SUMMER IS HERE

Summer has arrived, officially. The year's longest day, June 21, has brought the high noon of the Northern Hemisphere. Nights shorter, days longer, the weeks that are ahead offer much. We waited and wished all winter for just such weather.

School is over, children go to camps, get vacation jobs or idle away the long lazy hours. Farmers are busy plowing under wheat and other grain stubble. Corn is growing fast, promising roasting ears very soon.

Soon June slips into July with little change in verdure, assuming the function of a busier growth month, and losing none of her freshness, adding to her shrubbery. The birds call a challenge to the flying insects and hover by the eaves of the barn, meet on the garden fence, dart over the fields. Their calls are less noisy than their spring chirrups, perhaps realizing more than we do that the sun is now on its downward dip to the fall and winter seasons. Chick Chats

Few Aware of Worm Problem

Intestinal worms are a major problem in the poultry industry. There is hardly a flock in this community that is untouched by the worm problem. And yet the vast size of the worm menace is not well recognized by many poultrymen.

Symptoms Vary

It isn't easy to tell at a glance which birds of your flock are wormy. The outward signs of worm infection vary considerably. Birds with light infections may appear to be perfectly healthy; actually a fowl is little harmed by a few worms. However, if the worms are allowed to multiply, the host bird will soon show wormy symptoms. Common among these are stunted growth, emaciation, poor appetites, and ruffled feathers.

The commonest, most frequently seen worm in chickens is the large round worms. This worm is common to every region where chickens are raised. The large round worm reproduces amazingly—one female may lay 50 million eggs during her lifetime. The eggs are laid in the intestines of the host chicken.

They pass out in the droppings and under favorable conditions they may become infectious in 10 to 16 days.

If a chicken picks up the infectious egg, the young worm within the shell hatches in the intestinal tract and begins development in the lining or wall of the intestine.

Other Worms

Among other kinds of worms that are frequently found in poultry are several species of tapeworms: They range in size from those so tiny they can hardly be seen to the big fellow, 8 to 10 inches long.

The cecal worm is another intestinal worm which is of great economic importance. It is the carrier of the organism that causes blackhead in turkeys.

Burk Burnett Independent School District.

Pursuant to an order passed by the Board of Trustees of Burk Burnett Independent School District* on the 14th day of June, A. D. 1948, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held at City Hall, in Burk Burnett Independent School District*, on the 7th day of July, A. D. 1948, to determine whether the Board of Trustees of said district shall have power to levy and collect an ad valorem tax on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property in said district, for the maintenance of the public free schools in said Burk Burnett Independent School District* of and at the rate of One Dollar and fifty-cents (\$1.50) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property in said district, such tax, if voted, to be levied and collected for the year 1948, and annually thereafter unless it be discontinued as provided by law.

J. V. Brookshear has been appointed manager of said election and he shall select a judge and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, or more judges and clerks, if deemed necessary, which shall be held as nearly as may be possible in conformity with the general election laws of the State.

No person shall vote at said election except resident qualified property taxing voters who own taxable property in said district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation.

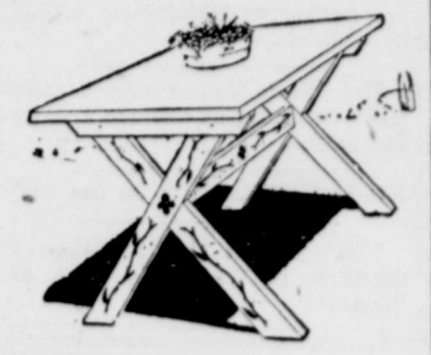

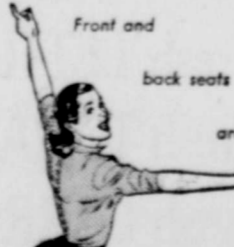

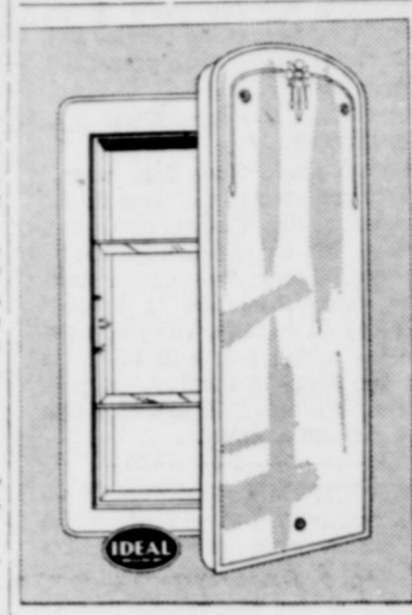
