BULLDOGS SWAMP CHILlicothe UNDER A 48 TO 0 SCORE

The Burkburnett Bulldogs entered little opposition from the Chillicothe Eagles in their Thanksgiving day engagement here Thursday afternoon, rolling up a 48-0 victory on a sloppy field before a large crowd. The game wound up the 1934 season for each eleven.

Dogs Score at Will

Bank Failures in U. S. Dwindle To Lowest In Years

Bank failures in the United States have dwindled to the lowest level in 14 years with only 57 institutions with combined deposits of less than \$40,000,000 closing so far this year, federal reserve board figures showed today.

The closing compared with a record of 2,430 failures in the year ended June 30, 1932, which tied up a total of \$1,761,002,000 c/sings were smallest since 1920, when 47 failures tied up \$20,725,000.

Along with rapid decline in bank closings, the Federal Deposits Insurance corporation, which is supplying insurance up to \$5,000 for individual accounts, in 14,100 of the country's 15,600 banks, reported today another sweeping rise in bank deposits.

The money received from the sale of Christmas seals maintains free chest clinics, visiting nurse service and furnishes the tuberculin for the skin testing of children. Through these clinics are discovered many early cases of tuberculosis in time to effect a cure. Mindful that every case comes from another we constantly endeavor to find the other case.

As a result of these tests many children now are in the preventative Sanatorium, Texas. Others are under special observation and care at home and at school to prevent their breaking down with active tuberculosis in later life. With these facts to face every one is urged to buy Christmas seals and help fight tuberculosis.

Does a man of thirty have the same strength and endurance he had at twenty? Does he have the same vigor and vitality at forty that he had at thirty? If not, why not?

The Body Is a Machine

The human body is an organism made up of a number of units co-operating with each other to make a perfectly functioning machine. It is made of materials of a certain kind and quality. Its term of usefulness depends upon the quality of the material that has gone into its making and the kind of use and abuse to which it has been subjected. So we must assume, to start with, in trying to arrive at a correct answer to the above questions, that the life of the body is limited, discounting all causes of premature dissolution.

As to what shall be considered premature we can for the purposes of this treatise confine ourselves to death from accidental causes—injuries, infectious diseases, etc.

It takes the human organism twenty-five years to attain its full growth and development and it should last four times that long. The reason it so seldom does is not so much because of what is done to it as because of the kind of material it is made of to begin with. The fact that quite a number of people reached the century mark shows that it is possible.

The future fact that some of these people worked hard, ate pretty much what they pleased, smoked tobacco, and drank liquor, shows that these things were not capable of killing them. Of course, the individual with a weak make-up will live longer if he lives carefully. But the point I am trying to make is that you will not live a hundred years no matter how careful you are if you are not made of the kind of stuff that will last.

We Begin to Die From Birth

In a certain sense we are dying from the moment we are born. That is to say, the various functioning parts begin to wear out from the time they start to work. Certain changes take place in these parts year after year, the sum total of which may appropriately be termed a progressive loss of elasticity. Stated another way, we may designate this change as development of rigidity.

Even though a man live a perfect life he slows up a little each year. He has a little less strength, a little less endurance, a little less reserve, a little less come-back. He is a little more rigid. His elastic limit is more quickly reached.

Hints for the Household

FOR DECEMBER
 By Betty Webster

Why not make a handkerchief case for a Christmas gift? It is surprisingly easy to construct and is a delightfully dainty present.

The material may be any kind that you like best—moire, satin, taffeta, crepe de chine, lace, or even chintz. I think moire ribbon is easier to work with because it has body and the edges do not have to be finished.

Instructions

Get a piece of material twelve inches wide and eighteen inches long, twenty-four inches of matching baby ribbon, a layer of absorbent cotton six by six inches and some sachet powder.

Then cut a piece six inches by twelve from the eighteen inch strip, fold it in half, insert the cotton sprinkled with a little sachet and sew up the open sides. You will have a pad six inches square.

Then take the twelve inches square of silk and from each corner cut a three inch square. This will leave a six inch square in the center with four tabs each three inches long. Fold in the corners of each tab until they meet at the edge of the six inch center and tack them down.

Triangular Tabs

Each tab is triangular. Take the pad and place it on the center square and tack it down covering the raw edges of the tabs. Fasten a six inch piece of baby ribbon to the point of each tab and make a little point of each tab and make a little flower for each from the three

inch squares, fold in the tabs and press flat with a cool iron.

