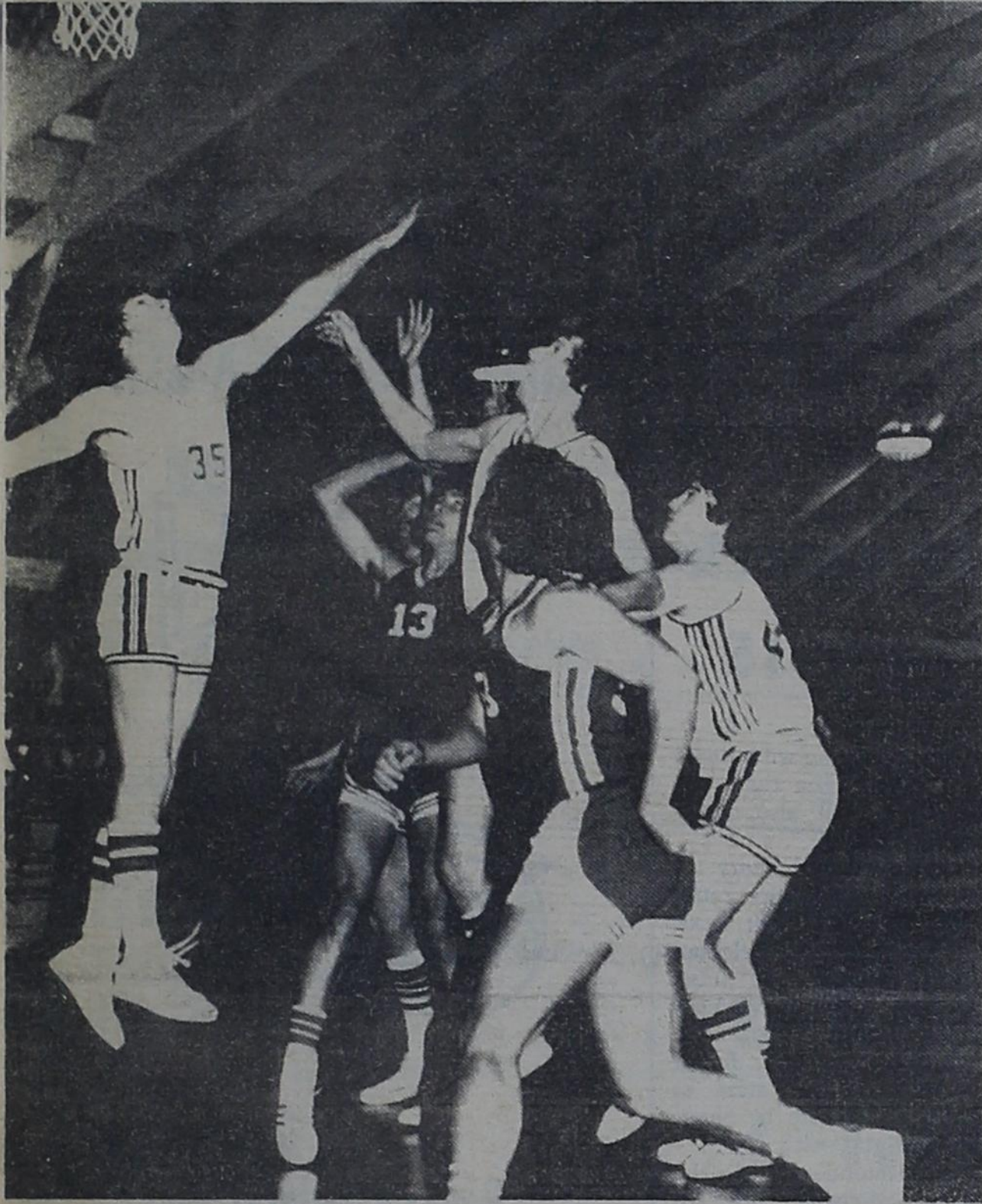

The Stephenson Fund was opened Dec. 22, 1976 with a \$110 deposit and the balance of the fund as of Dec. 30, 1976 was \$810.

