Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

WORMS A COSTLY COMMON PROBLEM

Worms constitute one of the greatest obstacles in the path of poultry profits. Every year worms cost U. S. poultry raisers millions of dollars by causing decreased egg production, by lowering birds' resistance to infectious diseases, and by creating cull chickens which are unfit for market.

Slow Starvation

In effect, worms cause slow starvation. Great numbers of them in a bird's intestinal tract make it impossible for the fowl's body to assimilate food as it should. In severe cases, worminess may cause mortality. Usually, however, the effects show up in such symptoms as stunted growth, falling egg production, etc.

Most poultry flocks have worms. Usually, of course, the flock may

be only lightly infected and may appear to suffer no ill effects whatever. But although there may be no visible evidence of worminess at first, the birds may develop symptoms later on as the worms multiply. This happens most frequently among flocks which are being raised in insanitary surroundings.

Sanitation

A sanitary range or poultry house is good protection against intestinal worms. Regular cleaning keeps the premises relatively free of the material in which worm eggs are deposited. Thus, there is less chance that the parasites will spread through the entire flock.

Commercial worm removers, both the capsules used for individual treatment and the powders which are mixed in the feed also give effective results. Practically all wormers are effective in removing large roundworms which are acknowledged to be the commonest and most widespread of all the intestinal parasites.

Irreconcilable
Russia today is firmly opposed to almost everything and anything that America suggests. There is one possible exception, and that is: aid to Russia. Since Russia's cross-purposes with us are so evident, it is natural to ask why she got that way. Why does she find it convenient, ever to go out of her way, to oppose America?

It is not because we did not help Russia enough during the war. Matter of fact, we helped Russia then to the extent of \$11,681,000,000. This was lend-lease, of which we will expect to get little or nothing in return. What we got from Russia in reverse lend-lease, compared with the more than \$11½ billions that went her way, was little more than 1-500 of one billion — only \$2,213,000.

Disguised Purposes
Then, when UNRRRA decided to accumulate a big fund to help needy nations, America gave 70 per cent of the total. Our part was \$2,279,000,000. The Russians did not put up anything. Yet Russia has helped to manage UNRRRA. Actually, Russia has so manipulated the aid to several European countries that the people there thought they were being helped by Russia, rather than by America.

Now, the Marshall plan calls for additional help for European countries. It proposes that America use from \$15 to \$22 billions in an effort to get those countries on a self-sustaining basis. Not only does Russia oppose this aid, but she has inspired the creation of the Communist International. This organization operates in nine different countries and is dedicated to complete opposition to anything that resembles American policy in international affairs.

Good Neighbors?
Just why this continued opposition from Russia? In my opinion, it comes definitely from the fact that Communism is irreconcilable to the American way of life. If it be observed that Communism did not offer opposition during the war, it may also be observed that Communist leaders temporarily went underground while America was helping Russia stave off disaster.

As soon as the war was over, as soon as lend-lease quit flowing to Russia, the Communists began to oppose every move for peaceful stabilization. They wanted defeated countries to remain defeated. Peaceful and prosperous countries find Communism unattractive, indeed. But Russia has now solidified her opposition to peace. Russia offers long-range opposition to America's desire for peace, through her International.

This is the answer: Communism is antagonistic to almost every basic principle in the American way of life. It is opposed to religion, to the sacredness of marriage, to private ownership of property, to freedom of the individual, to freedom of the press and of speech. The Russians deny that we can be their neighbors. They fear a demonstration of the superiority of the American way — a brand of democracy that does not need to call up an International to protect itself.

