

CONSTRUCTION WORK BEGUN—Construction on the St. Ann's Catholic Church has now started. The Church will be located on Highland St., in North Village Addition. All work is hoped to be completed by September 1, 1979.

Construction Begins on New Catholic Church

BAIRD- A ground breaking ceremony was held in the spring for a new Catholic Church. The name of the church is St. Anne's. Construction has now begun. The foundation is laid and the metal work is done. They hope to start on the roof as soon as the city hooks up the electricity.

They set the poles July 27. It is hoped that construction will be completed by the 1st of September. The church is constructed of Spanish architecture and three sides of it are of mission stone. It will have rounded arches. The construction work is being done by Paul Bo-

nine Construction Company out of Abilene. This church is a mission church out of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Abilene. It will be serviced by priests from there also. Services this Sunday at the Catholic Church will be at 8:30 a.m.

Clyde Man Indicted for July 4 Robbery

BAIRD- A 42nd District Court grand jury returned four felony indictments here Thursday including one against a young man who sued Callahan County a couple of years ago.

Brain Smart, 18, and Bobby Lynn Hale, both of Clyde were indicted for the July 4 burglary of the Party Port liquor store at Putnam. Deputy Sheriff Jess Henley headed the investigation of the holiday break-in.

Smart had made headlines in 1977 and 1978 when he and an aunt, Mary Sue Smart of Clyde sued Callahan County, claiming that Smart had been illegally arrested and detained as a 15 year-old juvenile in 1976.

After hearing all the evidence a 42nd District Court jury ruled that he was due none of the damages he sought.

Eddie Wayne Black, 17, was indicted for the July 1 theft of a pickup truck belonging to Kenneth Freeman of Rt. 4, Clyde. The vehicle was recovered when Black was arrested.

Raymond B. Stuart, 34, of Cisco was indicted for driving while intoxicated, second offense.

Grand jurors decided to pass for more consideration later a retaliation charge against Harold Wade King, 18, of Baird for allegedly threatening to kill a highway patrolman.

King is charged with retaliating against DPS Trooper David Parkhill of Callahan County of May 21 by threatening to blow his head off after the trooper arrested him for public intoxication at a Baird pool hall.

Oil Field Thieves Arrested In Coleman County

BAIRD- After 4 weeks of investigation, Charles R. McLaughlin and Robert Dobbins, both of Coleman, Texas were arrested by Sheriff Deputy Ed Duncan at Coleman, Texas.

These arrests cleared three oil field thefts that occurred north of Putnam and one oil field theft in Coleman County. Approximately 15,000.00 worth of oil field equipment was located.

In other news, Sunday, July 29, at

about 11 p.m., Bill Russell and the sheriff's office were involved in a pursuit

of a stolen Ford Bronco. Officers forced both suspects to abandon the stolen car, just west of the rodeo grounds in Baird.

Robert Alan Moffett was arrested at approximately 3:15 a.m. by Sheriff Bill Skinner and Deputy Terry Addison. The other suspect is still at large.

Senior Teenage League Advances to State

BAIRD- The Baird Sr. League baseball team played Haskell for the Regional title. Baird won 13 to 0. In the playoff against them, Baird had 22 runs and Haskell 13.

The coaches for this team are Derrel Wright and Don Wilson.

The team will travel to Tyler, Texas to play in the State Tournament.

In the first game of the State Teenage Baseball Tournament, Tyler defeated

Baird, 16-0.

Doug Leders allowed just three hits. Two singles to Mitch Jenkins and a single to Lindsay Jenkins. Steve Holcomb was the loser for Baird. Holcomb was forced to leave the game in the fourth inning with the score 5-0 when he was hit on the elbow with a line drive.

Baird's next game is Wednesday at 3 p.m. against the loser of Tuesday's Tyler-Midland game.

Law To Change August 27, 1979

COUNTY- Frontage road traffic on Interstate and other multi-lane highways must yield to traffic leaving or entering the main lanes. That is the new law which becomes effective August 27, 1979.

House Bill 1421, passed by the 66th Legislature and signed by the Governor on June 11, 1979, provides that frontage road traffic shall yield the right-of-way to traffic entering an on-ramp or leaving on off-ramp on controlled access highways. It also applies to rural areas where two-way frontage roads exist.

