Burk Will Get Paving IF - - -

Wednesday night Mayor Ralph Brookshier, Commissioners H. D. Smith, Harold Van Loh, Alvin Hill, Harry Dodson, and City Manager P. A. Wiggins met at the City Hall to discuss possibilities of getting South Avenue D and East Third Street paved with concrete and curbed.

That these rough streets should be curbed and then paved from curb to curb, has been an accepted fact for some time. The absolute necessity for this work became evident when the paving project on the Oklahoma Cut-off was approved.

The meeting Wednesday night brought out these facts: Curbing materials will cost about \$1.00 per foot, with some 14,000 feet to be curbed. Property owners along these streets will be asked to furnish money for the materials. With a nice four-lane street, paved curb to curb, property owners can well afford to pay for the curbing in front of their homes and businesses. The city will see that the curbing is put in place when the money is available. The State Highway Department will do the surveying for the project, and do the street paving—ONLY IF THE CURBING IS PUT IN. If the curbs are not put in, then the Highway Department WILL NOT do the street paving.

The City of Burkburnett can not hope to ever get a better proposition. If we want the streets paved, then we must get busy and get the curbing completed. Cost of street paving will run somewhere in the neighborhood of perhaps \$50,000. The City would likely never be able to stand that expense. The only way to get the paving is to start NOW on the curbing. The Highway Department will do the rest. This project deserves the active support of every citizen in Burkburnett.

T-bone steak is more expensive than hamburger, and too many want the steak.

In order to raise a steer that yields choice cuts, the farmer spends years, often three, fattening it. At the price of feed, those years cost the farmer a pretty penny. The meat packer loses in the slaughtering as much as 40 per cent of the initial investment. The dressed carcass becomes more valuable. The butcher gets the meat, which in weight includes fat and bones that won't sell well. The lower priced cuts go into hamburger and he takes a loss on this in many instances. The prime cuts then come high. Heart, kidneys and liver are lots cheaper, but they aren't favored by the buyer. We want steak. Then we will have to pay for it.

Rear Engine Tractor On Display Here

A new type of farm tractor that may prove to be the final threat to horses on the farm is now on display at Thaxton Bros., local Allis-Chalmers dealer. Sam Lax predicts it will replace that least team of horses on many farms by serving as a chore tractor, and that it will fill complete power needs on many other farms.

The new Allis-Chalmers model differs from previous tractor design in that it has a rear-mounted engine with implements attached in front within unobstructed view of the operator. Moving the engine to the rear keeps the front of the tractor clear for mounted implements, any of which can be attached or detached in five minutes. Even the plow is front-mounted.

Mr. Sam Lax, manager, points out that many farms keep one last team of horses for a few seasonal jobs, such as corn planting or hauling. Although such tasks are few and far between, the horses "eat their heads off" all year long, and at present feed prices . . . "that ain't hay." The new tractor, he says, will do such work on 2 to 3 quarts of fuel an hour—and eats only when it works. The owner just presses the starter button, with no currying, harnessing or hitching up.

One feature of special interest for close work such as cultivating vegetables, plowing out the corners or chore jobs is a special 3-4 mile per hour low gear. The four speeds for-

ward range up to 6.9 miles per hour.

Wheel treads can be adjusted to fit any row spacing.

The tractor serves as a portable power unit on "belt-operated" machines like water pumps, elevators, feed grinders and feed mixers.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

When the stove begins to look dull, but still doesn't quite need new polish, you can brighten it up by rubbing it occasionally with waxed paper.

Before you attempt to peel a raw tomato, massage it lightly with the dull edge of a knife. The peel will come loose much more easily.

Scissors are not considered a kitchen utensil, but are handy to keep in the kitchen to cut up lettuce and celery, trim fat from meat, and dice fruits and other vegetables.

When stewed fruit begins to turn sour, reclaim it by adding a pinch of baking soda and boiling the fruit over again for a few minutes.

Soot can be prevented from coming through a window screen by covering the outside of the screen with cheesecloth. It'll catch the soot and can be removed for easy washing whenever necessary.

To prolong the life of a broom, dip it in hot soapy water or hot salt water about once a week; and always hang the broom up or stand it on its handle but never on its head.

If you use rubber gloves when you scrub floors, put little strips of adhesive tape inside the fingers as protection against nails in the floor. Tiny holes in rubber gloves can often be mended with nail polish.