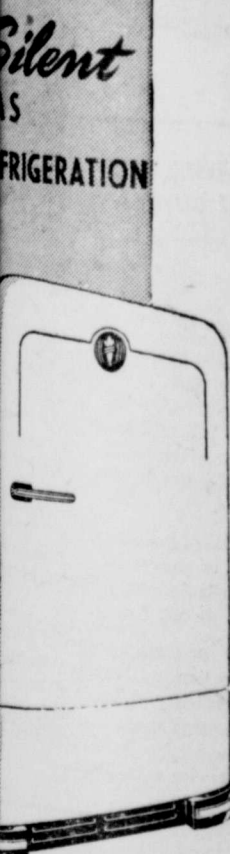

Home-Canned Green Beans for Nutritious Meals

Green beans are a low-acid vegetable and should be canned with the use of a pressure cooker because the high temperature is better insurance against spoilage and is also the faster method. Select beans with crisp and meaty pods. They should be young and tender and brought fresh from the garden or truck patch. Wash, string, and break or cut

the pods into two-inch pieces. Boil five minutes and pack into hot Ball jars. Add one teaspoon salt to each quart. Cover with water in which cooked. Process small young pods 35 minutes and large ones 55 minutes at 10 pounds pressure. With a plentiful supply of home-canned green beans you are always prepared to serve a popular, nutritious green vegetable.

If you are a tradesman, or a skilled or unskilled laborer who works with his hands—if you call yourself a "worker"—you must indeed be thankful that you live in America. Not that you should be any more or less thankful, being a doctor, lawyer, teacher, or whatever you are. But somebody has called this nation a "workers' Republic," and I consider that phrase a good way to describe what we enjoy in this land of plenty.

Indeed there is no other country, whether socialized, partly socialized, or even communistic, that has given its workers more. A capitalist America has enabled even "common" laborers to live like kings were accustomed to live not many years ago. We produce and enjoy the fruits of production. We must never forget that this has come about because the American way of life makes it possible.

Glorious Future
Do you know of a better and happier workers' nation? Have the "isms" and ideologies of the experimenters produced anything better? Certainly they have not. No worker in the world comes anywhere close to drawing the pay or enjoying the comforts of the average person right here in America. There is hardly a nation today that is not begging us to send them goods, or to bolster up their lagging economy in some way.

Possibly there are short-comings in the American method. But judging from the achievements of the past, and viewing the possibilities ahead—I can think of nothing more foolish than to discard any part of our American way. We can have a future fully as glorious as our past. We have new worlds of atomic energy, jet propulsion, and electronics to explore. I can think of no other economic system, besides the kind we have in America, as being equal to the opportunities ahead.

Your Own Way
We have immediate needs, too. Our people could use perhaps five million new and improved homes in which to live. Millions of farm homes need electricity and running water. We need more automobiles, and our capacity for them seems never to diminish. More cars mean more roads. One advancement calls for many more. Friend, let me say that I know of no system that will bring these things to us—except that American way of initiative and enterprise.

In this workers' America, there are other things of great importance. As a worker, you are not told what you may do, or how to do it. You are not the mere chattel of some state bureau. You can choose your job and your career, and so can your son. You can make your own decisions. Whether you work for an employer, or decide to work for yourself, you have a right to serve the world your own way. These things are important to you, and you are important to your nation.

No other land can show the progress America has made. Nowhere else is there such a high standard of living—that applies to everybody. Progress has flourished here as nowhere else. Why? We have been free to exercise ingenuity, incentive, competition, and thrift. We have been free to invest savings in more and better tools. We have not been subject to tyranny or despotism from government. What political dictatorship can match this achievement?

Cutting Corners On Roofs Expensive Way to Cut Costs

A roof is the symbol of protection, security and comfort. It must be good looking, and yet stand up under relentless attacks by the weather.

Home building experts agree that the roof is no place to skimp in building or remodeling costs. If a home is worth preserving, it is worth a roof made of tested and proven materials, but even the finest of material will not give satisfactory service unless it is properly applied.

The best guarantee of a good roof is a good workman who strictly follows the manufacturer's instruction sheets. The wise home builder or owner familiarizes himself with the various kinds and grades of roofing materials before making a selection, and studies the manufacturer's instructions so he will know something about the correct way to apply the material.

