





Russia today is firmly opposed to almost everything and anything that America suggests. There is one possible exception, and that is: aid to Russia. Since Russia's cross-purposes with us are so evident, it is natural to ask why she got that way. Why does she find it convenient, ever to go out of her way, to oppose America?

It is not because we did not help Russia enough during the war. Matter of fact, we helped Russia then to the extent of \$11,681,000,000. This was lend-lease, of which we will expect to get little or nothing in return. What we got from Russia in reverse lend-lease, compared with the more than \$111/2 billions that went her way, was little more than 1-500 of one billion - only \$2,213,000. **Disguised Purposes**

Then, when UNRRA decided to accumulate a big fund to help needy nations, America gave 70 per cent of the total. Our part was \$2,-279,000,000. The Russians did not put up anything. Yet Russia has helped to manage UNRRA. Actually, Russia has so manipulated the aid to several European countries that the people there thought they were being helped by Russia, rather than by America.

Now, the Marshall plan calls for additional help for European countries. It proposes that America use from \$15 to \$22 billions in an effort to get those countries on a self-sustaining basis. Not only does Russia oppose this aid, but she has inspired the creation of the Communist International. This organization operates in nine different countries and is dedicated to complete opposition to anything that resembles American policy in international affairs. **Good Neighbors?**

Just why this continued opposition from Russia? In my opinion, it comes definitely from the fact that Communism is irreconcilable to the



Q. How much window space should be provided in broiler houses? A. There should be one square foot

of window space to each ten square feet of floor space.

Q. Which is better for the brood sow during gestation - hand-feed-ing or self-feeding?

A. At the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company, hand-feeding is recommended from breeding to farrowing time. Hand-feeding during gestation affords a degree of control seldom attained with selffeeding. This accurate control of condition influences:

1. Ease of farrowing

2. Lactation and nursing the litter.

- 3. Vigor of pigs
- 4. Livability of the litter
- 5. Final returns and profit

Q. Does what is fed to the breeding flock have any effect on the hatchability of eggs?

A. Yes, to give the chicks the proper start in life, it is essential that the breeding flock be fed a ra-tion that contains all of the necessary minerals, vitamins and other essential ingredients. Breeding is im-portant, too, and every precaution should be taken in the selection of the breeders. The breeder ration should be started at least a month before eggs are to be saved for hatch-ing purposes, and the breeding flocks should be watched closely to see that they are in good condition.

Nothing On Merit


To illustrate. Shortly after President Truman's message to Congress on European recovery, the Moscow radio announced: "The essence of the Marshall Plan is war." Marshall, the radio said, was out chiefly to assist American monopolies. Marshall was called the "intimate friend of Wall Street big wigs." It seems that to represent Secretary of State Marshall as imperialist, monopolist, oppressor, and warmonger is just routine Communist tactics.

Secretary Marshall is not an imperialist, and he is not trying to conduct a program in Europe in the interest of American monopolies, and so on, which fact everyone knows. Even the Russians who were saying those things knew the statements were untrue. Their method of defeating the Marshall Plan at that time was to misrepresent it. They didn't dare criticise it on its merits.

See The Methods

These statements were designed, of course, for the American public. To the American public this particular incident was perhaps of little importance in itself. However, it is useful in demonstrating the tactics used by Communists in America for several decades. These men knew at the start it would not be easy to undermine the American way of life. They realized their best method was to cause dissension and friction among

groups in America. The Communists apparently decided that the easiest way to create this friction would be to set labor and industry against each other. To this end they began picking out

canned peaches on her shelves need never apologize when she serves dessert, for home-canned peaches served right out of the jar are fit for a king! And, if there is time, peach upside down cake, peaches served on angel food cake wedges and topped with whipped cream, peach ice cream, a whole galaxy of mouth-watering desserts, can be made from this delicious, home-canned fruit.

Sound, firm, tree-ripened peaches are best for canning. Grade them for size, color and condition, then wash and peel. Simply scalding in boiling water one minute and dipping one-half minute in cold water will cause some varieties to skin easily. Paring with a knife is usually the best way to peel peaches. They may then be cut in halves and the stones dis- | extra large or very firm fruit.

The homemaker who has home-anned peaches on her shelves cavities of freestone fruit to remove the pink or red fibers. As peaches are halved, drop them in a weak solution of vinegar and salt water (one tablespoon salt to a gallon of cold water) to prevent discoloring. Rinse before canning.

Peaches may be canned by the cold pack or hot pack methods, but hot packing and processing in a water bath canner is considered superior. The Ball Blue Book gives the following instructions.

COLD PACK METHOD





An Echo Testifies

President Truman recently suggested that price controls might have to be used to meet the present emergency. Here is a bit of history. It is an echo from government managed economy that keeps on testifying to the ill effects of government managed economy. During the war the government kept prices of crude oil at an abnormal low. This column called attention to that fact then, indicating there would be a future shortage of oil.

Wild-cat operators and small companies find most of the new pools and sell much of the crude oil. But prices during the war kept wildcatters from buying adequate equipment. It didn't pay. Machinery and wages kept going up, but the price of oil was held low. Instead of buying new rigs for new wells, oil men removed old rigs from low producing wells that would have been kept in production if the price of oil had been favorable.

How to Stall Industry There was less searching for new fields, because oil prices were so out of line with cost of labor and machinery. The risk was too often a losing proposition. This unwise control continued so long that a grave shortage developed in oil field equipment, in oil well pipe lines, and even in refineries. Now we are reaping the harvest. Many will go cold this winter. Gasoline may be short in some areas, and industrial fuel scarce.

One big operator said to me during that period: "To help win a war I am operating present equipment at full capacity. But I am making only about 1/4 of 1 per cent profit on my investment. Consequently, I am not spending new money for expansion of my business. A man can't risk his capital when there is only a chance of 1/4 of 1 per cent profit even if the venture proves entirely successful, and 100 per cent loss if it fails, as many of them do in the oil business."