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

QUESTION: The linoleum in our kitchen has risen up in a certain spot. It is inlaid linoleum over a felt base over plywood. Do you think if we bored a small hole in the linoleum and poured some kind of cement in, it would hold? What kind of cement would you recommend for this job?

ANSWER: Try this method for flattening the bulge: Cut a slit in the bulge, following a line of the pattern so that it will not show. Then press linoleum cement under each side of the slit, working it well underneath with a spatula, or some similar tool. Wipe off surface smears promptly. If you cannot get linoleum cement, use roofing cement. Smears of roofing cement should be promptly wiped off with turpentine. Then place weights on top until the cement has dried hard.

QUESTION: My walls are covered with a very poor quality of wallboard, which bulges here and there. It is covered with paper; but now shows a few cracks, which developed after the furnace was started. What is the best thing to do with the walls? The expense is an item; I'll have to have someone do all the work.

ANSWER: For a good job it would be better to take off the board and replace it with one of better quality, properly put up according to the manufacturer's instructions; or else nail up new boards over the old ones. In the meantime, you might consider nailing down the bulges as well as you can, and then covering the joints with strips of decorative wood moulding, such as half-round.

QUESTION: The walls of our new home are all pastel-colored, rough-finished plaster. Now "five o'clock shadow" is beginning to show around our high-wall registers. Our oil furnace has filters for the blower but, nevertheless, the soot on two walls looks black. How can I remove this grime and prevent a recurrence?

ANSWER: To clean the walls, first remove as much loose dirt as you can by light brushing, and follow by cleaning with a wall-paper cleaner. The filters probably are loaded down with dust and may need cleaning, if they are of the cleanable variety. If not, they may need to be replaced.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Berlin Crisis Nears Showdown; First Peacetime Draft Begins; Special Session Opens Campaign

BERLIN: Showdown
The old familiar pattern of just one crisis after another in the cold war between Russia on the one hand and the western Allies on the other was being repeated again in the Berlin showdown. But an uneasy world watched anxiously, fearful that at any moment some crisis might explode into actual warfare.

Urgency of the Berlin crisis resulted in the recall of Gen. Lucius D. Clay, U. S. military commander in Germany, and his top political adviser, Ambassador Robert Murphy, for a first-hand report on the situation. Clay conferred with President Truman, State Secretary Marshall and Army Secretary Royall on means of carrying out the American government's intention to stay in Berlin despite the concerted Russian drive to force the western powers out.

The official line was laid down by Secretary Marshall who said that while the United States would not be "coerced or intimidated" by the Russian blockade of Berlin, the administration nevertheless will "proceed to reach an acceptable solution to avoid the tragedy of war." Although rumors that the Berlin blockade might prove the spark that would enkindle fighting warfare permeated official quarters, the U. S. position appeared to be that this country hopes to avoid war. However, if the Russians are determined to cause more serious trouble at Berlin, this government is determined to resist force with force. It is equally determined to avoid taking any step which might make the situation more serious as long as negotiation and other diplomatic means remain open.

There will be many more talks, much painstaking deliberation among the western powers in connection with the exchange of notes regarding the Berlin blockade, irrevocably linked up as it is with the over-all German settlement. Marking the high water mark in the deepening Berlin crisis and lending emphasis to the determination to back up its policy that American troops will not leave Berlin, the United States dispatched powerful reinforcements to its air arm in rifle-torn Europe.

A big question mark still concerned Russia's ultimate objectives. Was the Kremlin merely trying to drive the Allies out of Berlin or was this but another step in the fundamental objective of moving the iron curtain inexorably westward, country by country, until it embraced the whole heartland of Europe?

The draft proceedings will start rolling Monday, August 30, when the first of 9,500,000 youths will register. Registrations will continue on 17 designated days extending to September 18.

From these millions of men, volunteer draft boards throughout the nation will select the manpower to match the material build-up of air, land and sea forces called for under the rearmament program. Military men are set to welcome the first draftees into their ranks any time after September 22. Under the law actual drafting cannot start until that date. The presidential proclamation setting the registration dates did not specify when in-

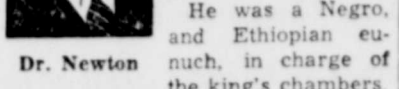

Ebed-Melech, The Ethiopian

Lesson for August 8, 1948

ARE you ready for a real story? Then turn to Jeremiah 38, and read on to verse 18 in the 39th chapter. This interesting story reveals a hero, Ebed-melech, by name, which means "the king's slave." This may have been his official title rather than his personal name. Anyway, he is the hero of our story, and a very admirable hero, indeed.