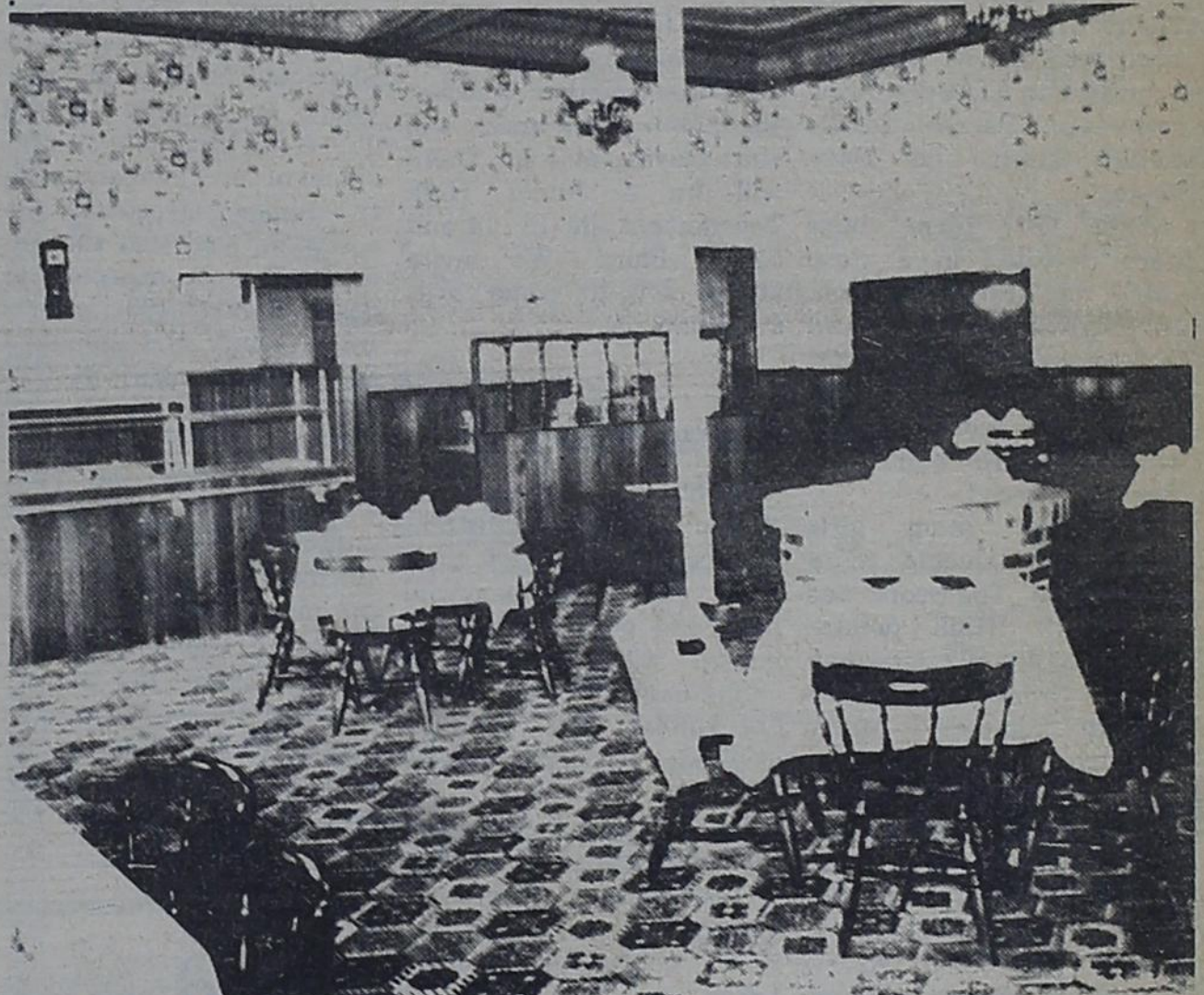

# Registration Set For CJC Clyde Extension

CLYDE-Cisco Junior College Registrar Olin Odom III has reminded college students in the Clyde-Abilene area that registration for classes for the coming spring semester at the Clyde Educational Center, an extension of CJC, will be held on Thursday, January 13.

