Big Spring City Council approves 2022-23 tax rate and budget

The Big Spring City Council held its regular meeting Tuesday at the Council Chambers at 307 Nolan. Following the invocation, the public was given an opportunity to speak on any topic, but none came forward at that time. The annual budget was first on the

agenda. A public hearing is held annually for the public to comment on the city budget and proposed tax rate and was first on the agenda. A call for comment resulted in none coming forward.

Items 7 through 16, Request for abatements for public nuisance was discussed at some length with comment from property owners and code compliance officers who were assigned to each case. passed for nine of the 11 properties. Orders to abate only were passed for 2802 Apache and 604 NE 10th St., due to being the residence of the owners.

The City Manager's report consisted of a reminder that large item pickup will be Sept. 21 in District 3. City Manager Todd Darden also discussed a reinstatement of the Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) ordinance that limits truck traffic through town, specifically Gregg St. Trucks that make deliveries will be allowed on designated routes, but oversize or overloaded trucks will be limited to the reliever route due to public safety and road degradation concerns. The motion to make the request to TXDOT was passed.

The meeting's Consent Agenda, consisting of second readings of items approved during previous City Council meetings, was approved. Also, a Final Reading of a Resolution Repealing City Council Resolution 003-2016, "Which Set the Goal of Ending the Euthanization of Homeless Pets; Providing for Severability; and Providing an Effective Date,' was approved.

The matter of bids for fencing at the Sandy Creek landfill was untabled, but because it isn't an urgent matter, no action will be taken at this time and the city will take other bids on the project.

The Big Spring Economic Development Corporation anual budget that included the \$400,000 match for an anticipated grant for the infrastructure for the I-27 designation, was approved.

The council approved the first Reading of a resolution amending the authorized

Two killed in I-20 accidents near Big Spring this week By ROGER CLINE Ashley Hernandeza, 23, a passenger in

A 23-year-old El Paso woman and an

83-year-old Big Spring man were killed in separate Interstate 20 accidents near Big Spring this week, according to reports from the Texas Department of Public Safety. At about 2:33 p.m. Sunday, Fabian Hernandez, 28, of El Paso was driv-

ing his 2006 Toyota Tacoma west on I-20 about two and a half miles west of Stanton when he apparently fell asleep at the wheen and partially crossed into the center median. The report goes on to say Hernandez overcorrected back onto the roadway, causing the vehicle to roll over multiple times.

the vehicle, was transported to Martin County Hospital, where she was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace Nancy Bradshaw. Fabian Hernandez was taken to Medical Center Hospital in Odessa in serious

condition; while a third passenger - a three-year-old girl – was transported to serious condition.

Covenant Medical Center in Lubbock in According to the DPS report, only Fabian Hernandez was secured by a safety belt. Weather conditions at the time of the wreck were reportedly clear and dry.

driving the wrong direction on the Interstate, Kelly's vehicle collided with the 2020 Freightliner tractor-trailer driven by Eric Lee Givens, 34, of San Antonio. Kelly was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace Angela Griffin, while Givens was not injured in the wreck. Both men were reportedly wearing safety belts. Weather conditions at the time of the

wreck were clear and dry, and the accident was investigated by Trooper Devonte Rolle of Big Spring.

representative empowered to transmit and withdraw funds from TexPool as well as the first reading of a resolution seeking permission to apply for a grant through the Office of the Governor, Public Safety Office Criminal Justice Division for funding of bullet-resistant shields.

An item re-approving the city's investment policy was also approved.

The budget concerning waste water rates was on the agenda. Wastewater rates will stay the same for people who use only up to 2000 gallons which is mostly seniors and those on fixed incomes.

Another item concerning landfill rates was ap-

proved. According to the item, the city will now charge a fee to allow a company's commercial trucks to utilize the landfill, rather than charging individually for each truck. Tire disposal fees were changed to \$4 per tire, where previously the disposal fee was based on the weight of the tire.

