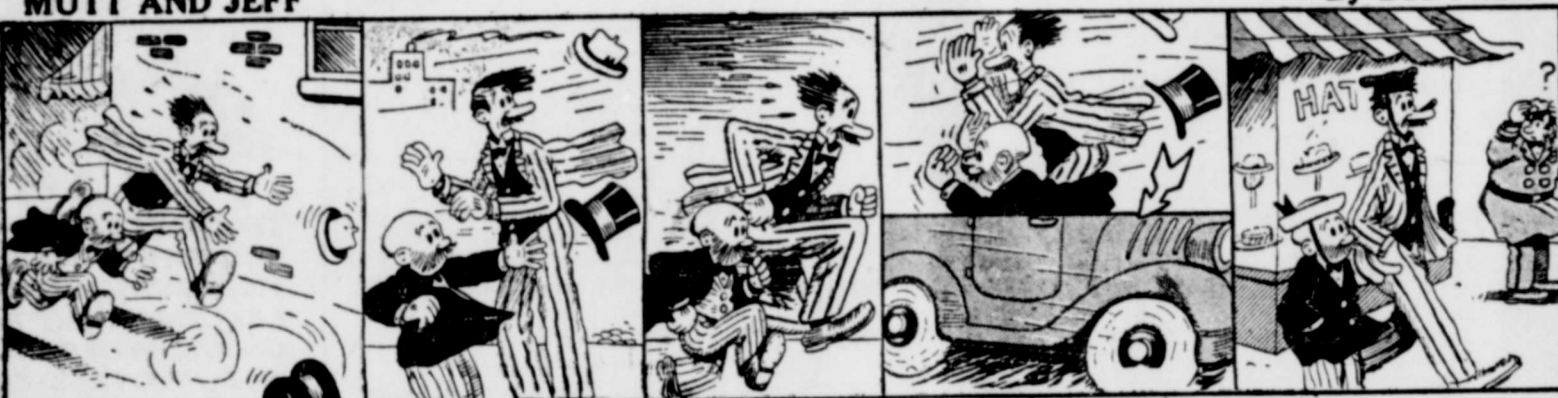

AROUND THE HOUSE

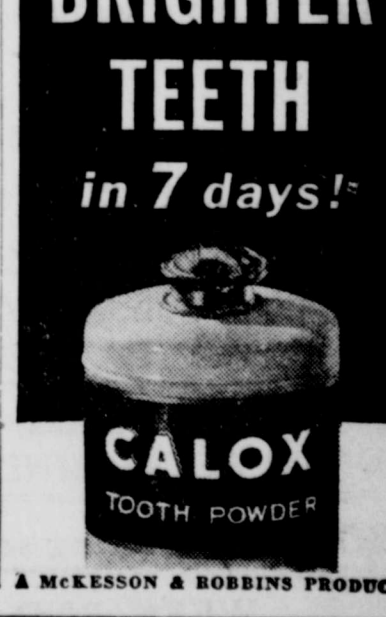
QUESTION: I have bronze screens that have been discolored because someone rubbed yellow soap all over them. This has made them green. I have tried to clean them by washing them and also used kerosene, but this has not helped. I would appreciate any suggestions.

ANSWER: I believe wiping the screens with a cloth dampened with ammonia would take off the green discoloration. Be careful of ammonia fumes. If this fails, try a good metal polish. An alternative would be to wash with ordinary vinegar, in which has been dissolved as much salt as will be taken up; then rinse well with clear water. The solution can be made into a paste by the addition of flour.

A Debt to Profit
America has become rich and pow-
erful, with high wages and the best
living conditions in the world, be-
cause of good profits. When I say
America, I mean all of America. All
the people in this great country owe
much to this system that allows prof-
it to be made and used. When we ap-
preciate that fact, it is possible to
see the dangers that exist when we
do things that limit profits or keep
them down.

For example, today inflation has re-
duced the buying power of profits by
about 40 per cent from what they were
a few years ago. On top of this, profit
has been reduced in many industries.
Many businesses made smaller profits
in 1947 than in 1946. Quite a few are
not making enough profit to replace
worn-out tools and machinery. Others
are borrowing heavily. Those that bor-
row do so because they find they have
to borrow.