The Clyde Educational Center will register students during the three days immediately preceding the regularly-scheduled day of registration. Students may come to the CJC Building in downtown Clyde between 9:00 A.M. and noon or 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday, January 10-12, to pre-register if they wish.

Students may sign up for day classes between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. and night school registration will be held from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m., Odom said. The registration session will be at the Clyde Educational Center's downtown building in Clyde.

An extensive schedule of both day and

evening classes is available for those interested, Mr. Odom said. Some of the day courses included English, Math, Government, Speech, Psychology, Sociology, History, Biology and P.E. A sampling of night courses includes Accounting, Government, Spanish, Business, Psychology, Sociology, Math, Economics, Biology, History, English, and Speech.

Day classes will be held on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday only, and most evening classes will meet once per week for three hours.

Mr. Odom also reminded prospective students that the Clyde Educational Center's low state-supported costs would be in effect as usual. A full fifteen-hour load totals \$124.75, with twelve hours costing \$112.00. Other examples of tuition and fee costs are: Nine hours-\$92.40; 6 hours-\$59.00; and one three-hour course-\$47.50.

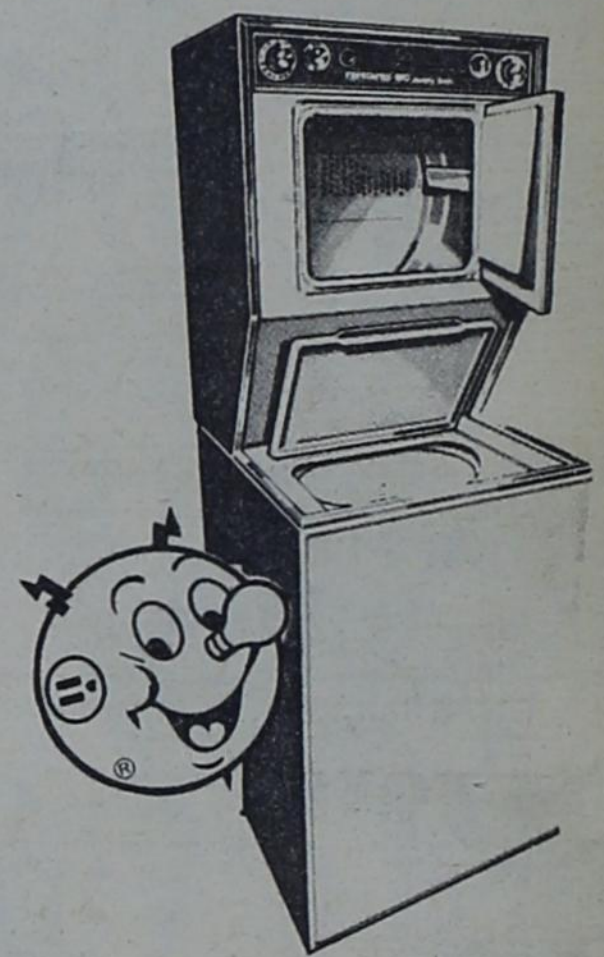

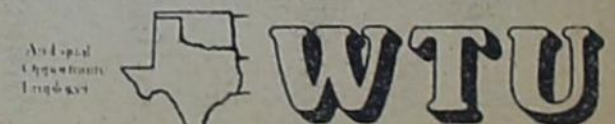

## Letter to the Editor

January 3, 1977

Dear Editor:

There is an urgent need for all Licensed Vocational Nurses to be made aware of impending legislation that is of vital concern to everyone.

The Texas Legislative Budget Board is recommending that the Texas State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners be placed under the Texas Health Resources Commission. The Budget Board will make this recommendation to the Texas Legislature in January.

As of now, the Licensed Vocational Nurse Board is a separate, independent state agency. The activities of the Board are paid by fees from Vocational Nurses.

It is the feeling of the Texas League of Vocational Nurses, as well as many LVN's who do not belong to the League, that this proposed action would be detrimental to LVNs, and perhaps cause a decline in the health needs of the people of Texas.