The city's tax rate and budget for 2022-23 were ap-

proved, and included a \$0.673163 per \$100 valuation property tax rate, which is the same rate used in 2021. This rate will increase the Maintenance and Operation budget by \$327,709.

In the new budget, the Animal Control Building's

capital account was increased by \$60,000, to make improvements to the existing building to utilize as an office.

In addition, the Communications account was in-

creased by \$10,000 to provide for fiber optic cable so the shelter's computer can be connected to the

erver

Also, Signal Systems Revised Budget, was increased by \$28,000 to purchase new LED bulbs for the streetlights, specifically on Gregg Street; Code Enforcement/Permits budgets (both Revised and Proposed) were increased by \$10,000 each.

Special Services Discounts/Rebates was created to pay for the Infill Program refunds being utilized by local contractors; Department 211 (SAFER Grant) was reduced by \$420,413, in anticipation of the completion of the SAFER Grant.

The employees that are being paid out of that De-

partment will be moved to Department 210 – Fire Department in March at the conclusion of the grant.

Since the Planning Department was eliminated,

a need was determined to budget for the Contract Planner.
Therefore, \$25,000 was added to the Planning De-

partment account. Payscale and incentives were

topics of discussion regarding new recruits for new Big Spring Police Department, as well as for retainment at the Big Spring Fire Department. A sliding scale to the current pay scale was approved. The council approved allowing West Texas Disc Golf to rent the Dora Roberts Community Center using city funds provided by hotel tax revenue. An amendment to the item limited the arrangement

to a maximum of five years. The Disc Golf tournament is considered a tourism boost and was considered for city support.

The action that was approved reads, "Assistance may be obtained by events without the five-year limitation upon the following conditions: meeting

the funding criteria, including THLA guidelines;

the funding being used solely to rent City-owned and operated facilities; and with the amount of such rent shall being no more than \$2,000. By motion or otherwise, City Council or the CVB board may waive the deposit for such an event. No single program, funding, or contract committing revenues from the hotel occupancy tax with a duration of more than five years may be agreed to on behalf of the city without prior action by city council."

Keep Texas Recycling agreement is a branch of Keep Big Spring Beautiful and is used as a public relations tool to get other businesses involved and because there is a vendor that will buy the cardboard, it will generate income for the city. A budget of \$10,000 to purchase a baler and to get started. Issues of unapproved items in the bins has been considered and included in the budget and the motion was approved.

The action on the agenda by a private citizen in regards to a railroad quiet zone was tabled.

During council input. Gloria McDonald encouraged all members to register for Ports to Plains. Council member Troy Tompkins commented that although the item to repeal the previous action in regards to animal rescue, "Although we approved the action, we are still concerned about finding possible solutions to the problem other than simply putting them down." Mayor Robert Moore concurred with the statement.

Council member Maury Smith commented that Big Spring and Texas are "On the move," and, "We ought to be proud of ourselves."

Following a motion, the City Council adjourned.

Ex-deputy gets life for killing ex-wife, stepdaughter, man

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A former Texas sheriff's deputy has been sentenced the sexual assault charge as part of Broderick's plea deal. Amanda and Alyssa

to life imprisonment without parole for killing his ex-wife, teenage stepdaughter and the stepdaughter's boyfriend.

Former Travis County sheriff's deputy Stephen Broderick, 42, was automatically sentenced after pleading guilty to capital murder Tuesday in Austin in the 2021 deaths of ex-wife Amanda Broderick, 35; stepdaughter Alyssa Broderick, 17; and Willie Simmons III, 18. Broderick rammed his vehicle into his ex-wife's house and shot dead all three people inside.

Prosecutors set aside a possible death penalty in exchange for the guilty plea. The ex-deputy killed the three during a custody visit with his son, whom he didn't shoot. Stephen Broderick was free on bond at the time of the shooting after being charged the year before with the sexual assault of a child and losing his job as a result.