Question of Risk
An industrial enterprise can only
borrow, however, on the basis of an-
ticipated profits: "profits to come." If
these expected profits do not come,
then the future of that business is
jeopardized. Nobody wants to lend it
any more money then. It's a poor risk.
So what happens? The machinery
wears out. Wages hit rock-bottom.
Workers drop out, top executives take
jobs in better companies. Presently,
the business is bankrupt.

Every company that has to go broke
for lack of profits puts a blight upon
the record that belongs to America.
Yet, right here in America we are
today actually jeopardizing future
jobs and future prosperity in the na-
tion by bringing profits down too low.

For example, the railroads cannot
possibly replace their old equipment
by depending upon their profits. New
equipment like streamlined trains,
latest model locomotives, lots of heavy
equipment and modernization — all
these things call for money. Profits
aren't enough. Therefore, railroads
must borrow. But suppose they do not
make enough profits to repay the
loans? These things keep the rail-
roads in constant danger.

New Capital Needed
The need for investment and for
new capital is so great that many in-
dustries right now are investing more
than their total profits. Of course,
they are expecting present conditions
to be temporary. They make huge in-
vestments, without regard to present
profits, only because they expect con-
ditions to improve and better profits
to come in later. Actually, this simply
means that profits in 1947 (which look
tremendous in figures) were much too
small.

President Truman, in his report on
the state of the nation, said that
\$50,000,000,000 should be invested in
business expansion over the next few
years. This would be fine. However,
the fact remains that money for in-
vestment comes only as a result of
work and savings. Unless we can get
more profits than are now custom-
ary, we shall still lack for invest-
ments. With present profits, Mr. Tru-
man's figure cannot be reached.

Why, then, do we need investment?
For exactly the same reasons that we
need profits. In order to make sure
there will be enough jobs at good
wages. Lack of investments and lack
of profits is an invitation to unem-
ployment and hard times. Let's not be
deceived by those who would arouse
us against profits. They would like to
wreck our "profit" system, which has
given us the highest wages and best
living conditions men ever knew.

More Money Spent During 1948

Americans during 1948 are buying houses and automobiles faster than they can be produced and indebtedness is increasing, according to the Federal Reserve Board's 1948 survey of consumer finances.

Fewer folk are saving in 1948 than the year previous. Some 3 million consumers who had savings bonds in 1947 didn't have them the first of 1948. Consumers are doing more of their paying on a credit basis than a year ago.

It is expected that about one-fourth of the consumers will spend beyond their income in 1948 as they did in 1947.

YOUTH MONTH: Awareness

If the day should ever dawn when every family in the nation becomes fully aware that all juvenile delinquency has its beginning in the home, then U. S. society will have reached its Elysian fields.

Once families become endowed with this awareness they will tend to bring pressure to bear to eliminate the secondary factors that contribute to delinquency in young people: School failure, church failure, bad housing and the inevitable shift in ethical values from one generation to the next which are sometimes confusing and frightening to immature minds.

To that end, and because a healthy store of young minds and bodies is the best overall insurance any nation can have, September was proclaimed Youth Month. The Theater Owners of America, who feel they have a big stake in the welfare of U. S. youth, have undertaken to organize the principal media of information—newspapers, magazines, radio and motion pictures—to publicize the month.

Aside from the publicity to be accorded the problem of juvenile delinquency, which is the immediate purpose of Youth Month, the observance is more deeply significant in that it provides some evidence that Americans are becoming actively conscious that at least a partial remedy must be found.

Springboard for Youth Month and any other concerted group action that might obtain is a probing and thoughtful report on juvenile delinquency by the National Conference on Prevention and Control of Juvenile Delinquency, Washington, D. C.

NEW LOW: Bitterness

While American, British and French ambassadors in Moscow were grimly making peace talk with Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov in the Kremlin, general relations between the East and West were sliding to new depths of mutual re-creation.

This state of affairs was not eased any by unsubstantiated reports that the Moscow talks had degenerated into a deadlock and that no progress was being made.

For the most part, however, the animosity was being spread through raucous propaganda by Berlin newspapers, with the publications sponsored by the Russians and the western powers waging a pitched battle of words.

