Rules to know about animal tethering while is less restrictive, still holds the

With the recommendation of city

staff, the Big Spring City Council has repealed the city ordinance banning animal tethering in an effort to reduce the number of loose dogs in Big Spring, but that doesn't let pet owners off the hook so to speak when it comes to keeping an animal outside the home. Instead, the city will now be following the State of Texas tethering law that,

owner responsible for the well being of their animals. To avoid violations of the law, the Big

Spring Police Department Chief Chad Williams would like pet owners to educate themselves with the law as it does have restrictions. "If you are going to tether a dog you

need to understand the law," Williams explained and added that there are re-

strictions and conditions that apply. According the the law an owner may

not leave a dog outside and unattended by use of a restraint unless the owner provides the dog access to: adequate shelter, an area that allows the dog to avoid standing water and exposure to excessive animal waste, shade from direct sunlight and potable (drinkable)

The law defines "adequate shelter" as "a sturdy structure that provides the dog protection from inclement weather;

House approves scaled-down bill targeting Big Tech dominance

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House on Thursday approved sharply scaleddown legislation targeting the dominance of Big Tech companies by giving states greater power in antitrust cases and increasing money for federal regu-

The bipartisan measure, passed by a 242-184 vote, pales in comparison with a more ambitious package aimed at reining in Meta, Google, Amazon and Apple and cleared by key House and Senate committees. That proposal has languished for months, giving the companies time for vigorous lobbying campaigns against it. The more limited bill would give states an upper hand over companies in

choosing the location of courts that decide federal antitrust cases. Proponents say this change would avert the "home-court advantage" that Big Tech companies enjoy in federal court in Northern California, where many of the cases are tried and many of the companies are based. Many state attorneys general have pursued antitrust cases against the in-

dustry, and many states joined with the Justice Department and the Federal Trade Commission in their landmark lawsuits against Google and Meta (then called Facebook), respectively, in late 2020. The bill also would increase filing fees paid by companies to federal agencies

for small and medium-sized transactions. The aim is to increase revenue for federal enforcement efforts. Under the bill, companies seeking approval for mergers would have to disclose subsidies they received from countries deemed to pose strategic or eco-

for all proposed mergers worth \$500 million or more, while reducing the fees

"We find ourselves in a monopoly moment as a country," Rep. Lori Trahan, D-Mass., said before the vote. "Multibillion-dollar corporations have grown into behemoths, eliminating any real competition in their industries and using their dominance to hurt small businesses and consumers. Meta's monopoly power has enabled it to harm women, children and people of all ages without recourse. Amazon has used its dominance to copy competitors' products and run small businesses into the ground."

The Biden administration, which has pushed for antitrust legislation targeting Big Tech, endorsed the bill this week.

Even in reduced form, the legislation drew fierce opposition from conservative Republicans who split from their GOP colleagues supporting the bill. The conservatives objected to the proposed revenue increase for the antitrust regulators, arguing there has been brazen overreach by the FTC under Biden. Rep. Tom McClintock, R-Calif., described the FTC's leader, Lina Khan, as a

"a radical leftist seeking to replace consumer decisions with her own." Another California Republican, Rep. Darrell Issa, told his colleagues: "If you

want to stifle innovation, vote for this." If Republicans win control of the House or Senate in the November elections,

they are certain to try to crimp the activism of the FTC and to chllenge its

broader interpretation of its legal authority. The broader antitrust package would restrict powerful tech companies from favoring their own products and services over rivals on their platforms and could even lead to mandated breakups separating companies' dominant platforms from their other businesses. It could, for example, prevent Amazon from steering consumers to its own brands and away from competitors' products on

its giant e-commerce platform. The drafting of that legislation marked a new turn in Congress' effort to curb the dominance of the tech giants and anti-competitive practices that critics say have hurt consumers, small businesses and innovation. But the proposal is complex and drew objections to some provisions from lawmakers of both parties, even though all condemn the tech giants' conduct.

Lawmakers have faced a delicate task as they try to tighten reins around a powerful industry whose services, mostly free or nearly so, are popular with consumers and embedded into daily life.