Zebekiah, as the story reveals, held Ebed-melech in high esteem. He was, obviously, a most honorable man. How he had come to know Jeremiah, and to esteem him so highly, is a subject for profitable contemplation. The devotional reading, Matthew 25:31-46, offers final opinion on the value of Ebed-melech's ministry to Jeremiah. The golden text, "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men," Galatians 6:10.

JEREMIAH'S FRIEND
EBED-MELECH was Jeremiah's friend. When he saw what the princes had done to Jeremiah, he went to the king and begged him to allow him to draw Jeremiah out of the mire in the dark dungeon. He knew that Jeremiah would soon die in this awful place, and Ebed-melech risked his life in making the request to rescue Jeremiah. The wonder is that the princes had not ordered Ebed-melech slain. Evidently, they recognized the hand of God.

Like as this Negro servant in the long ago served God by rendering kindness to a man of another race, so may we today serve God and civilization by good will and kindly service to all races.

FREEDOM THROUGH A SLAVE
THE story of Ebed-melech's kindness to Jeremiah lifts to ennobling example the act of a slave on behalf of freedom. The world's benefactors are those who understand freedom, and cast themselves in utter self-forgetfulness into the struggle for right against wrong.

What had Jeremiah done to receive such harsh treatment? He had delivered God's message to the people of Jerusalem, warning them that the city would be taken by the Chaldeans, and how they might escape destruction. Jeremiah was proclaiming freedom—not always a popular course. For this effort to help the people, he was thrown into the muddy dungeon. This servant of the king was the only man in Jerusalem who understood the purpose of Jeremiah.

A FRIEND INDEED
GRANTED permission from the king to rescue Jeremiah, Ebed-melech devised prompt methods of letting down old pieces of rope and rags, telling Jeremiah how to fasten them under his arms, and with the aid of thirty men drew him up from the mire, and brought him into the court of the prison.

And then God spoke words of great reward to Jeremiah on behalf of Ebed-melech. "But I will deliver thee in that day, saith the Lord; and thou shalt not be given into the hand of the men of whom thou art afraid. For I will surely deliver thee, and thou shalt not fall by the sword, but thy life shall be for a prey unto thee, because thou hast put thy trust in me, saith the Lord."

EBED-MELECH'S noble ministry to Jeremiah lifts up a banner for every true follower of the Lord. Who sides with God? must always win. That is the lesson of the lesson. We should never have known about this Negro, had he not cast his all on the side of God.