The British-licensed paper Telegraph reported that the Soviets were getting ready to move great numbers of new troops into Germany and that Russia was pressing toward "sole rule over all of Berlin."

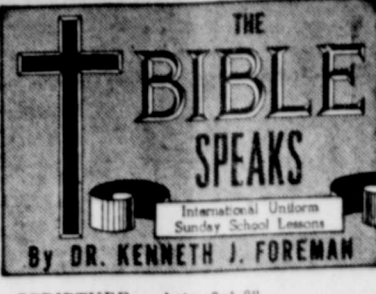

At the Word of Command

Lesson for August 29, 1948

DO PEOPLE always do what they know is right? You would think so; but they don't. It is strange how many excuses people can think up to get out of doing what they know in their hearts they ought to do.

But not this man Ananias. He was a shining exception. There are three Ananias in the New Testament, and this one makes up for the other two. One of the others was a rascally priest and one was a famous liar; but this Ananias, another of the "unheralded" characters from the Bible, is famed for going when God said, "Go." We know nothing much else about him, but this is enough.

No Wonder He Hesitated

IT WAS just after the conversion of Saul. At the time of our story, nobody had ever heard of Paul, only of Saul as he was then called; and nobody heard anything good. He was a bitter, ruthless man. He had no use for Christians. Extermination was his only answer to the Christian challenge. The name of Saul brought terror.

On this day of our story Saul had been only three days a Christian. He had had nothing to eat all that time, and he was said to be blind. You may be sure that Christians stayed away from him. His Jerusalem cronies had no doubt given him up as crazy; but no Christian would go near him either. At this point our Ananias had a vision: The Lord told him to go to Saul and lay his hands on him in help and blessing. Naturally Ananias held back. This was a dangerous man, said he. But again the Lord in the vision said, "Go," and Ananias went.

Suppose Ananias had said "No"? That might have changed the whole course of Christian history. How? He could have thought of many an excuse. "Aren't there other men who can baptize Saul as well as I can? . . . This whole vision may be only a mistake . . ." And so forth. But not when it became clear to him that this was God's will. Ananias went, though he still did not like it.

How is it with you? When you know what you ought to do, what is the first thing you think of? How to do it, or how to get out of doing it?

Taking Orders From God

HOW CAN we tell when it is really God who commands us? Most Christians today are suspicious of visions, and well we may be. Too many crazy things have been done by people who saw "visions" for us to trust such experiences very far.

One way in which God's orders come to us is in the Word of God, particularly in the words of Christ. For example, take one of the hardest things Jesus ever said: "LOVE YOUR ENEMIES AND PRAY FOR THOSE WHO PERSECUTE YOU." That sounds tough. It is tough. But it is a command. Yet don't most of us leave that command in the closed Bible and act as if the words had never been said?

That brings up another question. Is it likely that Ananias became fond of Saul all at once? Hardly. Ananias could not have liked the man; there was then nothing about him to like. We know from Paul's own words that people generally were not attracted by his looks. Yet Ananias, who could not have liked Saul, much less been fond of him, went and called him "Brother" and gave him his start in the Christian life.

Do You Know a Saul?

NOT FAR from where you are sitting at this moment there may be someone like Saul. He is a Christian, but a new and (so far) poor one, maybe. Someone nobody believes in, someone you scarcely know. It may be a child out of some low-grade home; it may be an ex-drunkard (not so long over it) or an ex-convict even; perhaps someone who has actually done you a wrong.

But this person may be just where Saul was, needing a friend. God may already have touched his heart, all he needs now is the human touch of a Christian friend. Maybe you can't love him, can't even like him; but if he is a human soul God loves him. If you can help him, then you are his Ananias. You know what you ought to do. Will you do it?

to insist on the proper sanitation
of the establishment where they
eat. If the public is careless in
this respect the incentive to
maintain clean food service will
be lessened and operators will
only maintain the level, the pub-
lic is willing to accept. We urge
that the public patronize eating
establishments which measure up

to a high standard of cleanli-
ness.