So with time to act running out as the November elections approach in about six weeks, lawmakers extracted the less controversial provisions on antitrust court venues and merger filing fees, putting them into the new bill that passed.

Lawmakers added the provision targeting foreign subsidies to U.S. companies. Republicans especially have vocally criticized the Chinese ownership of popular video platform TikTok. In the Senate, Republican Sens. Mike Lee of Utah, Tom Cotton of Arkansas

and Chuck Grassley of Iowa came out this week in support of the new House legislation. There hasn't been public discussion of a similar bill in the Senate,

Ports-to-Plains Alliance closed out the conference with the topic: Creating NOW Out of the Future. Garduño laid out his ideas starting with: Why do we need this Corridor? He referenced historical study results from the Ports-to-Plains Feasibility Study (2001) and the Ports-to-Plains Interstate

Feasibility Study (2021). Next, Garduño moved to Knowing and Understanding our Past. Beginning in the past transportation patterns by moving cattle to markets, he moved to how NAFTA affected transportation needs.

He pointed out what the eastern Colorado Mobility Study completed by the Colorado Department of Transportation in 2002 stated. "Furthermore, Colorado is strategically located as a "bridge" state in the national and international infrastructure system for movement of freight, resulting in large quantities of goods flowing through the state. Although this is predominately in the east-west direction today, the potential of NAFTA suggests that there may be opportunities for Colorado to also become a more significant player in the movement of goods in north-south corridors."

He reminded the audience of the results of Corridor Development and Management Plans completed for the Ports-to-Plains Corridor by the Departments of Transportation in Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, and on the Heartland Expressway by the Nebraska Department of Transportation.

Where do we go from here? Was the conclusion of Garduño's presentation. He described his vision of the Path of Our Success:

- Work the Plan (20,26,32) (IH 27 Advisory Committee project recommendations)
- It looks like we will have to go mining (Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act 2021)
 - Leverage our resources (State, Federal, Private) Celebrate First downs and Touchdowns (IH 27
- Sign Unveilings, Future openings of four lanes) • Let's get stuck in a 'do loop' (Go to the top of this list and start all over)

and with dimensions that allow the dog while in the shelter to stand erect, sit, turn around, and lie down in a normal position.

"Restraint" is defined as "...a chain, rope, tether, leash, cable, or other device that attaches a dog to a stationary object or trolley system."

It also states that, an owner may not restrain a dog outside and unattended by use of a restraint that is a chain, has weights attached, is shorter than the greater of five times the length of the dog, as measured from the tip of the dogs nose to the base of the dogs tail, or 10 feet, or is attached to a collar or harness

not properly fitted.

The law does include several exceptions, including dogs restrained in public camping or recreational areas; specific licensed activities; shepherding or herding cattle or livestock; cultivating agricultural products; dogs temporarily restrained in an open-air truck bed; or engaging in or training for hunting

If convicted of a violation of this law it is a class C misdemeanor or a class B if there are prior convictions.

Senate passes stopgap bill to avert shutdown, aid Ukraine disasters, such as Hurricane Ian, which December. The most notable of those ex-

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate passed a short-term spending bill on Thursday that would avert a partial government shutdown when the current fiscal year ends at midnight Friday and provide another infusion of military and economic aid to Ukraine as it seeks to repel Russia's brutal invasion. The bill finances the federal government

through Dec. 16 and buys lawmakers more time to agree on legislation setting spending levels for the 2023 fiscal year. It passed by a vote of 72-25 and now goes to the House for consideration. All of the no votes came from Republicans.

As has become routine, lawmakers waited until the final hours before the shutdown deadline to act. But passage of a bill to fund the government was hardly in doubt, particularly after Democrat Sen. Joe Manchin agreed to drop provisions designed to streamline the permitting process for energy projects and greenlight the approval of a pipeline in his home state of West Virginia. Those provisions had drawn opposition from both sides of the political aisle.

Still, the bill merely puts off for a few months the maneuvering that will be required after the midterm election to pass a massive government funding package, as negotiators will have to bridge their differences over spending on hot-button issues such as abortion, border security and climate change.