Two common causes of premature roof failures are applying the shingles over a poorly constructed roof deck and skimping use of nails. Asphalt roofing manufacturers, for example, generally specify the use of six nails in asphalt strip shingles. If only four nails are used, as is too frequently the practice, high winds are apt to damage the roof, and leaks may develop in a few years, even though the shingles themselves are in good condition.

When remodeling, it often is advisable to lay the new roof over the old. This reduces the cost of application, eliminates mess and dirt, and adds insulating value.

While protecting the house from the onslaughts of the weather, a roof also should protect the dwelling from fire. Until recently, flammable roofs ranked third among the principal causes of residential fires, according to the National Fire Protection Association. In the last five years, however, enforcement of building codes prohibiting use of flammable roofing, together with the increasing use of fire-resistant roofing, particularly asphalt shingles, has cut the number of fires originating in flammable roofing more than 50 percent.

Rain water and melting snow on roofs must be carried to sewers or "dry wells" to keep the water from seeping through foundations into basements. But unless gutters and downspouts are kept clean, water may back up and work its way up under the shingles to the roof deck beneath. Once inside the roof, water cracks plaster, stains wall paper, and blisters paint. While gutters and downspouts must be attached to the building, they should be held away from it to prevent water from staining the walls.

How Many Chicken Feathers?

While no one has ever settled the question of which came first "the chicken or the egg", it is now possible to report the number of feathers on a chicken.

Guesses in a grade school ranged from 10,000 to 100,000. To settle the debate, one of the youngsters brought an average size chicken to the school for plucking. An accurate count was made, and it was found that 8,537 feathers were picked to completely "undress" the bird.

Prepare Now For Winter Blasts

Autumn nights serve notice that winter's penetrating cold will soon be here. If shivers chased up and down the spine last winter, it will pay to check now to be sure there are no cracks around windows and doors.

Builders point out that cracks inevitably occur as a house ages and settles, and as wood framing shrinks. Cracks invite cold winds to sit at the hearthside, and allow drifting rain and sifting snow to get inside the walls where the moisture attacks the plaster and rots the lumber.

Don't wait until cold-weather is here to tackle the job. When



the air is dry and warm, shrinkage is greatest. All that's needed is some caulking compound to fill the cracks, and either a pressure gun or a putty knife.

Rent or borrow a gun, if possible, builders advise, as it makes an easier, quicker and much more satisfactory job. The gun exerts uniform pressure and thoroughly imbeds the caulking into the cracks. But a putty knife will do the job if a heavier grade of caulking compound, called "putty grade," is used. Forcing the compound into the cracks with a knife is slower work, but equally effective.

An alternative is a new type of caulking made up in the form of slender ropes about 3/4 inch in diameter. It may be applied without a gun or a knife.

Butter As Medicine

Those who lived 2,000 years ago might not have objected to today's price for butter. In those days, butter was a major item carried in stock by all apothecaries for soothing the skin, relieving burns, and for healing sore eyes, in addition to serving as food.

JUST ROUTINE TACTICS
The "good" Communist is sworn to lie. (Unfortunately, all the liars are not in Russia, nor even in the Communist Party in this country. Life would be much more simple if they were.) However, among our so-called liberals, and even the fellow-travelers, there are those who are waking up to the fact that disdain for plain old honesty and integrity is one of the chief characteristics of Communism. I know only one answer to the problem of the lie, and that is: truth.

If there were only one Communist in the world, folks with truth in their lives could isolate him easily enough. But when you admit the tactics of lying into international relationships, things begin to get complicated. It is indeed a real problem to deal with nations which lack moral integrity, and my sympathies go out to our statesmen who have to meet the Communists on international issues.

Nothing On Merit
To illustrate. Shortly after President Truman's message to Congress on European recovery, the Moscow radio announced: "The essence of the Marshall Plan is war." Marshall, the radio said, was out chiefly to assist American monopolies. Marshall was called the "intimate friend of Wall Street big wigs." It seems that to represent Secretary of State Marshall as imperialist, monopolist, oppressor, and warmonger is just routine Communist tactics.