The State Health Department
is making every effort to im-
prove sanitation of eating places,
Dr. Cox said, and there is no
excuse for cafe owners not tak-
ing advantage of the food hand-
lers schools which are being of-
fered all over the state. He ad-
ded that there are laws, rules
and regulations which require
the use of approved equipment
and methods in such establish-
ments.

The public should be aware
of these sanitary rules and regu-
lations and insist that restau-
rants observe them. Patrons
should realize that tables and
counters will be many times
cleaner than the kitchen and other
places out of sight, he warn-
ed.

He urged milk appraisal by
the patrons also. Texas law re-
quires that a milk bottle cap
state the grade of milk, and
whether it is raw or pasteurized.
Insist on having the milk served
in its original container, with
a covered cap and a legal label,
Dr. Cox advised.

Obviously, he said, the best in
sanitation can be had only by
close co-operation between the
public and the investigators of
the State Health Department.

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

There are several reasons why
the all-pullet flock has become
increasingly popular during the
past several years. There can be
little doubt that such a flock
is more profitable than one con-
sisting of birds of mixed ages.

Here are some of the reasons
so many poultry raisers now
prefer all-pullet flocks rather
than mixed flocks.

Pullets lay more eggs than
hens over a year's time.
Pullets lay more eggs when
eggs are at the highest level.

The cost of feeding a pullet
for the 6-month period is about
the same as the cost of feeding
a hen during her 4-month molt
—and, at the end of the grow-
ing months, you have a pullet
representing four pounds of meat
and dozens of eggs, instead of
just an old hen with a new coat
of feathers.

There is less danger of dis-
ease and, therefore, lower mor-
tality among all-pullet flocks.

Tests have shown that pullets
lay from 20 to 30 per cent more
eggs annually than hens. A U.
S. Department of Agriculture
test showed that uncultured Leg-
horn pullets laid from 178 to
208 eggs in a year whereas se-
lected Leghorn hens laid 141
to 187. There have been other
tests to substantiate the findings
in the USDA experiments.

Remember that when egg
prices are highest in the fall
and early winter, pullet flocks

are just reaching a high pro-
duction rate while hens are molt-
ing or taking a rest. No poultry
raiser likes to spend money on
feed for hens that aren't pro-
ducing.

Hens often carry such diseases
as tuberculosis, cholera, pullor-
um, and coryza — another good
reason for raising pullets sep-
arately. Mortality rates in all
pullet flocks run from 3 to 5
per cent lower than in mixed
flocks.