The bill approved Thursday, with some exceptions, keeps spending at federal agencies at current levels through mid-

ceptions is the more than \$12 billion that will be provided to aid Ukraine, on top of more than \$50 billion provided in two previous bills. The money will go to provide training, equipment and logistics support for the Ukraine military, help Ukraine's government provide basic services to its citizens and replenish U.S. weapons systems and munitions.

"Seven months since the conflict began, it's crystal clear that American assistance has gone a long way to helping the Ukrainian people resist (Russian President Vladimir) Putin's evil, vicious aggression," said Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y. "But the fight is far from

Republican leader Mitch McConnell also voiced support for the Ukraine aid, while admonishing the Biden administration to get it out the door more quickly. "Assisting Ukraine is not some feel-

good, symbolic gesture," McConnell said. "It's literally an investment in our own national security and that of our allies." Disaster assistance was attached to the

stopgap bill, including \$2.5 billion to help New Mexico communities recover from the Hermit's Peak/Calf Canyon Fire, the largest wildfire in the state's history; \$2 billion for a block grant program that aids the economic recovery of communities impacted by recent disasters and \$20 million for water and wastewater infrastructure improvements previously authorized for Jackson, Mississippi.

An additional \$18.8 billion was included for the Federal Emergency Management Agency to respond to current and future hit Florida on Wednesday.

The bill would provide an additional \$1 billion for a program that helps low-income households heat their homes. And it would transfer \$3 billion from a Pentagon aid program to the State Department for continued Afghan resettlement opera-

Lawmakers also included a reauthorization of the Food and Drug Administration's user fee agreements for five years, which ensures the agency can continue critical product safety reviews and won't need to issue pink slips for thousands of employees working on drug and medical device applications.

One thing missing from the bill is the billions of dollars in additional funding that President Joe Biden sought to aid the response to COVID-19 and monkeypox. Republicans criticized the health spending as unnecessary. The White House said the money would have been used to accelerate the research and development of vaccines and therapeutics, prepare for future COVID variants and support the global response.

The bill's passage is the last must-do item on lawmakers' list before returning to their home states and districts to campaign before the mid-term elections that will determine which party controls the House and Senate over the next two years. Lawmakers were anxious to get out of Washington and focus on campaigning without the specter of a shutdown.

"The last thing the American people need right now is a pointless government shutdown," Schumer said.





m here}$ is much to be desired when it comes to spending time alone. It's only been in the last few years that the floodgates of voices have been opened to everyone at any time. Yes, we can see there have been written scrolls from thousands of years ago, and books

were printed around the year 1200, but this information was not widely circulated. Through the years printing continued to expand and when newspapers became available, the masses were given a new realm that would inspire and influence their thinking. Take for example, in the early nineteenth century when many people lived in remote areas, they had no idea what was happening in the world. This isolation allowed them to concentrate on what they needed to do which was physically difficult but they were not filled with stress or fear about politics or social

families would sit around and listen to a variety of opinions and ideas. Later came the television that planted visual seeds within the mind and further persuaded the conscience. Was it invented for information or mind control?

We know in the last 100 years, the

world has changed dramatically. There have been many wonderful advances in technology and at the same time, we wonder what the plans are of those who control them. Social media and the internet have become such a part of our lives, that I'm not sure what any of us would do without them. These higher forms of communication are accepted as making us more intelligent, but could they also be distracting and hindering us from walking with God? The greatest gift in the history of the planet is Jesus Christ and there is nothing more valuable than the privilege to walk and talk with Him. I have noticed in my life, that I spend much more time watching and listening to others than having an ear to hear what His Spirit is saying. It's obvious there is a competition going on here for our attention, and like

The surface of the earth is soft and impressible by the feet of men, and so with the paths which the mind travels. How worn and dusty, then, must be the highways of the world, how deep the ruts of tradition and conformity.

I did not wish to take a cabin passage, but rather to go before the mast and on the deck of the world, for there I could best see the moonlight amid the mountains. I do not wish to go below now. I learned that if one advances confidently in the direction of their dreams, and endeavors to live the life which they have imagined, they will put some things behind, and will pass invisible boundaries." I realize that most people lead busy lives, but do we not have the choice to decide how ensnared we are with the world? Are we in control or are we being controlled?