Stephen Broderick was ordered to wear a GPS tracking device, but state District Judge Karen Sage ordered the removal of the device five months after his release, the Austin American-Statesman reported. Prosecutors dropped

the sexual assault charge as part of Broderick's plea deal. Amanda and Alyssa Broderick's family said the dismissal denied justice to Alyssa, who was the victim of the sexual assault.

But prosecutors said they doubted they could obtain a conviction on the charge because the victim was dead.

Sage, who passed the sentence on Broderick, expressed sympathy with their anger.

"I wish I could bring you justice," Sage said. "But the truth is, the loss you're suffering, there's nothing I can do to make that loss go away. DNA leads to an arrest in 2014 killing of Houston family

HOUSTON (AP) — Authorities say newly tested DNA evidence helped them make an arrest in the killings more than eight years ago of a family, including two boys, who were shot in their suburban Houston home.

Feng Lu, 58, who had long been considered a suspect in the case, was arrested on Sunday by police in San Francisco after his arrival from China, according to Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez.

Lu has been charged with capital murder in the deaths of Maoye Sun and his wife Mei Xie and the couple's two sons, 7-year-old Titus and 9-year-old Timothy, the sheriff said in a tweet on Tuesday.

Lu was being held Wednesday at a jail in San Mateo County, California, pending extradition to Texas. Court records did not list an attorney for Lu who could speak on his behalf.

The bodies of all four family members were found on Jan. 30, 2014, in their home in the Houston suburb of Cypress. All had been shot in the head. Investigators said Sun was last seen alive leaving work on Jan. 24.

Lu was linked to the killings after new forensic testing done in January on samples that previously were not able to be identified showed that Lu's DNA was found on a purse that belonged to Xie, according to a probable cause affidavit.

The DNA testing contradicted statements Lu had made previously to investigators in which he had said he did not know Xie or her children and didn't know where the family lived, according to the affidavit

Authorities have not disclosed a motive for the killings, but according to the affidavit, Lu had unsuccessfully tried to get Sun's help with a promotion at work. Both had worked at Cameron International, which provides products and services to oil and gas companies.

Lu "stated he believed that (Sun) made derogatory comments about him to fellow

derogatory comments about him to fellow co-workers ... which may have been the reason he did not get the promotion," according to the affidavit. Investigators say Lu had bought a hand-

Investigators say Lu had bought a handgun a week before the killings and then returned it five days after the killings without the weapon's barrel. Authorities allege Lu gave inconsistent stories about what happened to the gun's barrel. Investigators also allege that bullets Lu had bought with the gun had likely been manufactured on the same machine as the bullet that killed one of the boys, Titus.



SEC full of tight-end talent, led by Bell, Bowers, Trigg

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — It's difficult to truly gauge the Southeastern Conference's tight-end talent through two weeks of the season.

There's little chance the same will be said after

The powerhouse league has arguably its deepest and most skilled tight-end group in years. The collection includes big-time playmakers and is sure to produce NFL first-round draft picks such as Kyle Pitts (Florida), Hayden Hurst (South Carolina), Evan Engram (Ole Miss) and O.J. Howard (Ala-

South Carolina's Jaheim Bell, Georgia's Brock Bowers and Mississippi's Michael Trigg top the list. They're big. They're fast. They're versatile. And they're hardly alone.

Here's a look at the best of the SEC's current crop, five of whom will share a field when South Carolina (1-1) hosts top-ranked and defending national champion Georgia (2-0) on Saturday:

BELL, SOUTH CAROLINA

Bell might be the most multifaceted tight end in the SEC, possibly in the country. The 6-foot-3, 230-pound junior from Lake City, Florida, lines up all over the field. He has four catches for 18 yards to go with 11 carries for 44 more. He also owns the top two receiving games by a tight end in school history: 136 yards against Vanderbilt and 159 against North Carolina.

"He's a freak athlete," teammate and fellow tight end Austin Stogner said. "You can really put him anywhere."

