Anyhow, in using it, precaution must be taken to safeguard others from its killing effect. Dogs, cattle, birds have been killed by it, when used improperly. DDT comes in four forms and its application in each should be studied by Burkburnett farmers and homemakers. The fact that it destroys necessary insects may make DDT unpopular, but when it comes to killing flies and mosquitoes, the purpose for which most of us here buy it, then we are grateful for its power. But follow the directions in every instance.

### DEEP FREEZE

No matter how isolated one hears deep freeze discussed.. Growing in popularity frozen foods are here to stay. Nature provided us with the original plan of freezing to preserve and men in science have made it a real industry. There are many districts where it is possible to rent frozen food lockers. There are deep freeze units for homes, stores maintain their own and sell food frozen from them. Possibilities for the future are enormous. In the far north where freezing comes early and stays late, baking bread, pies, doughnuts, cakes in quantities and freezing them through the winter, to thaw and reheat later has been done for a long time. This process does not impair the taste. MAKING THE HOME CHRISTIAN

LESSON TEXT-Luke 10:38-42; I Corinthians 13:4-13.
GOLDEN TEXT-Love suffereth long. and is kind.-I Corinthians 13:4.

Things do not just happen. It takes praying and planning and real effort to accomplish a worth-while purpose. We are thinking these weeks of the home as a Christian center of influence. We trust that many are asking in their hearts, "What can I do to make my home really Christian?"

The answer is clear. A home will be Christian when those in it are Christian and put their Christianity into daily practice. First, you must he sure of your own salvation and that of the members of your household. Then you can proceed to put the principles of godliness to work. Our lesson presents the believing home as one that is well-balanced.

I. Work and Worship (Luke 10:

No home can be a place of comfort and pleasant fellowship without much work. A disorderly, dirty or run-down house is a disgrace and a discouragement to all that is finest in the relations of those who live in

Home need not be a mansion. It does not have to be richly furnished. but it does need to be clean and orderly. Meals must be made. Cleaning must be done. So far Martha was right, but she went too far. She let the labor of the household hinder her from what she so deeply needed - fellowship, not only with her family but with the Lord.

Now, notice that Mary had not shirked her duty to share the work. Observe the word "also" in verse 39. She had worked, but she also sat at Jesus' feet. She knew when it was time to call a halt to labor and make the most of good comradeship. Blessed wisdom! Would that many burdened housewives would learn of

Jesus made it clear that life in the home is to strike a proper balance between work and worship. If you do not know where to make the division in your home, err on the side of worship. Give that more time than it should have rather

Alas, is it not true that in most homes, even in Christian homes, worship is almost, if not entirely. forgotten! Something should be done about that. Will you do it in your

II. Love and Longsuffering (I Cor. 13:4-7).

We are apt to think of love as the warm feeling of interest and emotion which suffuses one's nature in moments of special pleasantness or of intimate fellowship. But life is not made up of a succession of pleasant incidents, of sunny afternoons and moonlit evenings.

Life is real; it is earnest, and often it is drab and irritating. What about such times? Can love meet them? Yes, for love knows how to

ba longsuffering. But someone may ask, Does love really work, or is this just a finesounding but obsclete theory? It

Think of the things in life which irritate and depress us. Then put opposite them the qualities of Christian love as given in verses 4 to 7, and you will agree that what this

world needs most of all is love. Remember that talking about love, or reading about it, or studying it in the Sunday school will not make it effective. We must put it into practice. Why not start now? You will be surprised at the results.

III. Promise and Perfection (vv.

Christianity has a hope, and that is not just a vague wishing that something might come to pass; it is a sure hope. In Christ all the rich promise of prophecy, of faith, of hope will come to pass.

The Christian home is the place to teach boys and girls to believe with assurance that He who has begun a good work in us "will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Phil.

We who see only dimly shall one day see our Lord face to face, and love shall abide through all eternity. Many gifts are only temporary in their usefulness; in fact, almost everything that man makes or does (apart from his service for God) is transient.

Even as vital a matter as prophecy shall one day find its end in fulfillment. Hope shall eventually find its longing expectation satisfied. Faith will be justified in seeing what it has believed. Childish things will be put away by the fullgrown man; knowledge will increase

and darkness disappear. But love - love is eternal. It never fails, and will never fail. God is love, and God is eternal. From all eternity and unto all eternity love continues. Therefore, we agree with Paul who, in the verse preceding this chapter (I Cor. 12:31) says that while you may covet the best gift, here is the more excellent way





The main answer to football success is your playing strength-the forward wall and the backfieldyour man power. And don't ever let anyone tell you a different story. Football coaches have done great jobs. Their general average is the highest in sport. But the best still need good football players to have winning teams.

