Since last Monday night more

estimated at around 15 bushels per acre before harvest time, was much too low according to reports of farmers who got into their fields. All that has been harvested thus far averages better than 26 bushels per acre.

There is no scarcity of combines or trucks to take care of local needs. Many out-of-state outfits are here to assist local machines.

According to farmers the rain did no damage to wheat. The rain was slow and without wind which might have damaged dead ripe grain.


