A number of merchants will be closed on Monday, however you are asked to post your flag sometime during the holiday.

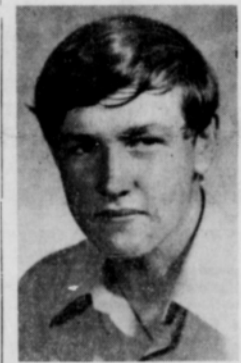