BOWERS, GEORGIA

Anyone who watched the eventual champs play last season should remember Bowers. The 6-4, 230-pound native of Napa, California, burst onto the scene as a freshman, finishing with 56 receptions for 882 yards and 13 touchdowns. He has five catches for 95 yards this year, getting plenty of time off during Georgia's back-to-back blowouts.

ARIK GILBERT, GEORGIA

Arik Gilbert appears to be the odd man out in Georgia's ultra-deep position group. The former LSU starter and the No. 1 tight end prospect in the 2020 recruiting class doesn't have a reception while playing behind Bowers and Darnell Washington. He caught 35 passes for 368 yards and two TDs as a freshman with the Tigers before entering the transfer portal.

He was briefly committed to Florida but ended up in Athens, about 80 miles from his home in Marietta, Georgia. Coach Kirby Smart said Gilbert's lack of playing time has more to do with his practice habits than the depth chart.

"It's really based on Arik's performance," Smart said. "It's not really based on those guys ... That's all based on how he practices and how he carries over to game day."

STOGNER, SOUTH CAROLINA

The Oklahoma transfer landed at South Carolina along with quarterback Spencer Rattler. They already have chemistry, although Stogner has just six catches for 75 yards through two games. The 6-6, 251-pound senior from Plano, Texas, had 47 receptions for 654 yards and eight scores with the Sooners. And he enjoys blocking as much as anything else he does.

"It's amazing; it's an extra O-lineman on the field," Gamecocks running back Marshawn Lloyd

MASON TAYLOR, LSU

First-year LSU coach Brian Kelly called the son of Pro Football Hall of Famer Jason Taylor "the No. 1 surprise of camp." Mason Taylor has five catches for 47 yards, including a 17-yarder that set up a late touchdown against Florida State.

"He's been outstanding," Kelly said, adding that Taylor has added 20 pounds. "I've been blessed. I've had some great tight ends. I've got seven of them right now who are active in the NFL. And Mason

Taylor is as good as any freshman tight end that I've had."

TRIGG, OLE MISS

The Southern Cal transfer had three TD receptions in last week's 59-3 romp over Central Arkansas, all from inside the 10-yard line. The 6-3, 240-pound sophomore from Tampa, Florida, has nine receptions for 61 yards. He caught seven balls for 109 yards and a score in six games with the Trojans in 2021. He landed in Oxford as part of the package deal with quarterback Jaxson Dart.

Rebels coach Lane Kiffin likes what he's seen from Trigg but wants more.

"There's some inconsistency there because he's a young player," Kiffin said. "He needs to play more consistent because you can see the big-play potential."

WASHINGTON, GEORGIA

No one his size is supposed to move like that. But Washington has rare traits. The 6-7, 260-pound junior is a blocking beast as well as a threat to run by linebackers and post up — or leap over — defensive backs. He has four catches for 66 yards, well on his way to surpass his two-year totals of 17 receptions for 320 yards and a score.

He already created a career highlight when he hurdled Oregon cornerback Bryan Addison in the team's opener.

"Darnell Washington is in the best shape he's been in," Smart said recently, adding the big man can play "harder for longer."

The SEC appears poised for talent at the position for years to come, too.

Texas A&M signed three of the top six tight-end prospects in its ballyhooed 2022 class: Jake Johnson, Donovan Green and Theo Melin Öhrström. Georgia landed the No. 2 guy on the list, Oscar Delp.

Tennessee and Georgia have commitments from the second- and third-rated tight-end recruits for 2023. The Vols ave a pledge from Ethan Davis of Suwanee, while the Dawgs are in line to land Pearce Spurlin of Santa Rosa Beach, Florida.

Texts: Mississippi governor knew of welfare payment to Favre

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Newly revealed text messages show how deeply involved a Mississippi governor was in directing more than \$1 million in welfare money to retired NFL quarterback Brett Favre.

Instead of the money going to help low-income families in one of the nation's poorest states, as intended, it was funneled through a nonprofit group to Favre and spent on a new volleyball facility at a university that the football star and the governor both attended.

