





#### United Gas Pipe Line Company To Build Big Line

United Gas Pipe Line Company has been granted top priorities by the War Production Board for the construction of a 24-inch main natural gas transmission pipe line approximately 140 miles long from the Carthage gas field to the company's Sterlington compressor station near oMnroe, La., R. H. Hargrove,

vice president and general manager of the company, announced recently.

The company plans to start construction of the line as soon as necessary approval is secured from the Federal Power Commission and complete it by September 1, 1945, or as soon thereafter as possible. The cost of the project is estimated at \$7,000,-

Included in the construction proposal are plans for two measuring stations to be located at the Carthage end of the line, and two in the Monroe area. A telephone line and facilities approximately 140 miles long will also be built, paralleling the pipe line an dinter-connecting with the company's communication Sterlington, Louisiana. However,

He is 5 foot 5" tall and weighs 170 pounds. He has green eyes and curley brown hair.



First put to the test in Foland. the Big Three's Yaita agreement to act jointly in the settlement of troubled political affairs of countries was tabled for a second trial in the case of Romania, where the Radeson government reportedly had been forced out by Moscow and replaced by a communist-dominated regime. At the time the Radescu govern-

ment left office, with Radescu himself seeking sanchiary in the British embassy in Bucharest because of fear of communist assassination, the Russians contended that the regime had failed to take proper action against pro-fascist elements still present in the country and threatening the Red army's supply lines.