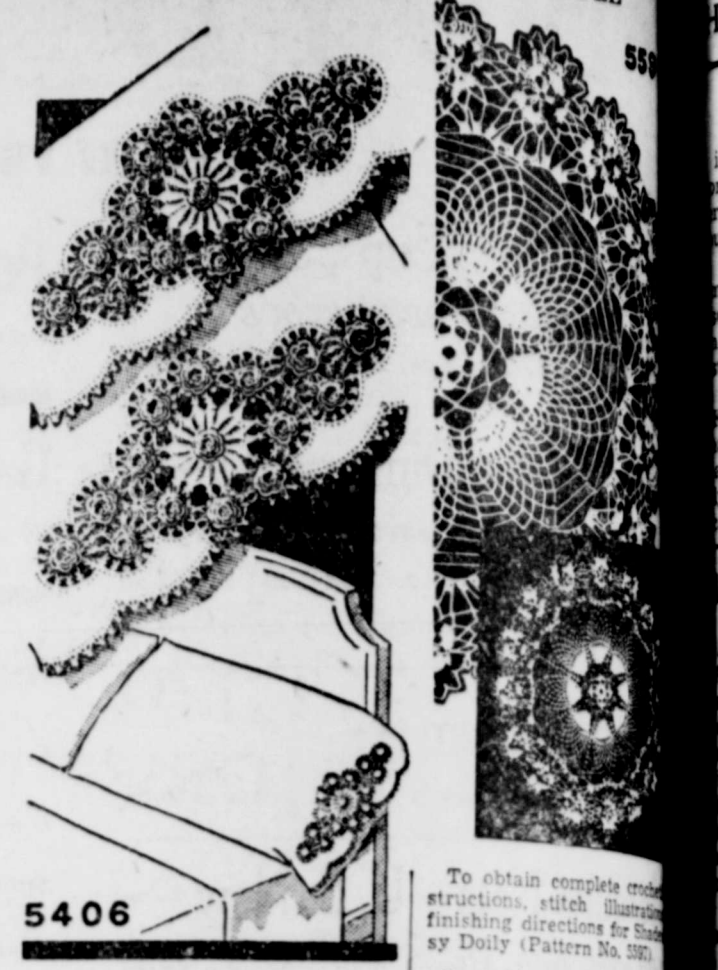

Freeze in Garden Flavor In Moistureproof Cartons

To keep the most "garden goodness" in fruits and vegetables that are to be frozen, package them carefully. This point is stressed by Miss Frances O. Van Durne, assistant professor of foods, University of Illinois college of agriculture. Choose containers that can be sealed tightly and won't leak. Frozen foods are better when packaged in containers that are moisture-proof and vapor-proof, Miss Van Durne explains. Otherwise the foods dry out and lose palatability.

Cartons come in a variety of types and shapes. Rectangular or square cartons may have inner liners or have a waxed plastic finish; some are made for use with cellophane bags. Most of these are sealable with heat—by pressing together edges of covering material with an electric iron or a hand iron. The cartons are generally easy to handle and store. Waxed cups are convenient, but the seal on the set-in lid isn't moisture- or vapor-proof. Before sealing a filled carton or bag, wipe inside edges with a clean cloth to remove moisture that would prevent a tight seal. Also press out all possible air from top of bag, then heat-seal tightly. Or you may like the pressure tapes for sealing; they have an adhesive substance on one side so that they can be stuck on edges of bags and cartons.

WHAT ABOUT NEWCASTLE?

Most poultry raisers will remember the "Newcastle scare" that swept the country about two years ago. For several months the alarm and shouting continued; then, slowly, the frenzy died down and the new disease was regarded in a more rational light, as it should have been in the first place.

Newcastle disease is a serious problem in many areas today. But it is no worse than most diseases and certainly not as bad as a few other especially dangerous poultry ailments. It is with us now, perhaps to stay; and we must accept it for what it is and strive to do whatever we can to keep it under control.

One thing, however, should be remembered — Newcastle is highly contagious and if care isn't exercised in areas in which the disease is prevalent, it conceivably could spread to most every flock in the particular section.

Vaccines Coming?

What can be done to control Newcastle? Apparently headway is being made in the development of preventive vaccines. How effective the new vaccines will be can be known only after trial.

In the meantime, many poul-

trymen are helping to protect their birds by using a special type of disinfectant — a quarternary ammonium compound. The virus that causes Newcastle disease is not susceptible to many disinfectants, but disinfectants containing the ammonium compound will kill the virus causing the disease with high effectiveness if applied at proper concentrations. Most poultry supply dealers handle disinfectants of this kind.

When Newcastle does break out, the following control measures are recommended:

1. Remove all birds from the poultry house and keep them isolated from other birds on the farm. Keep sick birds and healthy fowl separated.
2. Then thoroughly clean and scrub the poultry house interior and all equipment. Remove the old litter. Disinfect the walls and floor, feeders, waterers, and other equipment with a disinfectant containing a quarternary ammonium compound. Place new litter on the floor before birds are returned to the house.

WHY SAVE MONEY?

In 1776 a Scotchman named Matthew Boulton risked \$200,000 of his savings to help James Watt develop a new device known as a steam engine. In 1948, the estimated capital expenditures of the nation's chief railroads (the railroads grew because of Watt's invention, though how steam is not the only motive power) approaches one billion dollars! Our Class I railroads expect to spend \$319,958,000 during this quarter of 1948.

How our nation finances its industry is an interesting story. The American way of doing this explains the high standard of living we enjoy today. Not all nations do it as we do. In some countries everything is owned by the government. The government does everything. Of course, the people foot the bill, but in these totalitarian countries rewards never come. In America anyone has the opportunity of investing and sharing in the progress of industry.

You May Share

Critics of "capitalism," who say that government is the only agency big enough to do things that have to be done in a progressive economy, really miss some important points. They just don't know their American system. Did you know that over fifty million Americans pool their savings to provide the tools for workers? Perhaps you are one of them. These men and women have saved up something for a "rainy day" and, meantime, have invested it.

