WAR BOND PREMIER PLANS COMPLETE

Designs Position As City Manager



Loy E. Nichols, City Manager of Burkburnett for the past 2 1/2 years has offered his resignation to the City Commissioners who granted his release effective July 1st. Prior to becoming City Manager, Mr. Nichols served the School District as tax-assessor-collector for 5 1/2 years. He came to Burkburnett from Iowa Park. Mr. Nichols has accepted a position with the White's Auto Stores in the Purchasing Dept., with headquarters in Wichita Falls. Mr. Nichols' wife and seven year old son will continue to make their home in Burkburnett until the housing situation is relieved.

Under Mr. Nichols the City has made steady progress and improvement. His service has been unselfish and valuable. Many post-war plans have been completed, which will be put into effect as soon as present critical materials are released. P. A. Wiggins will be Acting City Manager until the Commissioners decide on a permanent man.

Ramblin' Around

DIRECTIONS FOR BUILDING AN AIR CONDITIONER

First you should assemble the necessary materials. You will need plenty of determination, patience, stubbornness and a will to labor under all kinds of difficulties. If you are an inventive genius it may help some. Studying Rube Goldberg's cartoons is a great help. The best advice is not to try to build one, but if you are determined to do so you will go ahead anyway. Look at every model in town. If you see a strange object projecting from a window, stop and study it thoroughly. It may be an air conditioner. Take the lid off and see what makes it tick. The owner won't care. He may have built it and everyone who has ever built an air conditioner wants you to build one just like his, whether it works or not. If you show the least bit of interest, you won't have to ask questions. Most anybody will tell you how to build one. Get all the information possible, then forget it and go ahead and build yours just like you intended in the first place. Whatever you build probably won't work anyhow, and if you accept too much advice, you won't know who to blame for your failure. You will need a motor and some kind of fan or squirrel cage. Most amateurs prefer the squirrel cage. If you are not on good terms with the squirrels, you won't be trying to build a conditioner. Get what tools you have together then borrow some more from everybody who will lend them to you. If your memory is bad you will come out ahead on this deal, which may be the only thing you gain from your adventure.

Decide how much you can afford to spend on the project. Multiply this figure, by three and you will find the minimum it will cost you. If you think you can build it in 2 days, multiply this by 10. When 20 days have passed, don't get discouraged. You have gone too far to quit. Air conditioners are complicated. Your work shop should be as secluded as possible, preferable small and hot. The intense heat will spur you on to complete the job that will change perspiration to goose pimples. To determine the speed of the fan get two pulleys. Multiply the motor by the big pulley. No that's not right. Multiply the big pulley by the little pulley. That doesn't seem right either. Subtract the small pulley from the large one. One pulley from two pulley is one pulley, but you must have two pulleys, so that can't be right either. You may need some outside help on this.

When the motor, shaft, bearings, pulleys and fan are assembled turn the juice on from a safe distance. If the fan blades come off, you are too fast. If no air come out the front, you are too slow or the fan is running backward. If the latter is the case, turning the conditioner around won't solve the problem. I tried that. It isn't satisfactory to have the excelsior between the window and the fan. Try reversing the motor. You must get water on the hay to have a good conditioner. Several systems may be employed, Spray, pump, drip, drool or flow. Any one or a combination of several may give you the desired results. The amount of water you use in either case will be equal to one-tenth of the amount you waste.

I followed these directions to the letter and to the surprise of all who saw the masterpiece in production, it works.

FARM SAFETY

The President calls attention to the part farmers have played in the war, recognizing that they are faced with more difficult tasks this year due to more shortages than last. Everyone pays tribute to their relentless efforts to produce the goods.

The fact that each month 1,400 farm residents lose

their lives in rural accidents and 125,000 are injured, means, as the President states: "an unnecessary waste of human life as well as of time and material." Farm organizations such as the Grange, Farm Bureau, Farmer's Union, and like groups, should perform a service for their country by stressing the safety campaign for the farm by spreading the word through publications and educational sources. The farmer is a vital factor in war. Worn out machinery, fatigue of farm workers, tired from long hours during those heavy rush seasons of farm work, the hurry to try to make up for shortages, all are dangers to the farmer. Since the war, factories have found that safety campaigns have been needed to stress the importance to the workers of safety measures. If this was needed in industry, then it is needed for the farmer, his family, his workers, for they will be doing not only themselves a kindness but their country as well, in recognizing the sense in a farm safety program.
