Plans include four concerts for the 2022-23 season, including a Veteran's Day Concert of Honor, The Sounds of Christmas, Valentine's Love Songs and Dessert Concert, and the Vox Cordis Spring Concert to close out the year.

Rehearsals will be Tuesday evenings from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Big Spring High School Choral Department.

Mother settles lawsuit over Texas arrest

FORT WORTH (AP) — A Texas city has settled a federal civil rights lawsuit filed by a Black mother after she and her daughter were wrestled to the ground and arrested by a white police officer following a dispute with a neighbor. Jacqueline Craig and one of

her daughters were wrestled to the ground and had a stun gun pointed at them by Fort Worth officer William Martin in December 2016. Another of Craig's daughters, who filmed the incident on her cellphone, was also arrested

Charges against all three were later dropped. Martin served a 10-day suspension for violating departmental policies. The city agreed to settle the

lawsuit for \$150,000, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported Friday. The settlement is pending City Council approval.

As part of the settlement, the city admits no other fault and there are no other requirements, a Fort Worth spokesperson said.

Craig has alleged the neighbor grabbed and choked her young

son after seeing him litter. Craig and the neighbor both called police.

Video of the arrests, which was posted on Facebook and viewed more than a million times, raised accusations of racism. Mayor Pro Tem Gyna Bivens

told the newspaper she was glad the lawsuit was settled. "This put a big weight on her. It put a big weight on the city, and I

hope the settlement is enough for everyone to feel refreshed and ready to move forward," Bivens

NASA spacecraft closes in on asteroid for head-on collision

CAPE CANAVERAL (AP) — A NASA spacecraft closed in on an asteroid at blistering speed Monday in an unprecedented dress rehearsal for the day a killer rock menaces Earth.

The galactic grand slam was set to occur at a harmless asteroid 7 million miles (9.6 million kilometers) away, with the spacecraft named Dart plowing into the rock at 14,000 mph (22,500 kph). Scientists expected the impact to carve out a crater, hurl streams of rocks and dirt into space and, most importantly, alter the asteroid's orbit.

Telescopes around the world and in space were poised to capture the spectacle. Though the impact snould be immediately obvious — with Dart's radio signal abruptly ceasing — it will be days or even weeks to determine how much the asteroid's path was changed.

The \$325 million mission is the first attempt to shift the position of an asteroid or any other natural object in space.

"No, this is not a movie plot," NASA Administrator Bill Nelson tweeted earlier in the day. "We've all seen it on movies like 'Armageddon,' but the real-life stakes are high," he said in a prerecorded video.

Monday's target: a 525-foot (160-meter) asteroid named Dimorphos. It's actually a moonlet of Didymos, Greek for twin, a fast-spinning asteroid five times bigger that flung off the material that formed the junior partner.

The pair have been orbiting the sun for eons without threatening Earth, making them ideal save-the-world test candidates.

Launched last November, the vending machinesize Dart — short for Double Asteroid Redirection Test — navigated to its target using new technology developed by Johns Hopkins University's Applied Physics Laboratory, the spacecraft builder and mission manager.

A mini satellite followed a few minutes behind to take photos of the impact. The Italian Cubesat was released from Dart two weeks ago.

Scientists insisted Dart would not shatter Dimorphos. The spacecraft packed a scant 1,260 pounds (570 kilograms), compared with the asteroid's 11 billion pounds (5 billion kilograms). But that should be plenty to shrink its 11-hour, 55-minute orbit around Didymos.



The impact should pare 10 minutes off that, but telescopes will need anywhere from a few days to nearly a month to verify the new orbit. The anticipated orbital shift of 1% might not sound like much, scientists noted. But they stressed it would amount to a significant change over years.

Planetary defense experts prefer nudging a threatening asteroid or comet out of the way, given enough lead time, rather than blowing it up and creating multiple pieces that could rain down on Earth. Multiple impactors might be needed for big space rocks or a combination of impactors and socalled gravity tractors, not-yet-invented devices that would use their own gravity to pull an aster oid into a safer orbit.

