The statewide gas price average in Texas is \$3.18 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is three cents less than on this day last week and is 37 cents more per gallon compared to this day last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in El Paso are paying the most on average at \$3.36 per gallon while drivers in McAllen and San Angelo are paying the least at \$2.99 per gallon. The national average price for a gallon of regular unleaded is \$3.70, which is five cents less when compared to this day last week and 52 cents more than the price per gallon at this same time last year.

Migrant buses dropped off by Texas near VP Harris' residence

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two buses of migrants from the U.S.-Mexico border were dropped off near Vice President Kamala Harris' home in residential Washington on Thursday morning in the bitter political battle over the Biden administration's immigration policies. Texas Gov. Greg Abbott has been busing mi-

grants out of Texas to cities with Democratic mayors as part of a political strategy this year because he says there are too many arrivals over the border to his state. Arizona Gov. Doug Ducey also has adopted this policy, and Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis also got in on the act recently. It was first dreamed up by former President Donald Trump.

Abbott tweeted that he'd sent the buses that arrived Thursday: "We're sending migrants to her backyard to call on the Biden Administration to do its job & secure the border." About two dozen men and women stood outside

the U.S. Naval Observatory at dawn, clutching clear plastic bags of their belongings carried with them over the border, before moving to a nearby church. Harris' office had no immediate comment. The steady flow of migrant buses has caused a

scramble in Washington, with Mayor Muriel Bowser calling for federal intervention and a coalition of NGOs forming to handle the new arrivals, backed by a grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

This coalition has become accustomed to wildly divergent levels of coordination between the Texas and Arizona buses.

Tatiana Laborde, managing director of the international relief agency SAMU First Response, said the buses from Arizona come with detailed manifests of passengers and their nationalities, coordination on arrival times and medical personnel aboard each bus. "They don't want to just dump people here,"

Laborde told The Associated Press last month. In contrast, she said, the Texas buses arrived cha-

otically. They only hear from charitable groups on the Texas end that a bus carrying a certain number of people has departed. At some point about 48 hours later, that bus drops off riders at Washington's Union Station. Thursday morning's surprise drop-off outside

Harris' residence suggests governors like Abbott were looking for creative new ways to make their political point — with the District of Columbia as the playing field. Domingo Garcia, president of the League of Unit-

ed Latin American Citizens, called the move "inhumane" and accused Abbott of "using human beings, babies, families, as political pinatas" Speaking to reporters outside Harris' residence,

Garcia said the two busloads of migrants from Texas were "dumped like human garbage" in Washington on Thursday. He also said many of the migrants were being "tricked into signing these releases," - something both the Texas and Arizona governments have denied. He also called for both Republican and Democrat-

ic politicians to come together around, "a bipartisan solution to fixing our broken immigration system. I agree that it's broken." After migrants seeking asylum cross the U.S.-

Mexico border, they spend time in a U.S. Customs and Border Protection facility along the border until they are generally released into the U.S. to wait out their cases. Republicans say Biden's policies encourage migrants to vanish into the U.S.; Democrats argue the Trump-era policy of forcing migrants to wait out their asylum cases in Mexico

was inhumane. DeSantis flew planes of immigrants to Martha's Vineyard on Wednesday. And last week, Abbott sent about

75 migrants to Chicago. Bowser has requested a National Guard deployment but was rejected by the Pentagon; the deployment was opposed by the NGOs, who called it an unnecessary militarization of a humanitar-

ian issue.

Last week, Bowser declared a limited state of public emergency over the migrant issue and proposed forming a new Office of Migrant Services with \$10 million in funding. The proposal comes before the D.C. Council next week.

London mourners brave 9-hour wait to say goodbye to queen iting Manchester and the queen's daughter Princess Anne in

LONDON (AP) — Thousands of mourners waited for hours Thursday in a line that stretched for nearly 4 1/2 miles (7 kilometers) across London for the chance to spend a few minutes filing past Queen Elizabeth II's coffin while she lies in state. King Charles III spent the day in private to reflect on his first week on The queue to pay respects to the late queen at Westminster Hall

was at least a nine-hour wait, snaking across a bridge and along the south bank of the River Thames beyond Tower Bridge. But people said they didn't mind the wait, and authorities brought in portable toilets and other facilities to make the slog bearable. "I'm glad there was a queue, because that gave us time to see

what was ahead of us, prepared us and absorbed the whole atmosphere," health care professional Nimisha Maroo said. "I wouldn't have liked it if I'd had to just rush through." A week after the queen died at Balmoral Castle in Scotland af-

ter 70 years on the throne, the focus of commemorations was in Westminster — the heart of political power in London. Her coffin will lie in state at Westminster Hall until Monday, when it will be taken across the street to Westminster Abbey for the queen's Buckingham Palace on Thursday released details about the

service, the first state funeral held in Britain since the death of former Prime Minister Winston Churchill in 1965. Royalty and heads of state from around the world are expected to be among the 2,000 people attending, with a smaller burial service planned for later Monday at Windsor Castle.

