Things Are Rough in Peru
While the U. S. price index rose 8.9 per cent last year, living costs in Peru soared as high as the Andes—increasing 46.1 per cent. Between August, 1939, and December, 1947, living costs rose 69 per cent in the U. S. compared to 207 per cent in Peru, according to the Municipal Finance officers association. Among 11 nations for which comparable statistics are available, Canadian living costs have increased the least since before the war. Though the Canadian price index rose 14.9 per cent in 1947, it is only 45 per cent above the 1939 level of that country.

essential food elements not only
lag behind in growth or produce
fewer eggs, but also may devel-
op one of various nutritional de-
ficiency diseases. To function
properly, a chicken's body needs
a balanced diet of minerals, vit-
amins, proteins, carbohydrates,
and fats. When just one of these
is missing trouble soon may devel-
op.

Here are some of the common
nutritional ailments, their symp-
toms, causes and curative or pre-
ventive measures:

Rickets—Caused by the lack of
vitamin D or of certain minerals,
particularly calcium. Chicks suf-
fering from the disease have soft
and rubbery beaks, breastbones
and legs. Crooked breasts and
breastbones frequently develop.
The chief effect on adult birds
has to do with the production of
eggs, the lack of minerals result-
ing in the production of thin or
soft shelled eggs. To correct the
condition give the birds adequate
amounts of the deficient nutri-
ents. Fish liver oils will supply
the required vitamins while
powdered limestone or oyster
shell will give the fowl the min-
erals they need.

Slipped Tendon— This is a
disease in which the large hock
tendon of the bird's leg slips
from its normal position causing
the leg to become bowed or
twisted. It usually occurs among
chicks. Causes are deficiencies
of manganese or choline. Make
certain the feed contains 4 to 6
ounces of manganese sulphate per
ton.

Curly Toe Paralysis— Afflic-
ted birds walk on their hocks with
toes curled inward. It is caused
by a deficiency of vitamin G
or riboflavin. Dried liver, dried
yeast, milk products and green
feeds are some of the food pro-
ducts which will provide plenty
of riboflavin when needed.

Nutritional Roup— This con-
dition, caused by a lack of vit-
amin A, affects the lining of the
upper respiratory and digestive
tracts. Nutritional roup is mark-
ed by the formation of milky
white material in the nasal cav-
ities, sinuses and under the eye-
lids. Small white nodules form
in the esophagus. Correct the
condition by feeding greens, yel-
low corn, dried liver meal or
cod liver meal to the birds.

Former Burk Boy Makes Good As Big Time Jockey

Bobby Strange, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. I. Strange of Kermit, one of the nation's top jockeys for the past three years, brought "Eaton Town" in for second place in the \$25,000 Mayflower Stakes for two-year-olds at Suffolk Downs Saturday, August 7.

In another race Wednesday, August 4, Bobby brought C. V. Whitney's "Dinner Gobb" in for second in the \$10,000 Rumson Handicap at Monmouth Park, Oceanport, N. J. He rode a horse

by the name of "I Did" for first place in another race the same day.

Of the 150, more or less, jockeys at Monmouth Park, the Kermit jockey rates fifth—having ridden in 142 races for 15 firsts, 25 seconds, and 13 third places.

Originally of Burkburnett, the Stranges moved to Kermit when Bobby was in the fourth grade. Later, Mr. and Mrs. Strange purchased him a horse and at the age of 16, Jack Sisler, race horse owner of Barstow, now of Monahans, saw him riding and became impressed with his ability. Bobby rode for Sisler for a time and later signed a contract with Doc Bloss of Midland.

Leaving Kermit in 1940, where he was a junior in the local high school and manager of the basket

ball team, Bobby rode for two years in California. In 1943 he went to the eastern part of the United States where he hit the big time in 1944 by riding a horse in for second place at Belmont Park in New York.

 Plans for members of the Wichita County Farm Bureau to participate in both the Dallas Fair and the Texas-Oklahoma Fair were made at the meeting of directors held recently in the State National Bank in Iowa Park, with the president, Geo. A. Lewis, presiding at the session.

The county organization will be represented in the Agricultural Department at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair in Iowa Park. The state exposition officials have designated October 17 at the Dallas Fair as Farm Bureau Day and members from all over the state are invited to participate in the activities on that date.

The point of view of the southern farmer with reference to the sliding scale of parity as adopted in the Long Range Farm Program was presented by Loys D. He said the general consensus of opinion lamented the passing of the measure, since the south hopes to maintain parity on at least a 90 per cent basis, the present standard.

Reports of the county-wide meeting and queen contest which have come back to directors have been most encouraging, according to remarks made by those present.

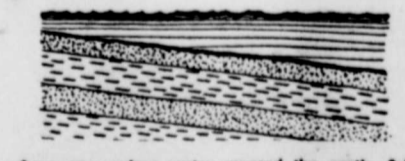

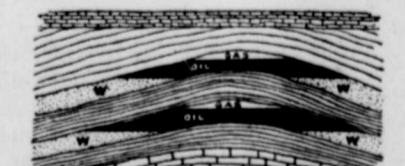
EVER SEE A King Size DOODLEBUG?