"The dinosaurs didn't have a space program to help them know what was coming, but we do," NA-SA's senior climate adviser Katherine Calvin said, referring to the mass extinction 66 million years ago believed to have been caused by a major asteroid impact, volcanic eruptions or both.

The non-profit B612 Foundation, dedicated to protecting Earth from asteroid strikes, has been pushing for impact tests like Dart since its founding by astronauts and physicists 20 years ago. Monday's dramatic action aside, the world must do a better job of identifying the countless space rocks lurking out there, warned the foundation's executive director, Ed Lu, a former astronaut.

Finding and tracking asteroids, "That's still the name of the game here. That's the thing that has to happen in order to protect the Earth," he said.

Hurricane Ian nears Cuba on path to strike Florida as Cat 4

HAVANA (AP) — Hurricane Ian was growing stronger as it barreled toward Cuba on a track to hit Florida's west coast as a major hurricane as early as

Ian was forecast to hit the western tip of Cuba as a major hurricane and then become an even stronger Category 4 with top winds of 140 mph (225 km/h) over warm Gulf of Mexico waters before striking Florida.

As of Monday, Tampa and St. Petersburg appeared to be the among the most likely targets for their first direct hit by a major hurricane since 1921.

"Please treat this storm seriously. It's the real deal. This is not a drill," Hillsborough County Emergency Management Director Timothy Dudley said at a news conference on storm preparations in Tampa. Authorities in Cuba were evacuating 50,000 people in Pinar del Rio province,

sent in medical and emergency personnel, and took steps to protect food and other crops in warehouses, according to state media. "Cuba is expecting extreme hurricane-force winds, also life threatening

storm surge and heavy rainfall," U.S. National Hurricane Center senior specialist Daniel Brown told The Associated Press early Monday. The hurricane center predicted areas of Cuba's western coast could see as

much as 14 feet (4.3 meters) of storm surge Monday night or early Tuesday.

In Havana, fishermen were taking their boats out of the water along the famous Malecon, the seaside boardwalk, and city workers were busy unclogging storm drains ahead of the expected rain. Havana resident Adyz Ladron, 35, said the potential for rising water from

the storm worries him. "I am very scared because my house gets completely flooded, with water up

to here," he said, pointing to his chest. In the southern city of Batabanó, Alexis García was using his tractor to help

pick up garbage from people's homes ahead of the storm.

"This will not take us by surprise," he said.

On Monday afternoon, Ian was moving northwest at 13 mph (20 km/h), about 155 miles (250 kilometers) southeast of the western tip of Cuba, with top sustained winds increasing to 100 mph (155 km/h).

The center of the hurricane passed to the west of the Cayman Islands, but no major damage was reported there Monday, and residents were going back into the streets as the winds died down.

"We seem to have dodged the bullet" Grand Cayman resident Gary Hollins said. "I am a happy camper." Ian won't linger over Cuba, but will slow down over the Gulf of Mexico, grow-

ing wider and stronger, "which will have the potential to produce significant wind and storm surge impacts along the west coast of Florida," the hurricane A surge of up to 10 feet (3 meters) of ocean water and 10 inches (25 centime-

ters) of rain was predicted across the Tampa Bay area, with as much as 15 inches (38 centimeters) inches in isolated areas. That's enough water to inundate coastal communities.

As many as 300,000 people may be evacuated from low-lying areas in Hills-

borough County alone, county administrator Bonnie Wise said. Some of those evacuations were beginning Monday afternoon in the most vulnerable areas, with schools and other locations opening as shelters.

"We must do everything we can to protect our residents. Time is of the essence," Wise said.