Late Monday, the queen will be buried in a private family service at Windsor alongside her late husband, Prince Philip, who died last year. The guest list for the state funeral is a roll-call of global power

and pomp, from Japan's Emperor Naruhito and King Felipe VI of Spain to U.S. President Joe Biden, French President Emmanuel Macron and the prime ministers of Canada, Australia and New Canadian Prime Minister Trudeau — who first met the queen

day as the queen's coffin was carried in somber procession from Buckingham Palace, the king was spending Thursday working and in "private reflection" at his Highgrove residence in western England. Charles has had calls with Biden and Macron and has been speaking to a host of world leaders. Prince William, the heir to the throne, and his wife Catherine,

the Princess of Wales, visited the royal family's Sandringham estate in eastern England on Thursday to admire some of the tributes left by well-wishers.

The couple walked slowly along metal barriers as they received bouquets from the public and chatted to well-wishers. Other royals fanned out across the U.K. to thank people for their support, with the queen's youngest son, Prince Edward,

On Wednesday the queen left Buckingham Palace for the last

time, borne on a horse-drawn carriage and saluted by cannons and the tolling of Big Ben, in a solemn procession through the flag-draped, crowd-lined streets of London to Westminster Hall. Charles, his siblings and sons marched behind the coffin, which

was topped by a wreath of white roses and the queen's diamondstudded crown on a purple velvet pillow. The military procession underscored Elizabeth's seven decades as head of state. Her lying-in-state, meanwhile, allowed many Britons to say a

personal goodbye to the only monarch most have ever known. It's also a huge logistical operation, with a designated 10-mile (16 kilometer) queuing route lined with first aid points and more than 500 portable toilets. There are 1,000 stewards and marshals working at any given time, and 30 religious leaders from a range of faiths to talk to those in line.

Grace and Truth

"For the law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." John

The greatest hoax and theological myth which has been perpetuated upon believers for centuries is the following – grace must be balanced with the Law. And so, when the hoaxers talk about balancing the grace of God with the Law of Moses, they use verses like John 1:17. What are these false teachers trying to do? They are trying to make it to where grace is not a license to sin. However, when we mix the Law with grace, we ignore one important Bible fact –

the Law doesn't make us sin less. The Apostle Paul says that, by the Law, is the knowledge of sin. The Law does not justify nor sanctify us. Grace doesn't need to be balanced, because grace

is never out of balance. If grace were ever in need of balancing, the only thing which could possibly accomplish this would be more grace. John 1:16 says that we have received grace for grace, because the

Some of you have started publishing my column since 2017. Many of readers would have missed it in 2017, and hopefully those who might remember will appreciate the reminder to pray. Thanks for your prayers.

Prayer is often our last resort, the final step in a hopeless situation. We refer to it with such phrases as "he doesn't have a prayer," or "there is nothing left to do but pray." But it is perhaps the most important aspect of our human

We share many attributes with the animal kingdom including instincts for hunger, reproduction and survival. Other animals provide care and nurture for their young. Some construct elaborate shelters whether nests, caves, or tunnels. Many have complex social systems. But no other creature Prayer

has the capacity to communicate with the Creator and to pray. Only man is endowed with that gift.

I have never met anyone who complained that they prayed too much. But I have known many who wish they had prayed more. In our most desperate circumstances and in our finest moments, we cry out to God in prayer. The greatest gift we can bestow upon another human being is to pray earnestly for them.

Some understand prayer as a psychological exercise merely benefiting the one who prays. But Scripture affirms that there is more at work when we pray than we imagine. Jesus prayed. In fact, He rose early in the morn-

ing before sunrise and sought solitary places where He could spend time alone in prayer. Occasionally he prayed all night. He taught us to pray, not as a public display to impress others, but in secret where "your father who sees in secret will reward you openly." (Matthew 6:6). He taught us to pray constantly with discipline and determination. His prayer life was so powerful that his disciples asked him to teach them to pray.

