Revitalization of Texas rural life and resettlement of soldiers on the land or in productive jobs, as announced by Karl Hoblitzelle as the twin objectives of the Centennial of Texas Statehood Commission, should arouse widespread interest. At a time when postwar planning is occupying the attention of various important groups in the state there could be no finer goal than making farm life more profitable and attractive, iether for the present occupants on the land or for our returning veterans.

Instead of rearing some huge monument of stone, steel or concrete, Chairman Hoblitzelle would commemorate the century of Texas statehood by setting in motion a program which would improve the lot of those who till the land. Realizing that the normal drift from farm to cities of rural young folks, if unchecked, will continue to rob the farms of their best stock the leaders of the rehabilitation movement will seek to lay the foundations for a movement which will bring to our farms the facilities and comforts of city life. It will require the united effort of many existing agencies, working harmoniously together towards a common objective, to achieve the desired results.

#### A New Way To Can Berries

Wash and cap the berries. Mix -2 cup dry sugar with each qt. of berries. More or less sugar may be used according to taste or availability of sugar. Pack tight and full into clean cans or jars. Do not add water or syrup and do not put lids on containers. Place filled containers into a water bath canner, with water about 3-4 up on the outside of cans or jars. If jars are used, the water should be about 120' F. which is not oo hot to hold the finger in. If the tin cans are used, the water may be boiling hot. Cover the water bath to hold in the steam. As soon as the water comes to a boil, count time.

Steam: Pint jars 10 minutes.

Quart jars, 15 minutes. During steaming some juice is drawn out, and the berries shrink. Take the berries from the container and refill all the other containers, or one could have a few berries in a small pan which could be on top of the filled containers while they are steaming. These extra berries may be used to refill in order to refill in order to have a good pack and avoid floating fruit. After the containers have been refilled, seal the cans and seal jars according to type of lid being used. Return them to the water bath canner and add enough boiling water to cover the containers.