After all, they can't rush out on the field and do their own passing, running, blocking and tackling.

### Sports Fans' Squawks

Sports fans who move up into the 50 or 60-million class, ranging from ages between 10 and 80 years, are certainly entitled to their beliefs, their squawks, their praise and their

For, after all, they are the big part of sport, the major part by at least 90 per cent. They pay all the exses, all the salaries. They make both amateur and pro sports possible. And in too many cases they only get shoddy treatment and take the big shove around by both amateur and professional promoters.

They are taken for granted. They are rarely given any consideration from baseball, football, racing, boxing, golf or other sporting directors.

They are usually the goats, who have grown accustomed to taking the worst of it. Their hardihood and their capacity for punishment is the most amazing feature of sport.

They are too often packed in after the manner of human sardines at race tracks and other sporting centers. They are too often overcharged.

It has been said there is no law that forces them to take this beating. This is true. But they happen to love their games, whether it is boxing, baseball, football, racing, golf or something else.

They are astonished at little courtesies they are so seldom shown anywhere or any time by the hired people who live off their main outlet for recreation and entertainment.

They are really an amazing breed. They take it on the chin and on the shin, back of each ear, in the stomach and also in the pocketbook.

### Courses Too Tough

Take golf, for example. It has always been my belief that any golf course should be trapped only for the star player. Put all trouble out beyond the 200 yard mark which the average player can't reach.

The duffer or average player has enough trouble trying to hit the ball or get his bogeys. Why should he pay uncounted millions to make his golfing life more miserable? We have built too many golf

courses against the skill of the pros and the crack amateurs who, after all, give most of their life to golf -and who pay nothing in return.

Who cares whether a pro shoots a 63 or a 58? Why build courses to keep him from breaking par on courses which the average golfer can't handle in a 95? The Nelsons and the other par-

them go around in even 3's. Who cares? But why keep punishing the 98 per cent who pay all the ffeight? Golf is our greatest playing game for everyone. It is a friendly and a companionable game, demanding its share of psychology, philosophy, sportsmanship and nerve control-

With the Oil Workers' union demand for a 30 per cent wage increase embodying the program of other powerful CIO organizations, and with the oil companies' offer of a 15 per cent boost representing the usual compromise, final disposition of the case would go far toward determining the amount of "take-home" pay for employees during the ensuing months.

Schwellenbach's decision to shift the parley to Washington, D. C., from Chicago, Ill., followed upon an early deadlock in the bargaining over the union's insistence that the dispute be settled on an industrywide basis and the companies' stand that contracts should be signed by individual plants,

Meanwhile, over 1,500,000 persons were affected by the strike of AFL elevator operators and building service employees in New York, with business losses running over \$1,000,000 a day and production of winter and summer garments virtually stopped. Balking at a war labor board award of \$28.05 for a 44 hour week, the union asked \$30.15 for a 40 hour week.

Japanese press, radio, movies, government information bureaus, schools and various social groups would be used as mediums for the dissemination of democratic principles and ideals for world co-operation.

In Japan's economic reformation, the U. S. will strive for the eradication of all potential war industry, confining the Nipponese merely to civilian production. At the same time, efforts will be made to break up the business monopoly of the four great houses of Mitsibushi, Mitsui, Yusada and Sumitomo, and promote widespread ownership and trade. Organization of labor and agricultural organizations also will be encouraged.

Meanwhile, Japanese economic trade with the U.S. to speed Nippon's postwar recovery and stave off impending privation. In return for American cotton, wool, salt, oil, iron, sugar and leather the Japanese proposed exports of silk, gold, porcelain ware and lacquer goods.

## JOBLESS BENEFITS:

Shelve Bill

Declaring that the current wave of strikes has confused the question of whether a real need exists for the lengthening of unemployment compensation payments up to 26 weeks, the powerful house ways and means committee held up a senate bill providing federal aid for extension of benefits.

By its action, the house group dealt a body blow to President Truman's program for jobless aid, since the senate in passing a modified bill previously had refused to boost unemployment compensation up to a maximum of \$25 weekly. The senate measure would have permitted the federal government to advance sufficient sums to the states to spread jobless payments over 26 weeks.

House committee rejection of the experts called for a resumption of | bill stirred labor's wrath, AFL Pres. William Green accusing the congressmen of "callous disregard of human needs." and CIO Chieftain Philip Murray calling upon the C10 and its Political Action committee for an all-out drive to "secure reversal of this shameful act."

### ARMY SEEKS MISSING

Army "search teams" are combing the battlefields of Europe and the Pacific for personnel now listed as missing.

Consisting of five soldiers, one of whom speaks the language of the locality, search teams are assigned a certain area of approximately one and one-half square miles. Information on missing personnel is consolidated to speed investigation.

