

STOLEN TRUCK







Mathematics in High School

By C. J. Duncan

The courses in mathematics as taught in high schools in Texas are usually two years of algebra and timate by word, deed or action that one year of plane geometry. Other courses such as solid geometry and trigometry may be taught. The reter chewing tobacco during 1935 quired courses are one year of Algebra and one year of geometry. The student may take for credit one, one and one half, or two years of Algebra. It is strongly recommended that all students expecting to attend college take two years of Algebra for credit. In studying curriculum revision mathematics has been given its share of criticism. I believe much of this critism comes from pupils not willing to put out the effort needed to master the subject and some of the criticism comes bemathematics is sometimes nouncements duly authorized before poorly taught. It is almost certain that the courses in mathematics in high schools will be very much revised during the next few years. However no educator can picture or place a high school course of study in which mathematics in some form does not have a prominent place. We are living in an age of science, and science is helpless without mathematics. Mathematics is a cultural subject too. Not only that but it is a popular subject. In the questionaire filled out by Burkburnett students mathematics received its fair share of votes as the most popular subject.