Prayer is not a matter of reciting particular words or repeating religious rituals. God looks on the heart. He hears the person who is convicted of guilt and feels unworthy to lift his eyes to heaven. And God hears those who humbly seek to do His

will, "The effective prayer of a righteous man," the Bible says, "can accomplish much." (James 5:16)

The mystery and the miracle of prayer resides not in us, but in the One who created us and founded the vast universe that we have only begun to explore. We are not cogs in an accidental machine that grinds its way toward extinction. We are created in the image of God and our very nature hungers for His presence. He has endowed us with personality, intelligence and freedom. He desires our company. He listens and He invites us to pray.

"Ask," Jesus said, "and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened. Or what man is there among you [who, when his son asks for a loaf, will give him a stone? Or if he asks for a fish, he will not give him a snake, will he? If you then, being evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give what is good to those who ask Him!" (Matthew 7:7-11).





1. The slam is ice-cold, despite the nlucky 5-2 club division. At trick six, you lead a heart to

1. You are declarer with the West the queen, ruff the seven of clubs, then play a diamond to dummy's king and lead the eight of clubs. But instead of ruffing, you discard the eight of spades from your hand! North wins but is stymied. He must either lead a spade into your A-Q or return a diamond, presenting you with a ruff-and-discard. Either way, you make the slam.


2. Win the club with ace, cross to the ace of diamonds and lead a low diamond. If South follows low. finesse the nine. This assures nine tricks and the contract even if the nine loses to the jack. With North on lead, there is no combination of the cards that would allow the defenders to cash four heart tricks at this point. The worst that can happen is that you lose three heart tricks and a diamond.

If you don't finesse the nine of diamonds, you will go down it South holds, say:

♦ J975 ♥ A64 ♦ J872 **♣** 73

You will score only eight tricks in this case. If you attempt to establish one more by giving up a diamond, South wins with the jack and returns a low heart, whereupon the defense collects four heart tricks to put you down one.

Today in History: September 16, GM is founded

Today is Friday, Sept. 16, the 259th day of 2022. There are 106 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

On Sept. 16, 2001, President George W. Bush, speaking on the South Lawn of the White House, said there was "no question" Osama bin Laden and his followers were the prime suspects in the Sept. 11 attacks; Bush pledged the government would "find them, get them running and hunt them down."

On this date:

In 1630, the Massachusetts village of Shawmut changed its name to Boston.

In 1810, Mexico began its revolt against Spanish rule.

In 1908, General Motors was founded in Flint, Michigan, by William C. Durant.

In 1940, Samuel T. Rayburn of Texas was elected Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives.

In 1966, the Metropolitan Opera officially opened its new opera house at New York's Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts with the world premiere of Samuel Barber's "Antony and Cleopatra."

In 1972, "The Bob Newhart Show" premiered on CBS.

In 1974, President Gerald R. Ford announced a conditional amnesty program for Vietnam war deserters and draft-evaders.

In 1982, the massacre of between 1,200 and 1,400 Palestinian men, women and children at the hands of Israeli-allied Christian Phalange militiamen began in west Beirut's Sabra and Shatila refugee camps.

In 1987, two dozen countries signed the Montreal Protocol, a treaty designed to save the Earth's ozone layer by calling on nations to reduce emissions of harmful chemicals by the year 2000.

In 2007, contractors for the U.S. security firm Blackwater USA guarding a U.S. State Department convoy in Baghdad opened fire on civilian vehicles, mistakenly believing they were under attack; 14 Iraqis died. O.J. Simpson was arrested in the alleged armed robbery of sports memorabilia collectors in Las Vegas. (Simpson was later convicted of kidnapping and armed robbery and sentenced to nine to 33 years in prison; he was released in 2017.)

In 2013, Aaron Alexis, a former U.S. Navy reservist, went on a shooting rampage inside the Washington Navy Yard, killing 12 people before being shot dead by police.

In 2016, after five years of promoting a false conspiracy theory about Barack Obama's birthplace, Republican Donald Trump abruptly reversed course, acknowledging that the president was born in America, but then claiming the "birther movement" was begun by his Democratic rival, Hillary Clinton. (While the question of Obama's birthplace was raised by some backers of Clinton's primary campaign against Obama eight

years earlier, Clinton

had long denounced it as a "racist lie.")