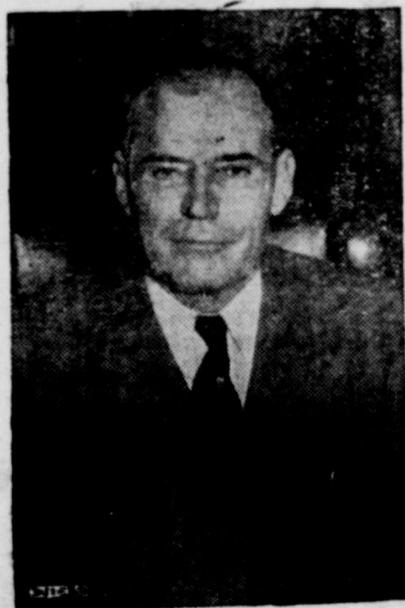

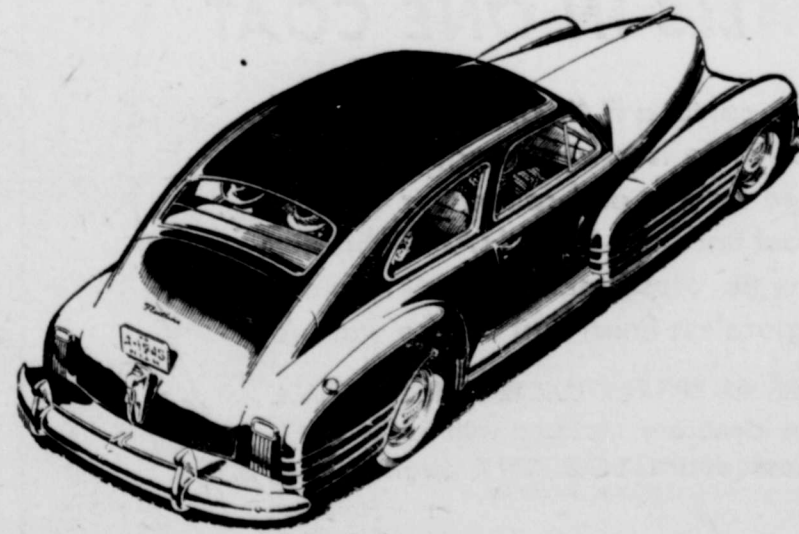

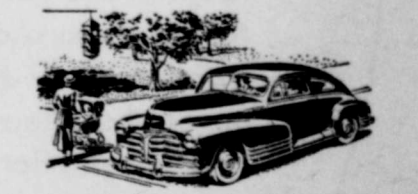

Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

Certain changes in charges and practices pertaining to long distance calls within the State of Texas will be made effective September 1.

Report Charges

Report charges, applied to person-to-person calls under certain conditions since 1919, will be discontinued beginning September 1.

Basic Station-to-Station Day Rates

In 74 of the 800 air line mileage distances, rates will be increased 5 cents. These involve about half of the distances up to 146 miles. Basic rates for longer distances are not affected.

Person-to-Person Day Rates

Person-to-person rates are based on the station-to-station rates. The differential between rates for station-to-station service and for person-to-person service has varied from a minimum of 10 cents per call under 31 miles to an average of over 43 per cent on calls between 31 miles and 150 miles and an average of 35 per cent on calls over 150 miles. The differential will be established with a minimum of 15 cents per call under 45 miles and a uniform differential of about 40 per cent on all other calls. Report charges will be discontinued.

Night and Sunday Rates

A discount of approximately 20 per cent from the station-to-station day rate will apply on all station-to-station calls costing over 40 cents completed during night hours and all day Sunday. The night and Sunday discount on person-to-person calls generally will equal in amount the discount on station-to-station calls between the same points.

The principal changes to be made are described above. More detailed information may be obtained at any company business office.

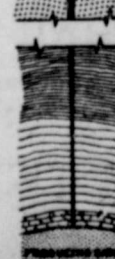

Formations favorable for the presence of oil or gas are determined by geologists and seismograph crews. A location is selected, a derrick erected, drilling machinery rigged up, and the new well is begun, or "spudded in."



A string of pipe of large diameter is cemented in the upper part of the hole to protect against caving or contamination of freshwater sands. The SNAPSHOT GUILD

Sidelighting Snaps

SEVERAL months ago in one of these columns we mentioned the fact that most picture takers habitually work with their backs to the sun.

We suspect that this is in part a hangover from the early days of the box camera. Film speeds were slow in those days. To picture a person or group of people acceptably, full frontal lighting was necessary. Only when the subject faced the sun, and the camera was pointed away from it, could a good picture be made. But with fast films today more and more camera users are finding that better results can be had by picturing people when the sun strikes them from one side or behind. Sidelighting or backlighting, it's called.

For one thing, sidelighting or backlighting tends to reduce the shadows full frontal lighting often produces. A second point in favor of side- or backlighting is that the subject is less likely to squint than when facing the sun.

Today's picture serves as a good illustration of a sidelighted shot. Direct sunlight falls only on one cheek of the subject. The sun is to the left and the rear of the model.

Naturally, since, in a shot of this type, the features are not lit by direct sunlight, you want to use a somewhat longer exposure than you otherwise would. Increasing the lens opening a full stop will do the trick nicely. Or halving the shutter speed. The latter method was followed here, an exposure of 1/25 at f/11 being used instead of the normal exposure of 1/50 at the same opening.

However, there's one thing more to remember in making sidelighted or backlighted shots. Don't let the sun's rays fall on your lens. This can be avoided in several ways: by using a lens hood, by shielding the lens with your hand, or by placing your camera so that the lens is in the shadow cast by your subject or some other object.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis also attended the annual meeting of the Young County Farm Bureau at Fort Belknap during the past week, where Mr. Lewis served as one of the judges in the queen contest and where District Director, Loys D. Barbour, was the speaker of the evening.

