social media. These include yeet, slang for "throw" and also "used to express surprise, approval, or excited enthusiasm;" sponcon, sponsored con-

post; and virtue signaling, something people may be accused of if they display their attentiveness to political or social issues instead of taking effective action. The tech world brings us the futuristic

tent that looks like a typical influencer

*metaverse*, but also the earthy *meatspace* ("the physical world and environment especially as contrasted with the virtual world of cyberspace") and the throwback dumbphone, a device lacking advanced features. Business and economics provide the

newly prominent shrinkflation (which occurs when a product's amount or volume is reduced but not, alas, its price) and a pair of terms describing those who don't save money in conventional ways because they are unbanked or underbanked. If such words cause anxiety, some re-

lief may be found in dawn chorus: "the singing of wild birds that closely precedes and follows sunrise especially in spring and summer."

Food-related newcomers include that seasonal object of love and hate, pumpkin spice. Also new are omakase, referring to a series of sushi selections "according to the chef's choice," and mojo, a definition to savor: "a sauce, marinade, or seasoning that is usually composed primarily of olive oil, garlic, citrus juice, and spices (such as black pepper and cumin)." Sus, slang for "suspicious" or "sus-

pect," joins other informal words including *janky* ("of very poor quality; junky"), and the gaming-fueled pwn— "to dominate and defeat (someone or See **DICTIONARY**, Page 2

something)." And television has made its impression too: Galentine's Day, from Parks and Recreation, and the slang verb *MacGyver* ("to make, form, or repair something with what is conveniently on hand"), are both new entries.

Younger dictionary fans also get words to appreciate. The dictionary welcomes cootie catcher ("a child's toy that consists of paper folded into four pyramid-shaped parts that are manipulated by the fingers to open and close with each part having a flap that can be unfolded to reveal an answer to one's question about the future"),

plushie ("a toy covered in plush fabric and filled with soft material"), and cute alert!—hoglet, a British word for a baby hedgehog.

"Some of these words will amuse or inspire, others may provoke debate. Our job is to capture the language as it is used," says Peter Sokolowski, Editor at Large for Merriam-Webster. "Words offer a window into our everchanging language and culture, and are only added to the dictionary when there is clear and sustained evidence of use."

# Sarkisian trek from Bama built pipeline to aid Texas rebuild

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Steve Sarkisian left his job as an Alabama assistant to be the head coach at Texas in January 2021 and quickly blazed a 735-mile trail from Tuscaloosa to Austin for others to follow.

The core of his offensive coaching staff made the trek and a handful of players looking for fresh starts or more playing time have been trickling in ever since. Sarkisian has three top assistants who were on the Alabama sideline when the Crimson Tide won the 2020 national champion-

Is he building Alabama West? The early returns — a 5-7 season in 2021 have so far been rather un-Bama like. Sarkisian and the Longhorns (1-0)

have a chance to make a statement

Saturday. The No. 1 Crimson Tide (1-0) play on the road against their future SEC opponent, which is hoping the success Sarkisian experienced in Tuscaloosa can finally rub off in Austin.

Sarkisian often credits Alabama's Nick Saban as a major force in restoring his coaching career after he was fired at

Southern California midway into the 2015 season and went into alcohol rehabilitation treatment.

Working under Saban first as an analyst in 2016 and then returning as Alabama offensive coordinator in 2019 and 2020 allowed Sarkisian an insider's view of what Saban demands from his staff, as well as what he could demand from himself.

Sarkisian has said quite frankly that Saban saved his career.

"I owe so much to him, and I will never, ever forget that he and Ms. Terry have been tremendous in my life and my wife's life and what they've done for us on and off the field, I owe them a great deal," Sarkisian said at Big 12 media days in July.

The praise continued this week as Sarkisian prepared to face his former mentor for the first time from the opposite sideline.

"We could be up here for hours talking about things that I learned from him ... and what he's done for guys like myself," Sarkisian said, also recalling the sting of Saban's rebukes when something went wrong.