### U. S.-British Pact

OIL:

Virtual monopolists in oil, the U. S. and Britain came to an understanding for the orderly development of petroleum trade in the postwar world in a pact fashioned in London by Secretary of the Interior Ickes and British officials and subject to senate ratification.

Removing vigorous opposition to any control over domestic production as envisaged in a previous agreement later repudiated by the U. S., the new pact only provides for advisory regulation of American and British operations overseas. Both countries have extensive oil holdings in foreign lands, notably in the middle east, where deposits are reportedly as great as in the U. S. In drawing up the agreement,

Ickes and British Fuel Administrator Shinwell provided for mutual respect of all concessions and rights obtained by either country, and also pledged non-interference with oper-

### MEAT: More Available

Because of the seasonal increase in the marketing of range fed cattle. OPA removed point requirements for lower grades of beef, veal and lamb through most of October, and also made hamburger, lamb and veal patties, short ribs and brisket of beef, breast and flank of lamb and shank of veal ration-free.

In addition, points were lifted from such low-grade meat products as sausage, frankfurters, luncheon variety and canned meats.

In contrast, however, the continued tight supply of hogs and finished cattle necessitated the retention of current point values on pork cuts, bacon and other cured meats, and choice selections of beef, veal and lamb. Though fats and oils were kept on the rationing list, point removal on cheaper meat will furnish additional stamps for these

### Henry II Takes Over

To husky, 28-year-old Henry Ford 11, who in college displayed more of a penchant for sociology than engineer-ing, went the presidency of the huge Ford Motor company, following the retirement of his famed grandfather from active service with the firm.

Upon assuming his post, Henry the Il declared his ambition was to return Ford to leadership in sales again, the company having trailed Chevrolet throughout most of the decade preced-ing the war. On his toes, young Ford had shown the new 1946 model last July, only two days after government authorization for resuming civilian produc-tion, and the firm was well off to postwar output when impeded by strikes.

Retiring at 82 after having resumed the presidency of his famed company in June of 1943 upon the death of his son, Edsel, Ford declared that he would devote most of his energies to his outside interests, chief of which have been utilization of farm products in industry,

### EUROPE:

Occupation Problem

In war or in peace, old General pending constitutional guarantees of Patton, with a mind of his own conocasion being his clash with General Eisenhower over the use of competent former Nazi civil servants for a restoration of German economy to head off threatened chaos this winter.

Besides being asked for an immediate report on the number of former Nazis still holding office in 3rd army territory, Patton also was directed to give Eisenhower a personal accounting of his control over the Bavarian region. For a hard peace, Eisenhower favors a ruthless denazification of Germany's political, educational and economic life, and an early establishment of a Reich living standard no higher than surrounding countries'.

Though the first to be called on the carpet, Patton's attitude is known to be shared by other U. S. officers seeking to avert starvation, frost suffering and epidemics this winter in the shattered nation

Infestation with parasites holds back growth and increases feed costs. Serious losses from parasites can be prevented by providing clean pasture, by the use of phenothiazine, and by taking other precautions

Egg Eating Egg eating by chickens is a habit usually developed by young pullets. This costly habit can be prevented by providing plenty of nests-one nest for each six birds-so eggs will not be broken by nest crowding

at laying time. All nest bottoms can be kept well padded with litter such as hay, straw, cottonseed, shavings, so eggs will not be broken as they are laid. If the egg-eating habit has gone so far that some of the birds break the eggs themselves, it may be necessary to remove those birds from the flock for a few days or dispose of them entirely.

Heating Safety

One of the most notable innovations in safe heating is the wet base boiler in which water circulates under the ash pit. The fact that the boiler can be placed on a combustible floor is of interest in connection with the trend toward the basementless house. Other safety features of modern boilers are foot-treadle door openers, ball-shaped, air-cooled handles and side shakers, making it easier to open and close door's.

Vac- Burleson. cination to prevent fowl pox should be done during the early summer, but oftentimes this is neglected and fowl pox breaks out among the laying birds in fall or winter, causing loss in egg production and sometimes high mortality. This is often very costly but a temporary solution is found in vaccinating with pigeon pox vaccine which supplies an immunity for several weeks and will not cause great loss in egg production.

What to do for Fall Outbreaks If an outbreak of fowl pox apbears in your laying flock, vaccinate at once with Pigeon Pox Vaccine which supplies an immunity of short duration. If permanent immunity is desired, revaccinate in 30 days with regular Fowl Pox Vaccine will establish immunity without a serious reaction and without unduly affecting egg production. Plan to vaccinate for fowl pox next year, before birds reach mature laying stage.

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