Loys D. Barbour was also featured on the program of the Stonewall County Farm Bureau at Aspermont this week. He

pointed out that in the new Long Range Farm Program, adopted by the congress to take effect in 1950, the price of wheat must drop to 91c, corn to 71c, and cotton to 14c, before quotas can be declared so the farmer can raise his support price back to the present level of 90 per cent parity. The South opposes the above sliding scale of parity and is hoping to maintain the present parity schedule.

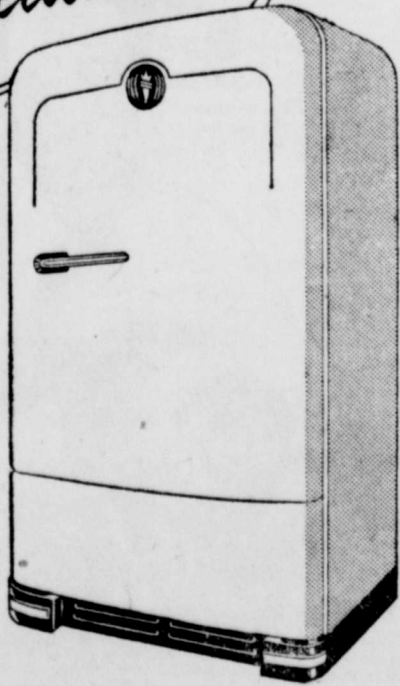

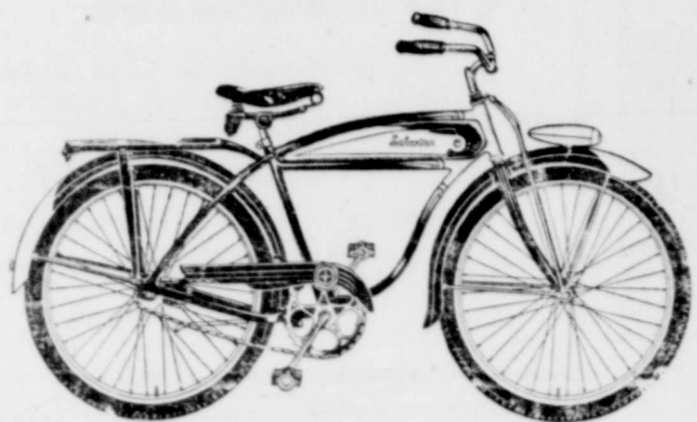

The dog is "man's best friend" but the dog's best friend is his veterinarian and the best advice that can be given to the owner of a sick or injured dog is to "run, don't walk" to the veterinarian, states the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

According to the Center, thousands of dogs live out their lives in misery or die needlessly because their misguided though well-meaning owners either ignore symptoms of disease in their pets or else through the use of home remedies and treatments, put off obtaining the advice of a veterinarian until it is too late.

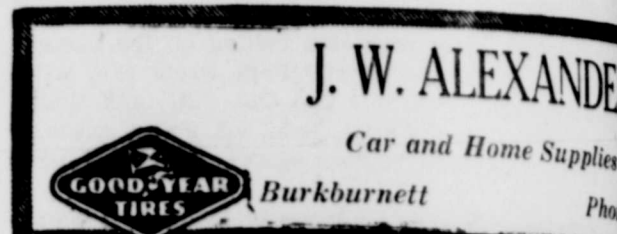
One of the commonest mistakes dog owners make is to attempt to worm a puppy at home. Some of the very sickest dogs veterinarians see are puppies which the owner has attempted to worm himself with drug-store remedies. Worm medicines are of necessity composed of toxic and potent drugs and are definitely unsafe in the hands of the average dog owner.

Aside from the danger involved in home worm treatments, many dog owners do not realize that there is more than one type of worm with which a dog may be infested and that different remedies are required to be effective against the several types of worms. Canine ear, eye and tooth troubles should receive prompt professional attention, too. Running or sore eyes, if unattended, can lead to ulceration and eventual blindness. Ear troubles which are usually indicated by the dog's continually shaking his head, scratching at the ear or showing unwillingness to have his head touched, can bring on deafness if not treated correctly. One of the most foolish things for a dog owner to do is to go probing in his pet's ears with an instrument, as the dog's eardrum is easily perforated. Dental troubles in dogs are fairly frequent. A decayed or ulcerated tooth can give a dog a good deal of pain and can cause toxemia and other illnesses. Having a veterinarian periodically remove the tartar from a dog's teeth and examine them with a view to the removal of any abscessed molars is good dog health insurance.