 Γ he State Fair of Texas opens this week, Sept.

30-Oct. 23. I started visiting the State Fair when I was a kid, wandering the sprawling grounds that circle the Cotton Bowl, birthplace of the Cowboys, site of the Texas OU shootout and the Grambling game. There is always something about the State Fair. Maybe it's Big Tex, standing at the entrance where he has stood for generations, welcoming all comers with his Texas drawl. Maybe it's Fletcher's corn dogs smothered in mustard and ketchup, or cotton candy, sugar sprinkled waffles, roasted turkey legs and the deep fried "whatever"

that reflects the Texas motto, "If you can fry it,

Maybe it's the midway with barkers promising prizes for a ring toss, a plastic duck plucked from the pond, a water balloon filled to bursting with water guns, or the bell rung by a powerful blow with the sledge hammer.

It could be the rides rotating with screaming and squealing kids. Or maybe it's the pig races, the animal barns with blue ribbons or the tastiest jams and jellies. It could be the bird show, hawks launched from the ferris wheel swooping low over our head to the crowd's applause. It could be the auto show where the Mustang was introduced in 1964, where today's cars are on display with gleaming chrome and glistening paint.

Most of all, I think, it is the people, people who come together to laugh and celebrate family, heritage and culture. I like to see parents pushing babies in strollers, children dancing with excitement, grey haired men and women smiling at private memories, and lovers lounging on the grass beside the reflection pool.

God loves people, and he must like laughter. If the laughter of our children thrills us, how much more does our laughter thrill Him.

That may be why Jesus performed his first miracle at a wedding feast, providing new wine when the wine ran out. It may be the reason His teaching is filled with references to banquet feasts and parties, like the fatted calf killed and cooked to celebrate the prodigal's return.

Heaven is described as a great banquet feast, a mansion with many rooms, a place where all the peoples, cultures and languages of the world gather in celebration and joy. The State Fair, of course, isn't heaven.

It certainly isn't perfect. But Heaven is. Our moments of celebration and enjoyment are dim glimpses of what God has prepared in Heaven. The Bible says, "And I heard a loud voice from

the throne saying, 'Now the dwelling of God is with men, and he will live with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be

with them and be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or cry-

ing or pain, for the old order of things has passed

away." (Rev. 21:3-4). This, of course, is why Jesus came, so that we might experience glimpses of heaven here, and eternal life with Him in Heaven when we die.



This past Saturday, the Steers cross country team along with a handful of Lady Steer runners made the long trip to Denton to compete in the TX Garmin MileSplit Invitational.

The meet featured some of the top runners and teams both in and out of state. The Steers competed in the Elite Boys 5K division which had over 200 runners in the race. The boys finished 20th overall as a team out of 35 teams.

Leading the way for the Steers were seniors Adrian Solis and Isaac Gonzales. Solis finished 24th overall completing the 3.1 mile course in 16:17.90. Gonzales finished 27th overall with a time of 16:22. Following after Solis and Gonzales were Agustin Salgado 148th place (17:39), Kevin Quezada 172nd place (17:54.30), Diego Rios 180th place (17:57.90), Michael Perez 217th place (18:39.9), and Jordan Mitchell 221st place (18:44.70).

The Bentonville Tigers from Arkansas won the meet with their lead runner James American Horse leading the way finishing in a time of 15:32. Region I rival Canyon was also in attendance and finished third overall as a team.

Four Lady Steer runners also competed Saturday in the Varsity Girls Open 5K division. Leading the way for the Lady Steers was Bergan Pinkley who finished 36th overall with a time of 21:29. Following behind Pinkley was Luna Jimenez 58th place (22:08.10), Kandace Gonzales 103rd place (23:17.20), and Elaina Arredondo 110th place (23:44).

The Steers and Lady Steers varsity squads will have off this week as Big Spring will host its Invitational this Saturday at Comanche Trail Park. Both the JV boys and girls teams will compete Saturday along with Big Spring's Junior High boys and girls teams.

EXPERIENCE BIG TAKEAWAY FROM DENTON

Heading into last Saturday's meet in Denton both the Big Springs boys and girls cross country runners knew they were going to be running against some of the best of the best. The meet featured some of the top 5 teams in the state from Class 4A, 5A, and 6A. Not to mention 3-time state champions from Arkansas, Bentonville.