Floridians lined up for hours in Tampa to collect bags of sand and cleared store shelves of bottled water. Gov. Ron DeSantis declared a statewide emergency and warned that Ian could lash large areas of the state, knocking out power and interrupting fuel supplies as it swirls northward off the state's Gulf

"You have a significant storm that may end up being a Category 4 hurricane," DeSantis said at a news conference. "That's going to cause a huge amount of storm surge. You're going to have flood events. You're going to have a lot of different impacts." DeSantis said the state has suspended tolls around the Tampa Bay area and

mobilized 5,000 Florida state national guard troops, with another 2,000 on standby in neighboring states. President Joe Biden also declared an emergency, authorizing the Depart-

ment of Homeland Security and the Federal Emergency Management Agency to coordinate disaster relief and provide assistance to protect lives and property. The president postponed a scheduled Tuesday trip to Florida because of the storm.

Playing it safe, NASA planned to begin slowly rolling its moon rocket from the launch pad to its Kennedy Space Center hangar, adding weeks of delay to the test flight.

Flash flooding was predicted for much of the Florida peninsula, and heavy rainfall was possible for the southeast United States later this week. With tropical storm force winds extending 115 miles (185 kilometers) from Ian's center, watches covered the Florida Keys to Lake Okeechobee.

Bob Gualtieri, sheriff of Pinellas County, Florida which includes St. Petersburg, said in a briefing that although no one will be forced to leave, mandatory evacuation orders are expected to begin Tues-

"What it means is, we're not going to come help you. If you don't do it, you're on your own," Gualt-

Zones to be evacuated include all along Tampa Bay and the rivers that feed it. St. Petersburg Mayor Ken Welch urged residents not to ignore any evacuation orders.

our community," Welch said.

The hurricane center has advised Floridians to have survival plans in place and monitor updates of the storm's evolving path.


Big Spring and Coahoma win at home to improve to 4-1, Forsan suffers first loss of the season in a nail biter at Kermit.

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

Whether East covered or not, declarer would score six heart tricks and discard all four diamonds from dummy to win all the tricks. Not a bad result, considering that East-West held 23 high-card points!

The key to South's success was his three-club bid over two spades. Had South simply bid three hearts, which happened at many tables, East might well have become declarer at four spades, which could not be defeated.

The most bizarre result came from a table where the bidding

East's decision to bid six notrump with no club stopper was, to put it mildly, somewhat rash. He apparently did not like the prospect of a heart lead by North through dummy's king, and so elected to make himself declarer. This decision did not turn out well when North-South collected seven club tricks and six heart tricks to register a 3 500 point set!

and South had no trouble making the slam with an overtrick for a 3,500-point set!

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 27, 1996, in Afghanistan, the Taliban, a band of former seminary students, drove the government of President Burhanuddin Rabbani out of Kabul, captured the capital and executed former leader Najibullah.

On this date:

In 1779, John Adams was named by Congress to negotiate the Revolutionary War's peace terms with Britain.

In 1825, the first locomotive to haul a passenger train was operated by George Stephenson in England.

In 1854, the first great disaster involving an Atlantic Ocean passenger vessel occurred when the steamship SS Arctic sank off Newfoundland; of the more than 400 people on board, only 86 survived.

In 1928, the United States said it was recognizing the Nationalist Chinese government.

In 1939, Warsaw, Poland, surrendered after weeks of resistance to invading forces from Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union during World War II.

In 1956, Olympic track and field gold medalist and Hall of Fame golfer Babe Didrikson Zaharias died in Galveston, Texas, at age 45.

In 1964, the government publicly released the report of the Warren Commission, which concluded that Lee Harvey Oswald had acted alone in assassinating President John F. Kennedy.

In 2018, during a daylong hearing by the Senate Judiciary Committee, Christine Blasey Ford said she was "100 percent" certain that she was sexually assaulted by Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh when they were teenagers, and Kavanaugh then told senators that he was "100 percent certain" he had done no such thing; Republicans quickly scheduled a recommendation vote for the following morning.