Ten years ago: In appearances on Sunday news shows, the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, Susan Rice, said there was no evidence that the attack on the U.S. diplomatic outpost in Benghazi, Libya, was premeditated. But Libya's interim president, Mohammed el-Megarif, told CBS he had no doubt attackers spent months planning the assault and purposely chose the date, September 11.

ribbean as a powerful

hurricane, formed in

the Atlantic. California

lawmakers voted to move the state's presidential primary up by about three months to March, a move that would force candidates to mount expensive campaigns earlier. One year ago: Health officials said the state of Florida had surpassed 50,000 coronavirus deaths since the start of the pandemic. A new study released by the Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention linked the COVID-19 pandemic to an "alarming" increase in obesity in U.S. children and teenagers. A report published in JAMA Ophthalmology suggested that vision problems increased among Chinese schoolchildren during pandemic restrictions and online learning. Jane Powell, a star of Hollywood's golden age musicals, died at her Connecticut home at 92.







Aranda brings up 'The Boss' as example for No. 17 Baylor

WACO, Texas (AP) — Baylor coach Dave Aranda used Bruce Springsteen's approach to his live performances as an example to his players about always having energy and great execution. He then had to tell the older teenagers and young 20-somethings who is "The Boss."

Aranda wanted to remind the 17th-ranked Bears (1-1), who play their final non-conference game at home Saturday against Texas State (1-1), not to view things as just being routine. Whether that be the actual game, a midweek practice or off-field

"There was a quote that (Springsteen) had, about how he doesn't see concerts as just a routine. He sees it as a renewal, and he talks about how he's playing 'Born to Run' however many times," Aranda said. "Each time, it's a new time because there's someone bringing somebody for the first time that listened to him. ... And it's like, you never know whose first time it is. You never know the impact that you make."

Baylor is coming off a double-overtime loss at future Big 12 foe BYU, a game in which the Bears had 14 penalties — after none when beating the Cougars at home last year. They also averaged only 2.9 yards on 52 rushing attempts, their most in Aranda's three seasons.

The Bears were unranked when they grinded out a 29-20 win at Texas Stat e in last year's season opener. Since becoming an FBS team in 2012, the Bobcats are 0-9 vs. Top 25 teams, and lost those games by an average margin of nearly 34 points.

RUNNING "SQWIRL"

Starting running back Taye McWilliams is questionable for Baylor after leaving the first half of the BYU game when he took a hard shot to his chest.

Craig Williams, the fifth-year junior nicknamed 'Sqwirl" limited by injuries to eight games before this season, had a career-high 17 carries against BYU. He could be heavily involved in the running game with Qualan Jones this week.

"I'm never gonna turn down any carries," Williams said. "I'm sure everybody in the room is ready to go out there."

DOYLE'S PENALTY

Baylor will play the first half without starting middle linebacker Dillon Doyle, who was penalized for targeting in the fourth quarter against BYU. The former Iowa transfer started Baylor's last 25

That targeting call came when when BYU running back Lopini Katoa was hit in the open field when trying to catch a pass.

"Dillon, he's kind of heartbroken about it," Aranda said. "It's one of those things to where you slow it down, you can see him leave his feet, you could see the launch and all of it. ... It's hard when a guy is up high and he's coming down low."

SCARY SCENE

Texas State cornerback Chris Mills will be on the sideline but won't play after a scary collision with a receiver in the win over FIU last Saturday night. Mills was motionless on the field and taken off the field on a cart after players for both teams gathered

"Just thankfully, he's all great," Bobcats coach Jake Spavital said. "You know, he wants to play, but I keep telling me we need to sit this one out."

CENTURY CALVIN

Calvin Hill has rushed for at least 100 yards in three of his last four games for Texas State, including a career-high 195 yards on 28 carries against FIU.

"Calvin started giving us a spark in that third, fourth quarter," Spavital said of the 5-foot-8, 185-pound Hill, a fourth-year sophomore with 16 career starts. "He's a pretty dynamic player in space."

AFTER MIDNIGHT TO PRE-NOON The Bears will kick off their non-conference fi

nale just after 11 a.m. local time. It comes a week after their game in Utah that didn't end until after midnight — at 1:19 a.m. Texas time, specifically – and the team didn't get back to Waco until close to sunrise Sunday.