The texts from 2017 show Republican Gov. Phil Bryant, who left office in 2020, was "on board" with the arrangement. The state is suing Favre and others, alleging they misspent millions of dollars in welfare money. The director of the nonprofit has pleaded guilty to criminal charges in Mississippi's largest public corruption case in decades.

The texts were in court documents filed Monday in state court by an attorney for the nonprofit known as the Mississippi Community Education Center. The messages between Favre and the center's executive director, Nancy New, included references to Bryant.

The texts showed discussion between Favre and New about arranging payment from the Mississippi Department of Human Services through the nonprofit to Favre for speaking engagements, with Favre then saying he would direct the money to the volleyball facility at the University of Southern Mississippi.

Favre played football at the university in Hattiesburg before going to the NFL in 1991, and his daughter started playing on the volleyball team there in 2017. According to court documents, Fa-

vre texted New on Aug. 3, 2017: "If you were to pay me is there anyway the media can find out where it came from and how much?" New responded: "No, we never have

had that information publicized. I understand you being uneasy about that though. Let's see what happens on Monday with the conversation with some of the folks at Southern. Maybe it will click with them. Hopefully.' Favre responded: "Ok thanks."

The next day, New texted Favre:

"Wow, just got off the phone with Phil Bryant! He is on board with us! We will get this done!"

Favre responded: "Awesome I needed to hear that for sure." Attorneys for Favre did not imme-

diately respond to a phone message

Press. In a July 11 court filing, New's at-

torney wrote that Bryant directed her to pay \$1.1 million in welfare money to Favre through the education center for "speaking at events, keynote speaking, radio and promotional events, and business partner development."

In July, a Bryant spokesperson said allegations that the governor improperly spent the money are false and that Bryant had asked the state auditor to investigate possible welfare fraud.

Bryant served two terms as governor and could not run again in 2019 because of term limits. He earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Southern Mississippi.

New and her son, Zachary New, who helped run the nonprofit, pleaded guilty in April to charges of misspending welfare money. They await sentencing and have agreed to testify against others.

Favre has not been charged with

any criminal wrongdoing. In May, the Mississippi Department of Human Services filed a civil lawsuit against Favre, three former pro wrestlers and several other people

and businesses to try to recover mil-

lions of misspent welfare dollars. The

Wednesday from The Associated lawsuit said the defendants "squandered" more than \$20 million from the Temporary Assistance for Needy

Families anti-poverty program. About 1,800 Mississippi households received payments from the program in 2021, according to the Department of Human Services. A family of three must have a monthly income below \$680 to qualify for help, and the current monthly benefit for that family is \$260. Payments are allowed for up to

five years. In pleading guilty, Nancy and Zachary New acknowledged taking part in spending \$4 million of welfare money for the volleyball facility.

The mother and son also acknowledged directing welfare money to Prevacus Inc., a Florida-based company that was trying to develop a concussion drug. Favre has said in interviews that he supported Prevacus.

Mississippi Auditor Shad White said Favre was paid for speeches but did not show up. Favre has repaid the money, but White said in October that he still owed \$228,000 in interest.

In a Facebook post when he repaid the first \$500,000, Favre said he didn't know the money came from welfare funds. He also said his charity had provided millions of dollars to poor children in Mississippi and Wiscon-



Self-preservation is a fundamental law of life, and this instinct to survive extends to the bridge table as well. Once a player recognizes

he naturally should do everything he possibly can to avoid it.

Consider this deal where South reaches four hearts on the bidding shown, and West leads his singleton spade. East takes the ace and returns the queen. If South impul-

that there is a possibility of defeat,

one-trick defeat. He loses two spade tricks right away and two more spades later on. But if declarer recognizes the

danger facing him at trick two and obeys the normal instinct to survive, he makes the contract very easily. Given the bidding, it is not difficult to diagnose West's lead as a singleton, so South should anticipate the consequences that are likely to ensue if he covers the queen with the king. He knows the king will be ruffed and that he will almost certainly lose two more spades later on.