DO YOU KNOW THAT:

1. The box of a carpet sweeper should be frequently opened over dampened newspaper, the dirt emptied out and hair lint cleaned from the brushes with a button-hook, coarse comb or an old pair of scissors—and the mechanism oiled?
2. A vacuum cleaner ought to be emptied immediately after using to insure the best results in cleaning?
3. Brooms should always be stood handles down when not in use to prevent the bristles from spreading and breaking?
4. A dust mop ought to be washed frequently and oiled to be kept in condition?
5. A silk cloth is the best sort of dust cloth for intricately carved furniture?

RECIPES

Banana Cream Pie

- 3 large bananas
- 1/2 cup of sugar
- 1/2 lemon, grated rind and juice
- 1 egg slightly beaten
- 1 cup of milk
- 1/4 teaspoon of salt
- 1/4 teaspoon of nutmeg

Pastry

Force the bananas through a fine sieve, add sugar and lemon, egg, milk, salt and nutmeg. Put mixture into a pastry shell and cover and bake for ten minutes in a hot oven (450 degrees) then in a slow one (about 325 degrees) until filling is done.

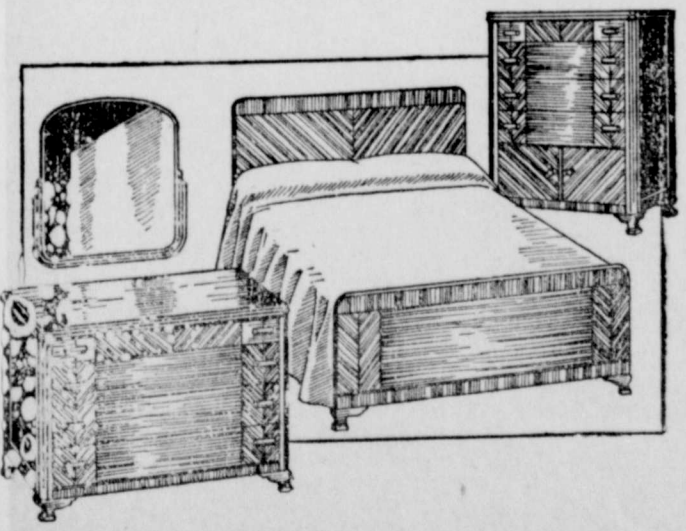

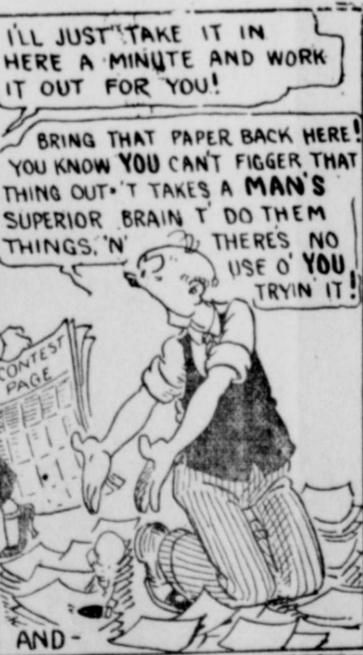

Why Study Spanish?

Can I as an American pay the debt of gratitude I owe the Spanish nation?

Can I as a Texan pay the debt I owe the Spaniards?

As an individual citizen I cannot; as a nation of world-citizens, we can.

To become a world citizen I must become educated, for education has as its primary objective the training of the youth for citizenship which makes necessary an understanding of other races which comes only through a knowledge of their languages; therefore, for the North American, a study of the Spanish language has three world-wide values:

1. Commercial
2. Cultural
3. Politico, social or international.

Commercial necessity has force recognition for Spanish upon our school program, because the total commerce of the United States with Spanish speaking countries each year is more than \$2,000,000,000 which is more than the trade with German and French countries combined. Spain alone buys from us some \$8,000,000 worth of products annually; because, the number of Spanish speaking people in the world is second only to that of those speaking English; because, our influence is spreading Southward; Hispano-America is turning more and more to us for goods, inspiration and education; because, the United States buys more from Latin America than she sells. In the last seven years she has paid out to these republics \$4,000,000,000 more than she has received from them; because, South and Central American enterprises need North American Capital and North America needs raw products from South and Central America; because, in these three continents, North America, Central America, and South America, only three languages are spoken: English, which is spoken by more people than any other language, Spanish, which ranks second only to English, and Portuguese which is akin to Spanish; and, because, the people of the United States are dependent upon their Central and South American sisters for indispensable products; for example, the linoleum on your floor may be made of Spanish Cork, your vanilla may be from Mexico, your coffee from Venezuela, your chocolate from Ecuador (Spanish word for equator); your honey, fruits and sugar from Cuba, your olives from Spain, your ring of platinum from Columbia, your shoes of leather from Argentina with eyelets of tin from Bolivia, the lead of your pencil from Mexico, your ink from a lo-wood extract from South America, your nitrate fertilizer from the nitrate desert of Chile, or even the asphalt used to pave the streets of your own city from Venezuela.

A Spanish course is rich in its cultural values. To understand a language one must know the customs and philosophy of life of that nation, it includes the interpretation of the life and mind of the people studied. To study a foreign language develops in the learner patience, the power of concentration, and habits of thoroughness. What supports the international value of the Spanish course? This: a knowledge of Spanish is the key to the understanding of a great race the qualities of which are genuine courtesy, a marked love of democracy, sobriety, industry and long patience; this: Spain has stored up

folklore, traditions and legends of the great periods of her history which have served as a treasure house for writers of all nations and of all periods; and this: Spain has produced the world's greatest novel, Don Quixote and two of the world's most famous painters.

Many people of the United States think of Spain as a nation filled with sunshine, covered with perceptual blue skies, perfumed by beautiful flowers, and graced by "senoritas" who wear gay shawls and mantillas and roses in their hair and enchanted by "caballeros" who play guitars and sing songs of love or dress in the glittering costume of the matador—but there is a modern, a real Spain; a Spain that admires the Americans and tries to inspire in the Spaniard the desire of possessing some of the American characteristics.

Finally, Spanish should be made compulsory in our public schools because it is recognized that the commercial value of Spanish today is higher than that of any other modern language; because, the study of a foreign language will widen the mental horizon and deepen the intellectual life of the learner; because, when the North American acquires a knowledge of the Spanish people and their lives and customs, he will probably realize that North America does not possess all that is good and desirable and that his native land can learn something from other countries; therefore, he will become less hide bound, less bigoted but broadened in his view of life and more tolerant of other nation's views which will make him a fairminded, a sympathetic, and an intelligent world citizen.

The Coach's Job On the Field

In the first play the coach must gain the cooperation, respect and confidence of the players. To do this he must know the game, be able

to teach it, understand human nature and maintain discipline.

Knowing the Game

It may seem to the outsider that any former player of ability would have enough knowledge of the game to coach a team. That is not the case. Football is a complicated game. It is possible for a player to give outstanding performance on the field without knowing very much about such general football technicalities as offensive and defensive tactics.

Football knowledge comes only from years of study and observation; an inventive mind is not necessary but powers of observation are an asset. Ability to grasp the general principles of all various styles of play to adopt such tactics to the available material provides the basis for a foundation. Experience produced from the old trial and error methods develops this information into something workable.

To know football, a coach must expose himself to football knowledge. There are countless methods of teaching fundamentals and numerous styles of offensive and defensive play. There is nothing stereotyped about coaching methods. Each successful coach has his own pet theories. Football knowledge comes from a study of these various theories and a careful selection of the good points.

At the start every Coach makes mistakes. To become successful it is necessary to recognize these errors and correct them. Unless suffering from a stubborn disposition; and Coach should constantly keep up with the times and change his system year by year to better cope with the trend of the times. Pig headedness produce stagnation. The Coach who refuses to keep learning is foolish.

Teaching

The fact that a Coach becomes saturated with knowledge of the game does not necessarily mean that he will be able to satisfactorily teach it. It is far better to have a limited knowledge of technicalities and be able to impart that know-

ledge to the candidates than to possess a wealth of the finer points and not be able to relay them to the players.

It is only the knowledge which the players grasp which actually counts. Information closeted in the head of the Coach never produced a smart team.

Some of the same principles which apply to the teaching of academic subjects apply to teaching football. The work must be definitely planned in advance. The fundamentals must be learned first before time can be spent on the finer points. No good geometry teacher would consider assigning a class and advanced problem to solve before the basic axioms had been thoroughly learned. In the same way there is no sense of conducting a scrimmage until the players have learned to block.