"If he's yelling at you, you probably didn't reach a level of expectation. When you can meet his expectations, you are doing something right." Sarkisian said. "I loved my time with

And when it was time to build his own staff, Sarkisian wanted assistants forged from the same fire that shaped him.

Texas offensive line coach Kyle Flood, special teams and tight ends coach Jeff Banks and quarterbacks coach A.J.

Milwee all followed Sarkisian from

Alabama to join his rebuild. This group of coaches left a program that won eight Southeastern Conference championships in the 13 years since Texas last won the Big 12. Alabama has won six national titles since 2009.

Their first season in Austin produced the program's first six-game losing streak in 65 years. "Patience" was the word around campus.

Saban this week praised his former assistant and has called Sarkisian one of the finest coaches he's ever had on his staff.





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

The bidding:

South West North

Pass Pass 1 ♣ Pass 2 NT Pass 3 NT Opening lead — three of diamonds.

Most errors in bridge are caused not by a lack of knowledge or skill, but rather by lazy or careless thinking. This is equally true for both offensive and defensive play.

Consider this case where West leads a diamond against three notrump. East wins with the ace and continues with the queen, which also wins. Then, having run out of diamonds, East shifts to a heart.

Declarer wins and drives out the ace of clubs. West cashes the king of diamonds, and South scores the rest, losing three diamonds and a club.

Analysis of the play reveals that

the contract should go down one. Instead of allowing his partner to win the second trick with the queen of diamonds — which seems the natural thing to do — West should overtake the queen with the king and continue with the eight of diamonds. If he does this, the defense eventually scores four diamonds and a club.

There is no good reason other than carelessness for West's failure to overtake the queen at trick two. True, East might have held the A-Q-x of diamonds, in which case overtaking would cost West a trick, but it could not cost him the ultimate goal of setting the contract.

For practical purposes, West can feel certain that three notrump will be defeated if he overtakes the queen, and that the contract will probably be made if he ducks the queen. That is certainly reason enough for overtaking. But to make this play, West must have his mind on the game at trick two and not allow himself to fall into the trap of following low mechanically.

In 1941, the 900-day Siege of Leningrad by German forces began during World War II.

In 1943, during World War II, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower announced Italy's surrender; Nazi Germany denounced Italy's decision as a cowardly act. In 1951, a peace treaty with Japan was signed by 49 nations in San Francisco.

In 1964, public schools

in Prince Edward County, Virginia, reopened after being closed for five years by officials attempting to prevent court-ordered racial desegregation.

In 1985, Pete Rose of the Cincinnati Reds tied Ty Cobb's career record for hits, singling for hit number 4,191 during a game against the Cubs in Chicago.

In 1986, "The Oprah Winfrey Show" began the first of 25 seasons in national syndication.

In 2016, California and federal regulators fined Wells Fargo a combined \$185 million, alleging the bank's employees illegally opened millions of unauthorized accounts for their customers in order to meet aggressive sales goals.

In one of the country's largest evacuations, officials in Florida told more than 5 million people to leave their homes ahead of the hurricane; parts of interstates 75 and 95 northbound were bumper-to-bumper. Singer Troy Gentry, half of the country music duo Montgomery Gentry, died in a helicopter crash in Medford, New Jersey; pilot James Robinson was also killed.

One year ago: The trial

of disgraced Theranos CEO Elizabeth Holmes began in San Jose, California, with prosecutors casting her as a conniving entrepreneur who duped investors, customers and patients for years, while defense lawyers described her as a tireless worker who tried to develop a faster, cheaper and less invasive way to test blood samples. (Holmes would be convicted on four counts of investor fraud and conspiracy.) The Supreme Court blocked the lethal injection of convicted killer John Henry Ramirez after his attorney argued that Texas was violating his religious freedom

by not letting his pastor lay hands on him at the time of his lethal injection. (The court later ruled that states must accommodate the wishes of death row inmates who want to have their pastors pray aloud and even touch them during their executions.) Derek Jeter, Ted Simmons, Larry Walker and the late labor executive Marvin Miller were inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame as the Class of 2020 was honored a year late because of the coronavirus

pandemic.