Secretary Marshall is not an imperialist, and he is not trying to conduct a program in Europe in the interest of American monopolies, and so on, which fact everyone knows. Even the Russians who were saying those things knew the statements were untrue. Their method of defeating the Marshall Plan at that time was to misrepresent it. They didn't dare criticize it on its merits.

See The Methods
These statements were designed, of course, for the American public. To the American public this particular incident was perhaps of little importance in itself. However, it is useful in demonstrating the tactics used by Communists in America for several decades. These men knew at the start it would not be easy to undermine the American way of life. They realized their best method was to cause dissension and friction among groups in America.

The Communists apparently decided that the easiest way to create this friction would be to set labor and industry against each other. To this end they began picking out American industrialists and calling them profiteers and capitalists, disinterested in the welfare of the worker. They also misrepresented the amount of profits, until many people think industrialists make ten times the profit actually made.

We can see quickly the absurdity of attacks on Secretary Marshall. But perhaps we have been slower to see the lies and misrepresentations used right here in our country against our own people. Our industrialists have worked unceasingly, along with labor, to help raise our standard of living. Only in America do the rank and file enjoy cars, radios, telephones, refrigerators and hundreds of other luxuries. Let's keep our thinking straight, despite Communist tactics.

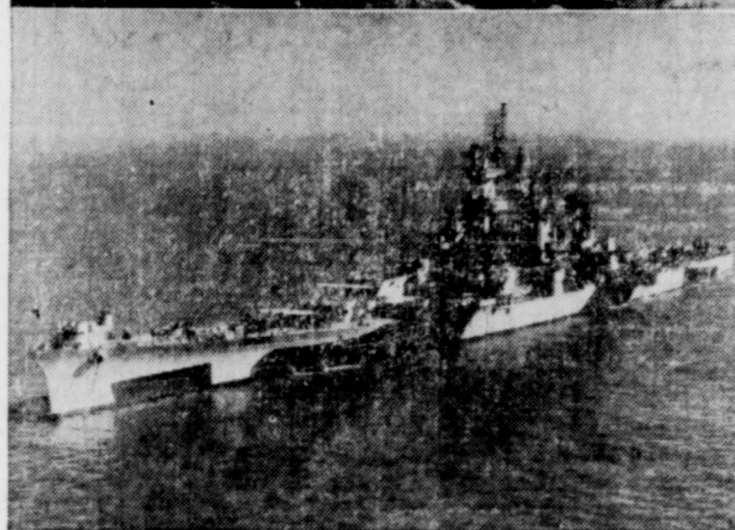
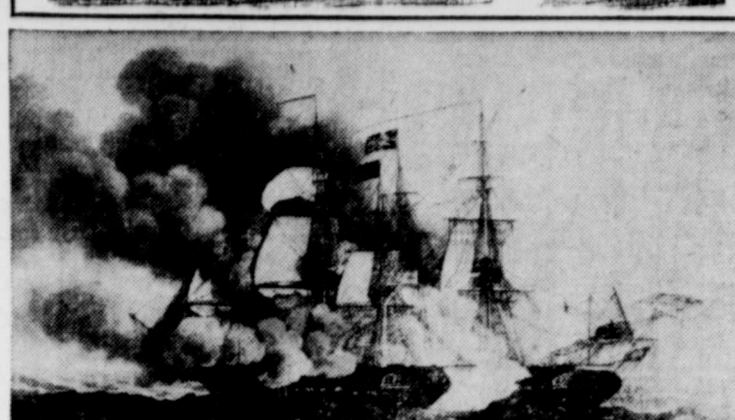
Love Proves Stormy Dramatic 'Tycoon'

Simulated Spring Speeds Up Romance Among Queen Bees

ORANGE, CALIF.—Bees are going to do their romancing early this year in some California hives, thanks to the ingenuity of Leroy Bell, Orange apiarist, who has become a specialist in simulating spring weather.