It isn't enough to show a group of boys how to block or tackle. They only learn from repetition. They may grasp a few points from illustration. Observation of an example gives them a start in the right direction. But it is drill and repetition which really produce the development.

Constant repetition become distasteful. Both the teacher and the pupil get tired of continuing drilling on elementary tactics. The players naturally will tend to fight shy of these drills whenever possible. They become satisfied with the execution long before it reaches perfection. That is the time when persistence on the part of the Coach is necessary. The players must be driven to master those first details. They won't like it at the time, but they will be thankful later on when that hard work starts to produce a few victories.

The mistakes of the players in the game are relection of improper teaching or insufficient drill. Frequently I have heard Coaches commenting on the mistakes of their players declare that they had been told a dozen times not to make an error. It is probably true that they had been told but they certainly hadn't been taught. There is a lot of difference in telling a player what to do and teaching him to do it. That difference is hours of drill in doing it properly.

As saw before, it isn't what a Coach knows, but what he teaches or passes on to the players which counts. The vast knowledge of a history teacher doesn't help the pupils pass the examination. Only the facts which he has successfully planted into their heads will ever be returned to him on paper. Similarly, the football knowledge of the coach who sits on the bench will not help the players on the field. It is only that knowledge which has been drilled into them on the practice field which will be evident in a game.

Understanding

Before one can ever get very far in the football coaching profession he must learn that all individuals cannot be handled alike. Any football squad is made up of varying personalities. Some candidates are conscientious by nature. Such types should be praised and encouraged.

Others need to be driven. By nature they are easily satisfied. A partial block is good enough for them. They have to be aroused to try for perfection. Praise runs this type. Commendation in such cases must be reserved for times when it will do no harm, such as the end of the game or perhaps better at the end of the season.

Then there are always a few who have an extra dose of self-satisfaction in their make up. The other fellow is always to blame for any mistake. They can do no wrong. They resent any criticism of their ability. They feel that the success of the team rests entirely on their shoulders.

Then there is the opposite type who is burdened by an inferiority complex. They are afraid they will make a mistake.

All these varying personalities have to be studied and treated individually. There are always those who have to be driven constantly, those who need to be encouraged and praised, those who need to have their head's deflated and those who need an injection of confidence.

Discipline

There never should be any favoritism shown any of the members of the squad as far as training rules and regulations are concerned. In some ways football practice is a good military drill. All members of the squad should be required to report on time and maintain a certain training schedule.

It is imperative that a coach insists on his orders being carried out. It is not possible to overlook insubordination of infractions of rules and still have any morale on the squad. One single bit of leniency breeds disaster and it is far better to drop from the squad any trouble maker no matter how good a player

he may be, than to lose the of the whole group.

Frank N. Belgrano, Jr., recently elected National Commander of the American Legion, has written to the National Tuberculosis Association that he "earnestly commends to Legionnaires and to all good citizens the heroic fight that is being waged against tuberculosis." The American Legion, Commander Belgrano says, is glad to cooperate in the sale of Xmas Seals during December to finance necessary machinery for the control and prevention of tuberculosis, including clinics, sanatoria, open air schools, medical and nursing services, and research and educational activities.

"That wrappings from packages should not be allowed to accumulate. Barring any catastrophe losses between now and the close of the year, the fire loss in Texas will be lower for 1934 than it has been in any year since 1919.

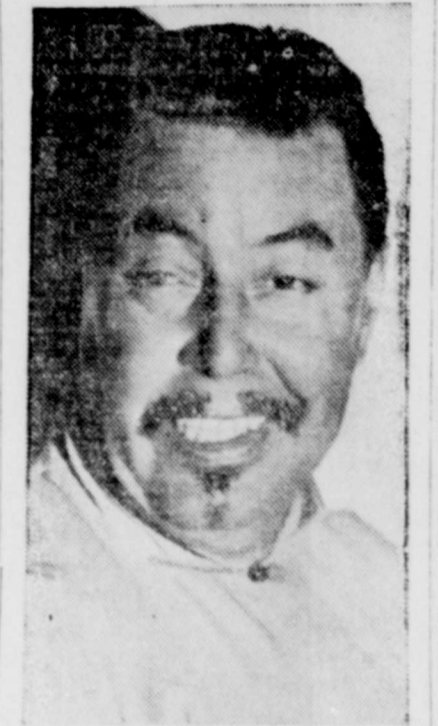