The Steers offense once again put on a impressive show as the Steers finished the night with a total of 529 yards total offense enroute to the win over the

Steer junior quarterback, Gavin Padron once again put up some impressive numbers as he finished the game completing 27 out of 30 passes for 359 – yards with two rushing touchdowns and three touchdown passes.

However, it was senior running back, Kavien Ford who stole the show as he dominated the entire game. All game long Ford's run game plagued Lubbock High's defense as they struggled to come up with an answer in stopping Ford.

Ford would finish the game with 179 – yards rushing on 19 carries and three touchdowns in the game. In addition to his rushing yards, Ford also had 49 – yards in receiving as well, bringing his total yards to 228 for the entire game.

"I'm feeling good right now, my lineman helped a lot so really I'm thankful for them." Ford said about his performance in the game. "I felt like we came in really prepared this game, that game we lost last week really made us want to get better and come back and play harder than last week and just im-

Steer head coach Cannon McWilliams also praised Ford's performance "I think he stole the show tonight." McWilliams added "Once he gets a head of steam he's just tough to tackle but again that goes back to his work ethic, he deserves it, he works hard and he's a good kid." McWillams added.

Both McWilliams and Ford agree though that the offensive line really stepped up in this game. "I was really impressed with our offensive because they controlled the line of scrimmage and it all starts up front." McWilliams said. "It opened up a lot of things offensively for us by controlling the line of scrimmage," McWilliams added

On the defensive side the Steers had an overall better game as they limited their mistakes this time around. " I was also really impressed with our defensive line again they controlled the line of scrimmage and made it difficult for their good running back to get rolling so a great job on their part." McWilliams said.

Just like in their first game against Pampa, the Steers offense wasted little time in getting things rolling. Kavien Ford would help put the Steers on the board first with his first touchdown of the night. The extra point was no good and the Steers would finish out the first quarter leading 6-0.

To start the second quarter, senior wide receiver/ defensive back Zeyire Franklin made a huge play intercepting a Lubbock High pass taking over on Lubbock High's 40 – yard line.

COAHOMA - This time the Coahoma Bulldogs finished the job. Unlike last week when the Bulldogs blew a two-touchdown fourth quarter lead in a season opening loss to Forsan, the Bulldog dominated the fourth quarter to get a hard earned 31-27 win over the Sonora Broncos at Bill Easterling Stadium. Trailing 27-24 going into the final quarter, the Bulldogs scored the winning touchdown early in the fourth quarter on a 50-yard touchdown pass from Boyd Cox to Austin Perkins. After that the Coahoma defense made several key stops and the offense, behind the hard running of Isaiah Eleda, played ball control and wore the Sonora defense down. Billy Bailey sealed the deal with an interception on Sonora's last possession. "I'm especially happy with this win considering how we finished the game last week," said Coahoma Coach Chris Joslin. "That was a hard football game last week. But we went to work and eliminated our mistakes an made the most of it. I don't I think I could be prouder of these

kids." The Coahoma defense came up big in this one, forcing five Sonora turnovers. Sophomore defensive back Mikey Hernandez had an interception and the ever-present Perkins picked up a Sonora fumble and returned it 17 yards for Coahoma's first score of the game. The Broncos were somewhat snakebit, losing three fumbles in their first four possessions. The other possession it scored on a 65-yard scoring pass from Jamie Buitron to Hector O'Bannon. Buitron and O'Bannon were Sonora's main weapons. Buitron led all rushers with 140 yards. In addition to his touchdown catch O'Bannon carried 14 times for 85 yards. For Coahoma, Eleda was workhorse on the ground, finishing the night with 95 yards on 22 carries. He shouldered the running attack with Jaiden Vineyard missing the game with an injury. The Bulldogs also unleashed the two quarterback tandem of Cox and Bailey, which kept the Broncos off balance. Cox was effective in the air while Bailey had some key runs in the fourth quarter to help seal the deal. "In addition he threw a touchdon pass to Perkins. We got some turnovers early and that helped put us at ease," Joslin said. "We held it together." Coahoma will be on the road Friday when it takes on Kermit.

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