Seeking to offer his queen bees on the market before nature takes its hand in normally increasing the population, Bell had engineers of Minneapolis-Honeywell Regulator company devise a weather system that stirs the dormant urge in indifferent drones.

The "spring-maker" automatically controls temperature in hives at a balmy 80 to 85 degrees and provides relative humidity of 80 to 65 per cent. To carry the deception further, Bell has artificial illumination that brings dawn earlier and delays "sunset."

He lets California sunshine take care of the daylight hours, when the queens actually mate out of doors, but the simulated springtime of the hives speeds the grafting of larvae from which new queens emerge.

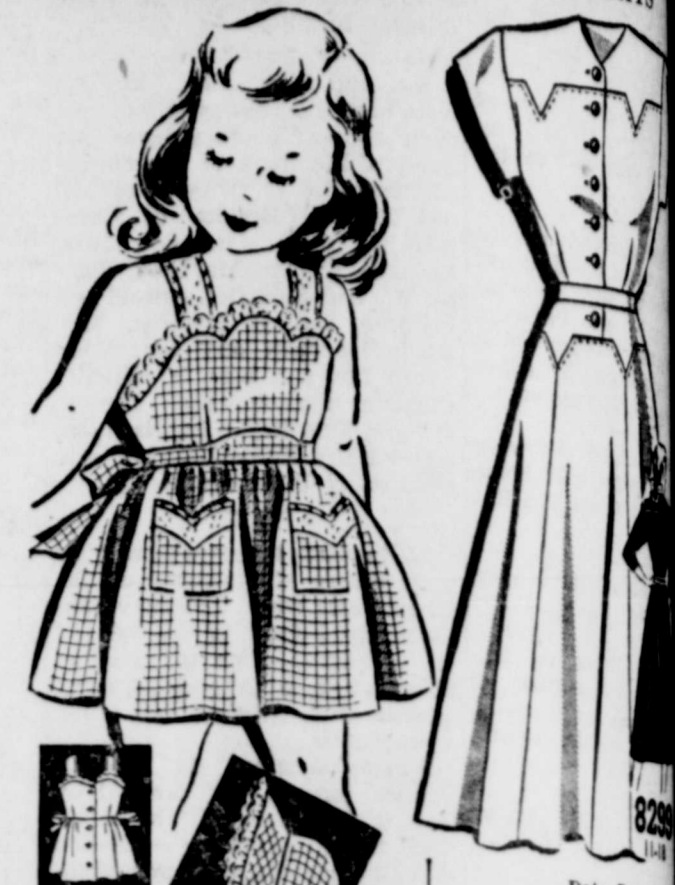

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

QUESTION: When the former tenants moved from here they scored the floors with their furniture. Is there any way I can remove the score marks?
ANSWER: Scraping with an electric floor sanding machine should take out most of the marks. If any slight hollow place remains after sanding, you may be able to make them less noticeable by building them up with several thin coats of a quick-drying varnish.

QUESTION: Please tell me how and what to use to paint the bathroom wallpaper, and how to go about it. The paper sticks well to the wall.
ANSWER: If you do not mind taking a chance on having the paper loosen, apply two coats of enamel undercoater and a final coat of good quality enamel. Do not use flat paint or any kind of calcimine.

QUESTION: What about painting a house with the spraying method?
ANSWER: If well done by a professional the job should be entirely satisfactory provided, of course, he uses top quality paint, the surfaces are warm and dry, and the weather is warm and dry.

Stan Kenton And Band Coming to Wichita May 25



Stan Kenton and his band, who have created such a stir in the music world with their "progressive" jazz, is coming to Wichita Falls Tuesday night, May 25 with some of Kenton's best compositions in his own personal style on the program.

Kenton may be called the only new thing in jazz for many years. Taking his inspiration from Earl "Father" Hines, Kenton played with a piano for years, working out a new style of music to replace the commercialized stuff jazz had become.

He auditioned hundreds of musicians, seeking those who felt as he did and played as he did. By 1941 he was ready. With his own arrangements and his own band, he opened for his first engagement in California and was an immediate sensation.