"I'm fine with whatever they give us," said safety Devin Neal, who leads the team with eight solo tackles. "I'm ready to work whenever, I kind of like to look at it that way."

No. 24 A&M hosts No. 13 Miami after upset by App State

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — This was supposed to be the year Texas A&M finally took the next step and contended with Alabama for the SEC title.

Instead, last week's 17-14 upset at home against scrappy Appalachian State sent the Aggies tumbling from No. 6 to No. 24 in the AP Top 25 and took some luster off Saturday night's matchup against 13th-ranked Miami. Now the Aggies are looking for ways to move on from that stunning loss and

salvage a season that started with so much promise. Senior receiver Ainias Smith had a simple message to his teammates this

week to try and get Texas A&M back on track.

"(Don't) let one loss define us," he said.

Coach Jimbo Fisher took the brunt of the criticism for the loss with people questioning him losing to an 18 ½-point underdog from the Sun Belt Conference at home while earning \$9 million a year. "We did not execute to the level we needed to execute to win the game," he

said. "I'm very disappointed in how we played and how we did. We had opportunities to win the game and should have played much better. We have to practice better, play better and execute at a higher level against a very good The Hurricanes opened the season with two wins, and new coach Mario Cris-

tobal isn't changing his approach this week despite the idea that a victory over Texas A&M would be a nice signature win in his first season at the school.

He preaches a simple style: get better every day, win the week, move on to the next, ignore the noise.

"The affirmation is what you put on film," Cristobal said. "That's your resume. We really focus on being internally driven and gearing everything towards that. Because everything outside of that, all the noise, the fluff, it ain't going to help you when you're playing against really good football teams in clutch situations." Miami opened the season with Bethune-Cookman and Southern Miss, and

Hurricanes quarterback Tyler Van Dyke insists that there was no peeking ahead at Week 3 while prepping for those opponents. But earlier this summer, yes, Texas A&M was on his mind. "This is the team I was probably studying the most, watching their spring

game, watching some film from last year," Van Dyke said. "Once the season started, we didn't really watch much film on them, obviously focusing on the other two teams we played before. We watched a good amount of film earlier

The Hurricanes are eager to see what game-night atmosphere at College Station is all about. If attendance on Saturday night tops 90,000 — both of Texas A&M's games this season have exceeded that — then it would be one of the nine biggest road crowds in Hurricanes' history.

"When you're growing up and you're playing college football, you want to play in games like this," Cristobal said. "You recognize their tradition, and you respect it, them and their program and you can't wait for the opportunity to find out where you are as a program."

JIMBO VS. MIAMI

This will be the ninth time that Fisher coaches against Miami. The previous eight were all during his time at Florida State; Fisher and the Seminoles won the first seven of those meetings, before Miami prevailed 24-20 in 2017. Fisher and Cristobal have never gone head-to-head as head coaches.

QUARTERBACK QUESTIONS

Texas A&M QB Haynes King's job could be in jeopardy after he managed just 97 yards passing with no touchdowns last week as he failed to move the offense effectively. Fisher said he was evaluating the position and would consider a change right after the loss.

THE SERIES

Miami is 2-1 against Texas A&M, winning at home in 2007 and then at College Station in 2008. Texas A&M's win was in 1944, a 70-14 victory — still the most points ever allowed by the Hurricanes, who threw a school-record seven interceptions in that contest. The Aggies are scheduled to visit Miami on Sept.

HELLO, AGAIN

Miami RB Henry Parrish Jr. played for Mississippi last year, and had 58 yards on nine carries for the Rebels in a 29-19 home win over Texas A&M. "I've heard they have the biggest stadium in SEC football, 100-and-whatever thousand fans they have," Parrish said, adding his recollection of Texas A&M's defense was this: "Really fast."

OFF THE ACHANE

Texas A&M running back Devon Achane scored both the team's touchdowns last week after scoring on a 26-yard run and a 95-yard kickoff return. It was the seventh multi-touchdown game in the career of Achane, who is also a sprinter on the school's track team. He leads the SEC and ranks second in the nation by averaging 48 yards a kickoff this season.

RANKED VS. RANKED

Texas A&M has gone 3-2 in its last five games in which both teams were in the AP Top 25 poll. Miami is 3-12 in its last 15 ranked-vs.-ranked games, 1-11 in its last 12 such games played at road or neutral sites.