Should this proposed action be passed by the Legislature, the LVNs of Texas would not only lose their independence, but also their identity. We (LVNs) have worked many long, hard years to attain our place on the professional health team. And, having attained this goal, we do not want to lose our own Board of Examiners which has done an outstanding job of maintaining high standards and has developed an acute sense of responsibility for

training the Vocational Nurse.

As a member of the Texas League of Vocational Nurses, and as a very concerned individual, I request everyone concerned—LVN, RN, M.D., Administrators—to write your senator and representative. Request that they study ALL ASPECTS of the proposed transfer, and vote to keep our Board of Vocational Nurses an independent state agency as it is now.

If any concerned citizen has any questions concerning this proposed action, please contact me. AND—PLEASE—write our people in Austin. . . Senator Grant Jones, State Capitol and Representative David Stubbeman, State Capitol.

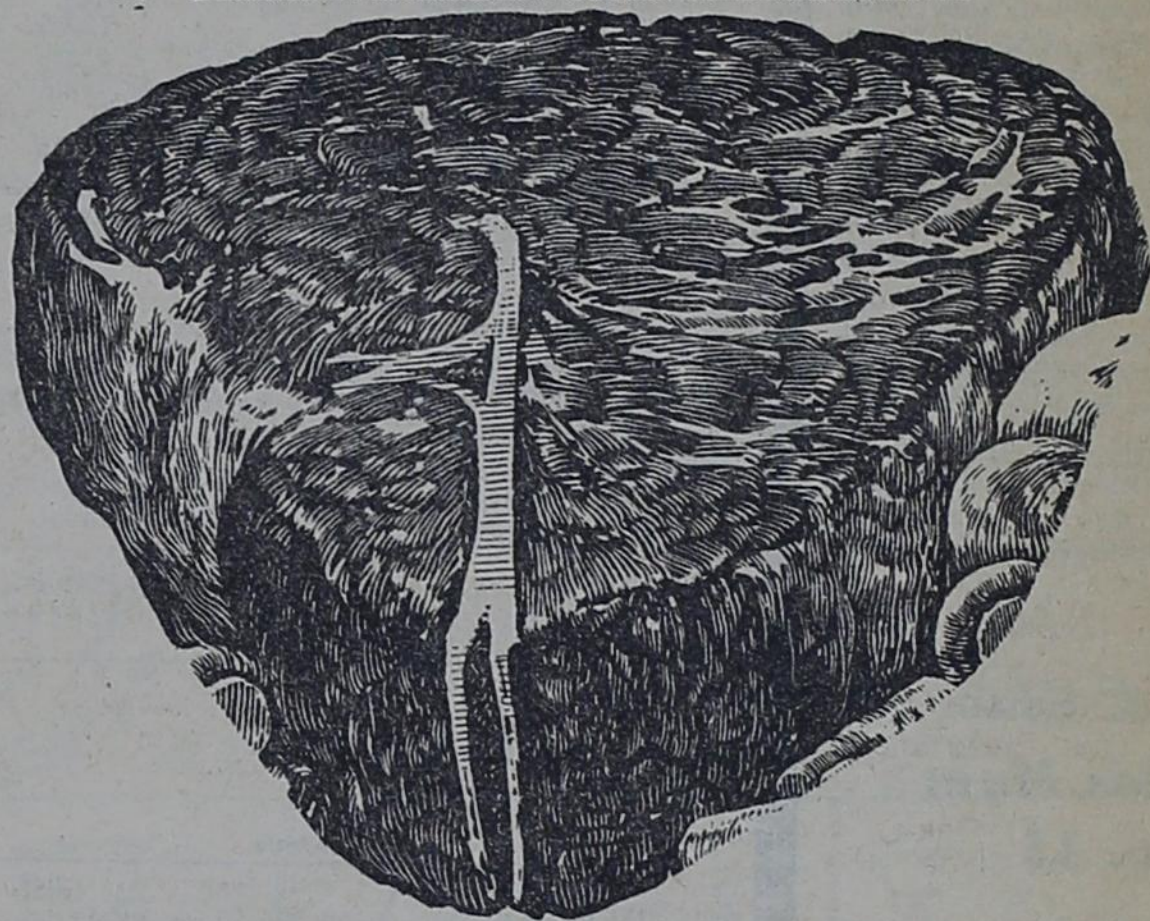

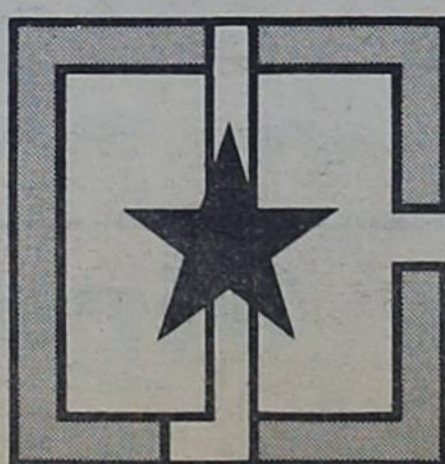

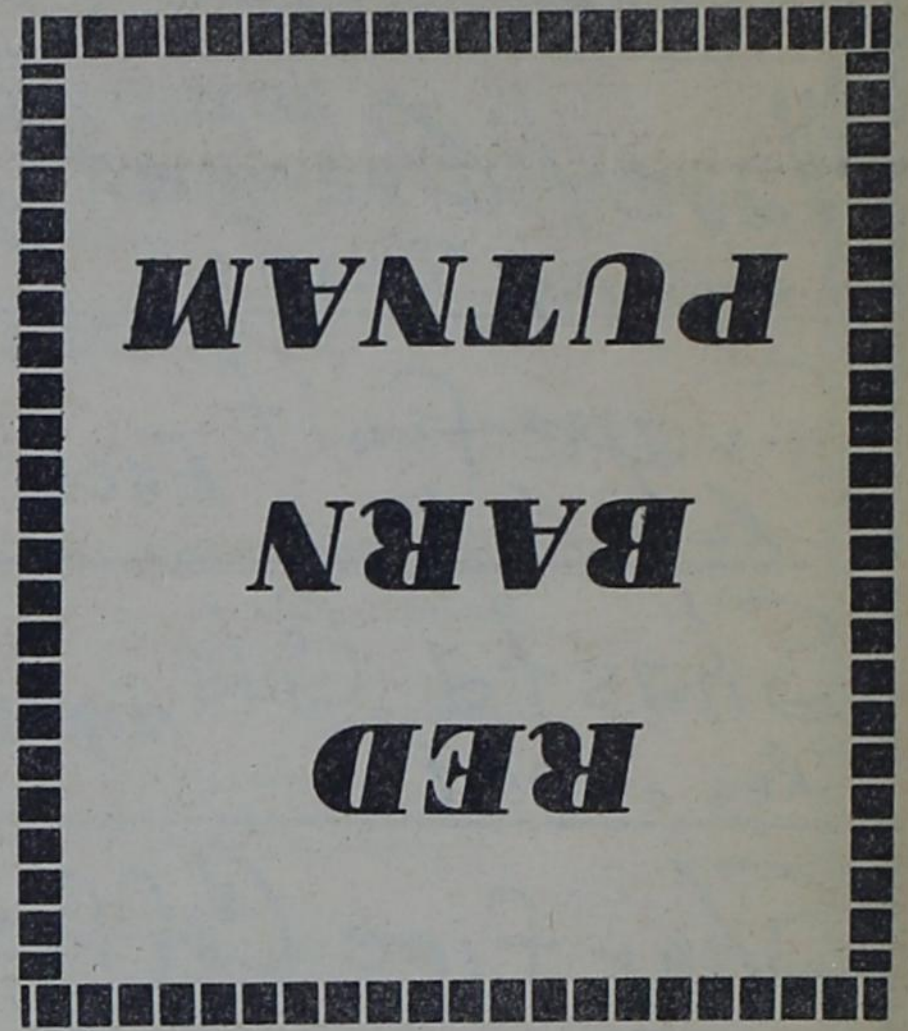