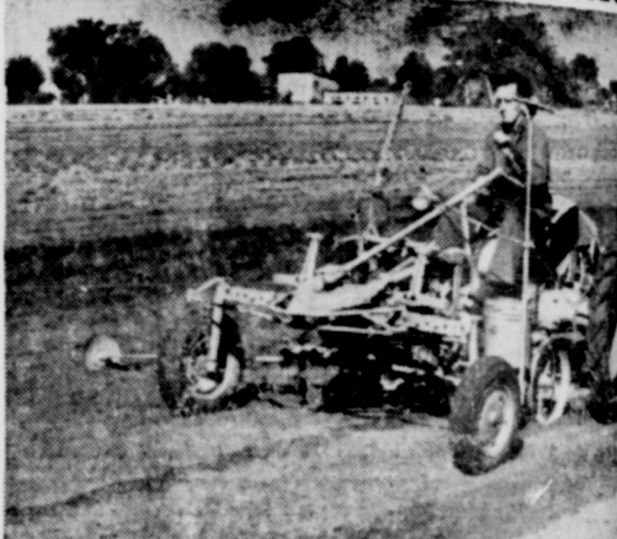

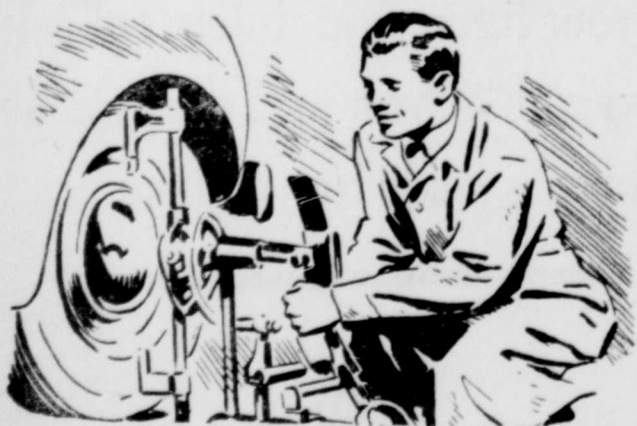

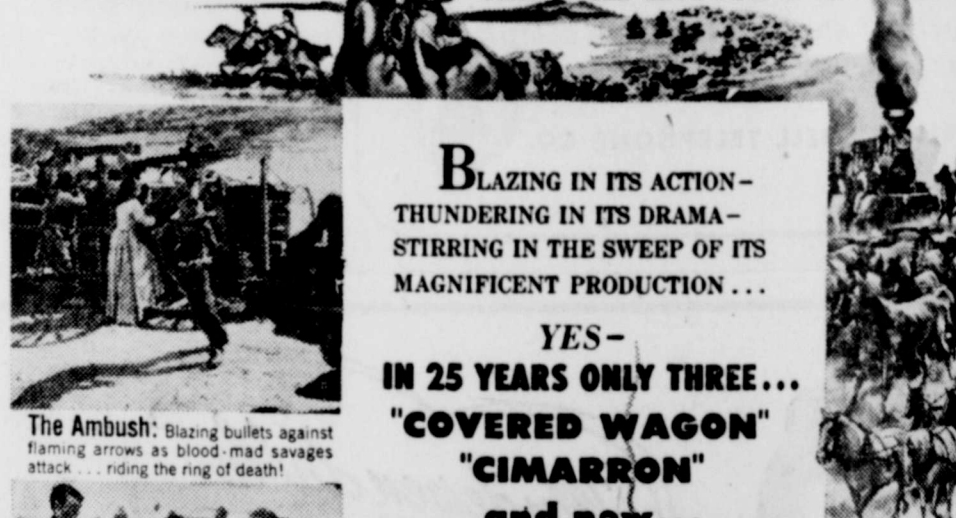