Perhaps you have a share in industry you did not know about. If you have life insurance, it is quite likely that your insurance company invests the premiums you pay to provide tools for industry. Savings banks likewise invest deposits. In this way, the "capital" funds that our people own and invest actually turn the wheels of industry.

Unfettered Growth

Then too, industry itself saves and reinvests. Every live company or business will find it advisable to take a portion of its income and "plow it back under" right in the business. Of money that every industry pays out "for use of tools," only a comparatively small amount goes to the thrifty people who really own the tools. Most of it goes to buy the actual tools. Industry has constant need for investments for expansion and new facilities.

I say, let the people provide the savings to make our industry grow and grow. That way there's no ceiling on progress. Let us replace old models, invent new machines, develop new methods. Our population is growing, and our needs will be tremendous in the future. We can continue to be great consumers, if we keep a system that permits us to be great producers.

Right now, there is an important reason why we should save, and save to invest. We must stop adding dollars that could be savings to the inflation stream, bidding up prices and damaging our economy. The railroads represent just one industry that is calling for capital. There are many other industries in which savings may be put to work. Under the American system, there will continue to be more jobs, more pay, and more security as well as opportunity for all.

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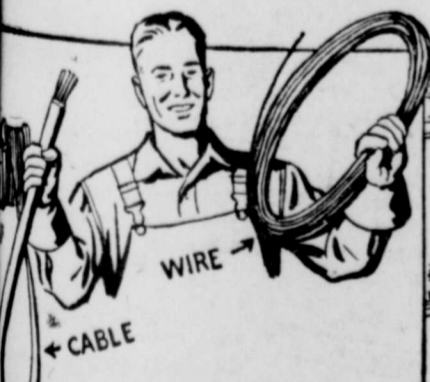

Minimum Shutter Speeds

A LETTER from a high school student last week asked a pertinent question. "Not long ago," our correspondent wrote, "you mentioned that many pictures were spoiled by what you called camera movement—moving the camera ever so slightly as the shutter is tripped. I'm curious to know what shutter speed will help overcome the effects of camera movement." Actually, as we pointed out before, the first step in overcoming camera movement is to hold the camera firmly with both hands, resting against chest or cheekbone, and trip the shutter smoothly. But sufficient shutter speed will help, too. And in this connection the most important point is never to use a speed of less than 1/25 of a second when your camera is hand-held. More often, you'll want to use a speed of at least 1/50. With miniature cameras, such as a 35mm., you may find 1/100 is better. The reason for this is that prints from mini-

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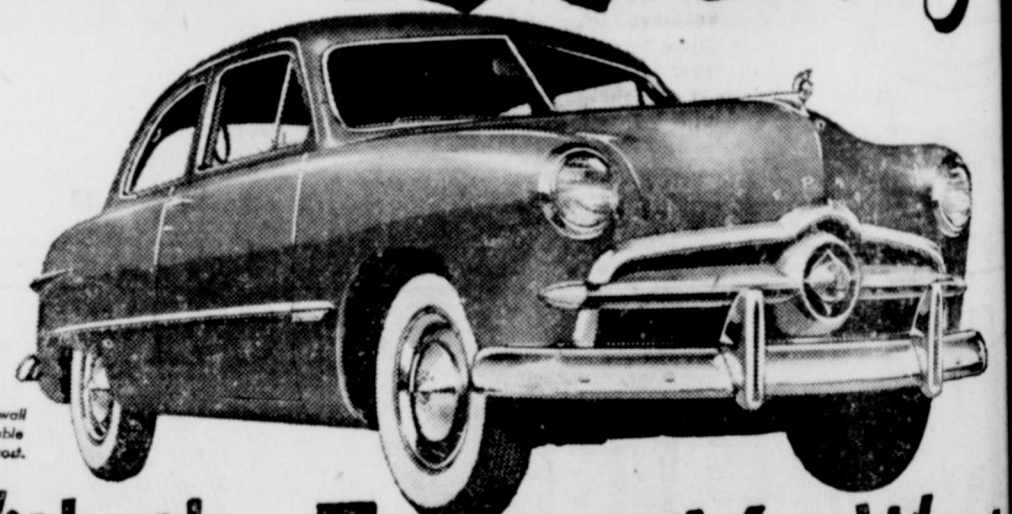
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