Despite the overall results, the Big Spring runners gained valuable experience that will help out in the coming weeks. Per head coach Brandon Clemmons, the Denton meet was all about being competitive and gaining the experience of running with some of the state's best runners. 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

1. Three spades. Partner's two-spade bid is somewhat ambiguous in this sequence. It might be based on as little as ♠ QJ10873 ♥ 8 ♠ K764 ♣ 52, or as much as ♠AQ8652 ♥ 93 ♦ J7 ♣ K84.

You'd have very little chance for game with the first hand and an excellent shot at game with the second. So you raise to three spades and let partner decide whether to bid four. Your K-4 of spades are adequate support for a suit that partner has bid twice.

2. Pass. You can't fight city hall. With no fit in spades and minimum high-card values for your opening bid, this is obviously not a gamegoing hand. The only problem remaining, therefore, is to find the best partscore contract.

In general, where there's a misfit it.

— you should throw in the towel as
soon as you can. The only other
possible action would be to bid
three clubs, but this might lead you
deeper into the morass if partner
cannot support that suit. The
sooner you drop a hot potato, the
better off you are.

3. Two notrump. You can't very well pass with 17 high-card points and the possibility that partner might have as many as 10, so you invite partner to bid game in notrump, which you'll almost surely make if he bids it. Of course, partner might have a hand suitable only for spades, and in that case he'll bid three or four spades, either of which you'll pass.

4. Four spades. The jump-raise to game, despite your skimpy trump holding, comes much closer to representing the real value of your hand than does the alternative bid of three spades.

True, you have only 15 high-card points, but nearly all of them are potential tricks. In particular, your three trumps, together with the singleton ace of diamonds, should be worth their weight in gold. Partner might not make four spades, but you would be remiss not to bid it

Today in History: September 30, Berlin Airlift ends

Today is Friday, Sept. 30, the 273rd day of 2022. There are 92 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Sept. 30, 1777, the Continental Congress, Äî forced to flee in the face of advancing British forces, Äî moved to York, Pennsylvania.

On this date:

In 1791, Mozart's opera "The Magic Flute" premiered in Vienna, Austria.

In 1938, after co-signing the Munich Agreement allowing Nazi annexation of Czechoslovakia's Sudetenland, British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain said, "I believe it is peace for our time."

In 1947, the World Series was broadcast on television for the first time; the New York Yankees defeated the Brooklyn Dodgers 5-3 in Game 1 (the Yankees went on to win the Series four games to three).

In 1949, the Berlin Airlift came to an end.

In 1954, the first nuclear-powered submarine, the USS Nautilus, was commissioned by the U.S. Navy.

In 1955, actor James Dean, 24, was killed in a two-car collision near Cholame, California.

In 1960, "The Flintstones," network television's first animated prime-time series, debuted on ABC.

In 1962, James Meredith, a Black student, was escorted by federal marshals to the campus of the University of Mississippi, where he enrolled for classes the next day; Meredith's presence sparked rioting that claimed two lives.







No. 9 Oklahoma St fueled by B12 title loss to No. 17 Baylor

WACO, Texas (AP) — Ninth-ranked Oklahoma State came up only inches short of a Big 12 championship in its last meeting against Baylor.

"We use it to fuel us," Cowboys running back Dominic Richardson said this

Nearly 10 months after that Big 12 title game loss, when running back Dezmon Jackson was knocked out of bounds just short of the end zone on a desperate fourth-down dive in the final seconds, Oklahoma State (3-0) plays its Big 12 opener Saturday at defending champion and No. 16 Baylor (3-1, 1-0 Big 12). "It'll set the tone for Big 12 play. There are only three undefeated (Big 12)

teams ... I'd like to stay in that group," OSU defensive end Brock Martin said. 'Being undefeated is a major deal to make it to the final goal of the playoffs and national championship. Obviously, that's something we want to do."

