The only personal liability for fire, as the National Board of Fire Underwriters points out, is a principle long established in Europe. In France, for example if it is proven that a person's carelessness was responsible for a fire, he is held financially responsible for all damage done to the property of others.

That principle has never been generally accepted in America, but there are one or two scattered instances where it has been applied. In 1926, in Cincinnati, a citizen was ordered to comply with certain fire-preventative ordinances. He failed to do so, and fire broke out on his property. It was put out by the fire department, which sent a bill for \$650 to cover the expense involved. The case went finally to court, and the city was awarded damages of \$500. A similar instance occurred in New York. A company was ordered to install fire sprinklers, did not do so, and sustained a major fire. Under a 50-year-old law, the city sued and received \$1,500 for extingushing effective only to curb extreme loss