To safeguard the king, South should duck the queen at trick two and allow East to win the trick. He should also duck when East next continues with the jack. West ruffs the third spade with the six in front of dummy's four, but that is the end of the line for the defense.

Declarer can arrive at the correct play by viewing the problem from an entirely different perspective. He has 10 winners — six hearts, two diamonds, a club and the king of spades — once the ace of spades is played at trick one, and all he has to do to preserve those 10 tricks is to make sure that the king of spades does not get ruffed.

Today in History: September 15, Birmingham church bombing

Today in History

Today is Thursday, Sept. 15, the 258th day of 2022. There are 107 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 15, 1963, four Black girls were killed when a bomb went off during Sunday services at the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama. (Three Ku Klux Klansmen were eventually convicted for their roles in the blast.)

On this date:

In 1776, British forces occupied New York City during the American Revolution.

In 1789, the U.S. Department of Foreign Affairs was renamed the Department of State.

In 1857, William Howard Taft, Äî who served as President of the United States and as U.S. chief justice, Äî was born in Cincinnati, Ohio.

In 1935, the Nuremberg Laws deprived German Jews of their citizenship.

In 1940, during the World War II Battle of Britain, the tide turned as the Royal Air Force inflicted heavy losses upon the Luftwaffe.

In 1955, the novel "Lolita," by Vladimir

lished in Paris.

In 1959, Nikita Khrushchev became the first Soviet head of state to visit the United States as he arrived at Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington.

In 1972, a federal grand jury in Washington indicted seven men in connection with the Watergate break-in.

In 1981, the Senate Judiciary Committee voted unanimously to approve the Supreme Court nomination of Sandra Day O'Connor.

In 1985, Nike began selling its "Air Jordan 1" sneaker.

In 2001, President George W. Bush ordered U.S. troops to get ready for war and braced Americans for a long, difficult assault against terrorists to avenge the Sept. 11 attack. Beleaguered Afghans streamed out of Kabul, fearing a U.S. military strike against Taliban rulers harboring Osama bin Laden.

In 2006, Ford Motor Co. took drastic steps to remold itself into a smaller, more competitive company, slashing thousands of jobs and shuttering two additional plants.

Ten years ago: Four days after the deadly attack on a U.S. diplomatic outpost in Benghazi, Libya, al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula called for more attacks on U.S. embassies.

The State Department

ordered non-essential government personnel and family members to leave its embassies in Sudan and Tunisia and warned U.S. citizens against traveling to the two countries. The National Hockey League locked out its players at 11:59 p.m. EDT; it was the league's fourth shutdown in a decade and one that would cost the league nearly half its season.

Five years ago: North

Korea fired an interme-

diate-range missile over Japan into the northern Pacific, its longest-ever such flight. A bomb partially detonated on a London subway car, injuring 51 people. (An 18-year-old Iraqi asylum-seeker was convicted of attempted murder and sentenced to a minimum of 34 years in prison.) Harvard University reversed its decision to name as a visiting fellow Chelsea Manning, the former soldier who'd been convicted of leaking classified information. The Cleveland Indians saw their winning streak end at 22, an American League record, as they lost 4-3 to the Kansas City Royals. NASA's Cassini spacecraft disintegrated in the skies above Saturn after a journey of 20 years; it was the only spacecraft ever to orbit Saturn and sent back images of the planet, its rings and its moons. Character actor Harry Dean Stanton died at the age of 91.

One year ago: California Democratic Gov. Gavin Newsom emphatically defeated

a recall aimed at kicking him out of office. SpaceX's first private flight streaked into orbit for a three-day trip carrying two contest winners, a health care worker and their rich sponsor. Olympic gold medalist Simone Biles told a Senate panel that the FBI and gymnastics officials turned a "blind eye" to USA Gymnastics team doctor Larry Nassar's sexual abuse of her and hundreds of other women. President Joe Biden announced that the United States was forming a new Indo-Pacific security alliance with Britain and Australia.