Jackson and Jairon McVea, the Baylor safety that kept him from scoring, were both seniors and no longer on the teams that both hope will be back at AT&T Stadium on the first Saturday of December for another title chance. With so much attention on the rematch against the Cowboys, whose only

Big 12 title was in 2011, Baylor coach Dave Aranda anticipates that his players will be amped up probably more than he would like them to be. His emphasis to them is to keep the focus inward, like they did in a conference-opening win at Iowa State last week. "We just try to keep the same intensity every week," Bears defensive end TJ

"It's still great energy. It's a conference game," said cornerback Lorando 'Snaxx" Johnson. "But I wouldn't say it's because of them."

Spencer Sanders threw seven interceptions in the two games against Baylor last season.

But since the senior dual-threat quarterback's four picks in the Big 12 title game, he has thrown for 1,287 yards, run for 235 and accounted for 17 TDs (14 passing, three rushing) in Oklahoma State's past four games, including a bowl win over Notre Dame. He has only one interception and three four-TD games in that span.

Blake Shapen was filling in for injured starter Gerry Bohanon when he com-

pleted his first 17 passes with three touchdowns for Baylor in the 21-16 Big 12 championship victory. Shapen is now the outright starter, having won the job in the spring before Bohanon transferred to South Florida.

Shapen has only one interception this season while completing 69 of 100 passes for 773 yards and seven TDs, three of those last week at Iowa State.

"Their concept offensively from the outside looking in is the same as it was in the championship game," Cowboys coach Mike Gundy said of Shapen. "He might complete 14 passes in a game, and it may only be for 75 yards, but three or four of them might be converting third downs. It looks like they've programmed him in that direction until they play action, max protect, and try to throw it over your head."

RUNNING REESE

True freshman running back Richard Reese had five rushing touchdowns in Baylor's first two home games, and added another last week on the road when he was the team's leading rusher for the third time this season.

With Taye McWilliams missing the past two games in concussion protocol, and likely out again Saturday, Reese has gotten 40 carries even without start-

"His improvement says so much just about him and about his ability to learn and his ability to take coaching," Aranda said. "He's just way selfless."

MORE TO THE STORY

When the Cowboys last played in Waco to end the 2020 regular season, it was a game that had been pushed back nearly two months because of the pandemic. Oklahoma State won 42-3 against the very shorthanded home team.

Because of injuries and COVID-19, either positive tests or contact tracing, the Bears that night were without 47 people — players, coaches and support personnel. There was only one full-time offensive assistant coach at the game to close out Aranda's first season with a 2-7 record after initially being unable to have spring drills with their new coaching staff.

Baylor has since won its last nine home games.

Texas Tech visits No. 25 K-State as both come off big wins

There was a common conversation this week within the walls of the Football Training Facility at Texas Tech and the Vanier Family Football Complex adjacent to Bill Snyder Family Stadium at Kansas State.

How to deal with success.

In a cheeky opening week of conference play in the Big 12, both schools dealt soon-to-be SEC defectors a loss. The Red Raiders rallied past then-No. 22 Texas in overtime during the afternoon slate of games, then the Wildcats sent a shock through college football when they walked into then-No. 6 Oklahoma and pranced out with a 41-34 victory.

"We met yesterday and that was the first thing we talked about," said Red Raiders coach Joev Mc-Guire, whose team visits No. 25 Kansas State on Saturday. "I was Googling all these sports quotes and guess what? They're all about failure. Anyone who said anything, from Michael Jordan to Kobe Bryant, it's all about how you handle failure. It's not success.

"So we talked about that," McGuire continued, "and how everyone is patting you on the back and saying, 'Great job.' And then we talked about how you want to be remembered. It's not for beating

Or in the Wildcats' case, it's not for beating Okla-

That's because eitherTexas Tech (3-1) or Kansas State (3-1) will be 2-0 in league play after Saturday, and the winner will have a big step up in the race for a spot in the Big 12 championship game. And

that's ultimately the goal for both programs, one from Lubbock that has never won the conference crown, and one from Manhattan that hasn't done it in a decade.

"You try to enjoy that win last week," said Wildcats quarterback Adrian Martinez, the unquestioned star of their upset in Norman. "But playing in the Big 12, playing against a really good opponent this week, you have to reset. If we're not ready, they're going to beat us. Anybody can beat anybody on any given Saturday."