The change may cause problems on

two-way frontage roads for motorists who have grown accustomed to main lane traffic doing the yielding at exit ramps. A problem could be in store for other frontage road drivers who think vehicles about to enter the main lanes must yield.

Although the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will have new YIELD signs in place by August 27, the habits already formed will be difficult to break. Careful observance of highway signs will continue to be very important during the re-development of frontage road driving habits.

Pre-registration for Grades Kindergarten - 8 Aug. 16

BAIRD- Parents of students who will be in grades K-8 this year in Baird Elementary School are asked to register their students at the principal's office between 8 a.m. & 5 p.m. on Thursday, August 16, or Friday, August 17. If Students cannot be registered at this time please contact the principal's office at 854-1315 by

August 15.

Kindergarten students who registered in May do not have to register again. If your child will be in kindergarten or first grade, a birth certificate is required at registration, also all immunizations must be updated for all school children before school begins.

Immunization Requirements

BAIRD- Immunization requirements for the 1979-80 school year are as follows:

1. Polio. Three doses of oral polio are required, provided one dose or a booster has been received on or after the fourth birthday.
2. Diphtheria/Tetanus/Whooping cough. At least three doses of DTP are required, provided one dose or a booster has been received on or after the fourth birthday.
3. Measles. Measles vaccine is required

on or after the first birthday, or provide a history of measles illness.

4. Rubella. One dose of rubella vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the twelfth birthday.

5. Mumps. Mumps vaccine will be required for all students under eight years of age. A history of mumps illness will be accepted in lieu of vaccine, if it has been validated in writing by a physician.

Swimming Pool Open Throughout August

BAIRD- The swimming pool in the Baird City Park will be open throughout the month of August.

Operating hours are 1:30-6:30 each afternoon except Sunday when it is open from 2 to 5 and Wednesday when it is

closed for cleaning.

Ladies are invited for special swim time on Tuesday and Friday mornings. The pool is also available for private parties after regular operating hours. For more information check with the manager at the pool office.

Football Practice Starts Here August 13

BAIRD- The 1979 football practices will begin Monday, August 13. The morning practice will begin at 7 a.m. and the

evening practice at 4 p.m.

All players can come by and pick up their shoes, Wednesday, August 8 anytime between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m.

U. S. TEXAS AID

The U.S. Department of Commerce National Technical Information Service reports that the United States government, during the fiscal year ending on

September 30, 1977, distributed \$20,196,082,000 to Texas. Based on Texas population of approximately 12,500,000 persons, federal money distributed in Texas during the fiscal year end-

ing on September 30, 1977, amounted to \$1,615,69 per capitol. There are approximately 41 different agencies distributing federal money in the state of Texas.

Jack Rosinbaum Dies Tuesday

CLYDE - Services for Jack Roy Rosinbaum, 49, of Clyde, who was killed Tuesday in a plane crash in the Virgin Islands, were at 3 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Clyde.

The Rev. Ron Keener of the University Baptist Church officiated and George Caffey of Oplin assisted. Burial was in Clyde Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Sanford Boardman, Al Beakins, Jimmy Hicks, Bob Gallagher, Mack Kniffen and June Hogue.

He was born Sept. 26, 1930, in Hawley. He married Oma Loveda McGaugh on Sept. 15, 1951 in Clyde. He served three years in the U.S. Air Force and came back to Eula after the war and lived there for nine years. He then moved to Clyde, where he had lived the last 10 years.

He worked for the Texas Highway Department for five years, and had been employed by the U.S. Post Office in Abilene the last 19 years. He was a deacon in the First Baptist Church in Clyde. He was a veteran of the Korean War.

Survivors include his wife, Loveda, of the home; four sons, Terry of Rt. 2, Clyde, Randy of 548 Ambler in Abilene, and Dean and Gregg, both of Rt. 4, Clyde; one daughter, Rebecca E. Kay of Rt. 5, Belton; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Rosinbaum of Rt. 1, Abilene; three bro-



Of this total, \$31,795 million, or 13.15%, was accomplished with the assistance of specified government programs. Government programs assisting agriculture exports are as follows for the period; sales for foreign currency 6%; long-term dollar in convertible foreign currency credit 3%; government donations and world food programs 1%; donations through voluntary relief agencies 2%. Although approximately 87% of agriculture exports for the period are listed as outside specific government programs, some do receive government assistance.