But talk of war drowned out a lot of the noise the new order in music was making. By the time the GI's heard Kenton and his boys on their numerous camp tours, however, Kenton was the hottest thing in the jazz world.

He still is. Twice voted the outstanding band leader of the year by Downbeat and Billboard magazines, Kenton boasts any number of record breaking sales.

For his June 12 appearance in the Hollywood Bowl, 25,000 tickets have already been sold, record capacity of his career. Any more tickets would be SRO—Standing Room Only.

With his, as featured vocalist, will be June Christy, a young woman who talked him into letting her try out when Anita O'Day left. She's had the job every since, and has been outstanding on platters both with him and by herself.

For Desserts Supreme—Home-Canned Peaches

The homemaker who has home-canned peaches on her shelves need never apologize when she serves dessert, for home-canned peaches served right out of the jar are fit for a king! And, if there is time, peach upside down cake, peaches served on angel food cake wedges and topped with whipped cream, peach ice cream, a whole galaxy of mouth-watering desserts, can be made from this delicious, home-canned fruit.

Sound, firm, tree-ripened peaches are best for canning. Grade them for size, color and condition, then wash and peel. Simply scalding in boiling water one minute and dipping one-half minute in cold water will cause some varieties to skin easily. Paring with a knife is usually the best way to peel peaches. They may then be cut in halves and the stones dis-

carded. If you like, scrape the cavities of freestone fruit to remove the pink or red fibers. As peaches are halved, drop them in a weak solution of vinegar and salt water (one tablespoon salt to a gallon of cold water) to prevent discoloring. Rinse before canning.

Peaches may be canned by the cold pack or hot pack methods, but hot packing and processing in a water bath canner is considered superior. The Ball Blue Book gives the following instructions.

COLD PACK METHOD

Pack peaches into hot Ball Jars, layers overlapping, cavity side down. Cover with boiling sirup made with one or two parts sugar to one of water. Process from 20 to 35 minutes in hot-water bath. Use the longer period for extra large or very firm fruit.

HOT PACK METHODS

1. Make a sirup of one or two parts sugar to one of water. Add peaches, a few at a time, and simmer until hot through (10 to 20 minutes). Pack into hot Ball Jars, layers overlapping, cavity side down. Cover with sirup in which peaches were cooked. Process 10 to 20 minutes in hot-water bath. On leftover sirup for pudding or ice cream sauce.

2. Add from one to 1 1/4 cups sugar and one cup boiling water to one gallon prepared peaches. Cook gently until peaches are hot through and sugar dissolved (10 to 20 minutes). Pack and process as instructed above. If there isn't enough liquid to cover peaches in jar, add boiling water after peaches are packed. Use longest processing period for large, firm fruit.

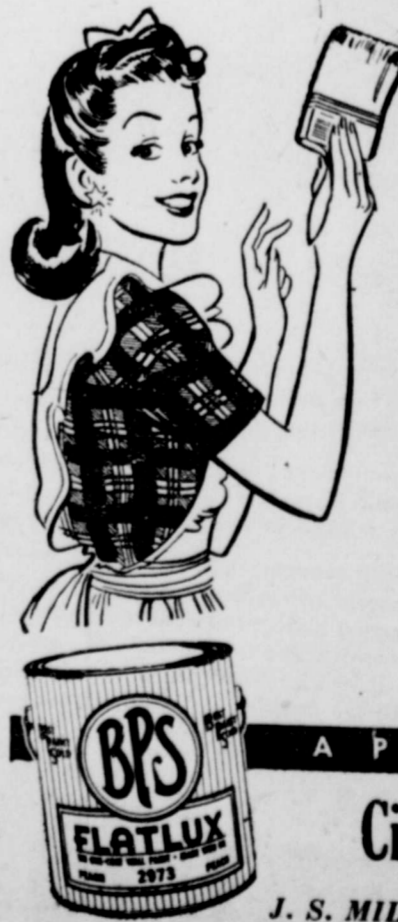