The Wildcats know that perhaps better than anyone. They lost to Tulane the week before beating the Sooners.

"We definitely had a chip in our shoulder. Definitely had something to prove," Kansas State fullback Ben Sinnott said. "I'm proud we took advantage of that opportunity. Now we have to do it

LOPSIDED SERIES

Kansas State has won six straight and 10 of the last 11 against Texas Tech, including a razor-thin 25-24 victory last season in Lubbock. The Red Raiders haven't won in Manhattan since 2008, when Mike Leach was still on the sideline.

"It's my favorite place to play on the road," said McGuire, who spent the past five years as an assistant at Baylor. "They have great fans, and it's a true college atmosphere you're going into. It's going to be a lot of fun."

RUNNING AGAINST A WALL

Wildcats running back Deuce Vaughn got back on track against Oklahoma, running 25 times for 116 yards to maintain his Big 12 lead in rushing. As

a whole, the Wildcats are rolling up 248.2 yards per game, the seventh-best run total in the nation. But they'll be tested by a tough Texas Tech defensive front that has surrendered just 399 yards rushing through its first four games, the second-lowest total by a Red Raiders defense since 2000.

AIR RAID, SORT OF

Red Raiders quarterback Donovan Smith is the league's leading passer with 1,117 yards and nine touchdowns, and he's coming off a big game against Texas in which he threw for 331 yards and two scores. But he's not the prototypical Air Raid quarterback of yesteryear in Lubbock. Smith showed some running ability last week with 15 carries for 42 vards.

OPPORTUNISTIC CATS

Kansas State is plus-6 in turnover margin through its first four games, picking off seven passes and recovering a fumble, and its ability to maintain possession was a big factor in the win over Oklahoma. Both teams were turnover-free, but the Wildcats did stop the Sooners on a fourth-down conversion attempt.

RANKING? WHO CARES

Along with beating Texas when it was ranked, the Red Raiders also beat then-No. 25 Houston and played No. 10 North Carolina State tough on the road in its only loss. This will be the first time they have started a season with four of the first five games against Top 25 teams, and the first fourgame stretch against ranked opponents since 2012.

"That was a huge win for Joey (last week)," Kansas State coach Chris Klieman said. "Got a signature win right away."

No. 17 Texas A&M seeks 2-0 SEC start at Mississippi State

Having seen his team regain its swagger since an upset loss, Jimbo Fisher now wants consistency from No. 17 Texas A&M.

That will be important on Saturday when the Aggies (3-1, 1-0 SEC) visit Mississippi State (3-1, 0-1). Last fall's 26-22 loss in College Station showed the Bulldogs can take advantage of chances, and A&M certainly doesn't want a repeat of that.

"We'll have to play a great game on the road and be ready to play," said Fisher, whose team begins a threegame road stretch of conference play. "But at the same time, we've got to keep grinding and we've got to learn to practice not harder, but smarter and better. And be more efficient in the things we do."

The Aggies' pursuit of a third con-

secutive victory indicates how well they've moved past a 17-14 home loss to unranked Appalachian State three weeks ago. Texas A&M has beaten then-No. 13 Miami (Fla.) before rallying past then-No. 10 Arkansas 23-21 last week.

It required overcoming a 14-0 hole with 23 consecutive points. Mindful of MSU's potential to pile up yards and points, the Aggies ope to slow down the pass-heavy scheme with their 10th-ranked passing defense (153.2 yards allowed per game).

The Bulldogs are seeking their first SEC win after letting LSU off the hook two weeks ago.

The Bulldogs scrubbed that disappointment from their minds with a 45-14 rout of Bowling Green. Quarterback Will Rogers threw six touchdowns to match his own school mark set last season.

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The junior also completed 39 of 50 passes for 409 yards, a big rebound from his struggles in Baton Rouge. But Rogers is only as effective as his protection, which is among several areas where Bulldogs coach Mike Leach wants improvement.

"I'd like to improve on the offensive line, the defensive line," said Leach, whose team is a slight favorite. "I'd just like to see us play with lower pads, just (play) together more and get better. That's the most important thing, to control the line of scrimmage.'

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
